LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Editor,
I have been a resident of Wheeler County all of my life and am greatly concerned about some of the things going on around here lately. Twenty years ago it would not have been possible for the young people of our community to go around committing senseless acts of vandalism, scrawling disgusting obscenities on public and private property, pestering the daylight hours of the citizens of this town to the point of harassment and getting away with it. Does it have to be that way?

How did we get into this situation in the first place? Did we miss the boat as parents somewhere along the way? Have we, mistakenly, through love, become permissive where we should have been firm? Do we need more of moral fortitude they so desperately need? How long has it been since we have set our young people down and talked about "respect"?

Respect for other people's property is very easy to teach if it doesn't belong to you—keep your hands off it.

Respect and reverence for the house of God and church property is a little harder to pin down.

Deeds with continuous exposure to the functions of this another area in which we have been too lax.

Father used to be the religious leader of the family both in public and private worship—now the responsibility has been shifted to someone else.

Respect for law and order is best illustrated by the people we, as adults, set for the children. How often have we cut to barely stay within the lines that we know exist? We must show regard for the office of the people who are employed to enforce laws and give them full cooperation.

Respect for people in authority is not taught by side with our kids against the classroom teachers and administrators of a school system. Those people have time to "pick on" anybody's kid that they need some sort of discipline—they are too busy going to import knowledge to have time to single out one for special reprimand. Besides that we expect teachers to give them everything from math to science, sex, and values to volleyball.

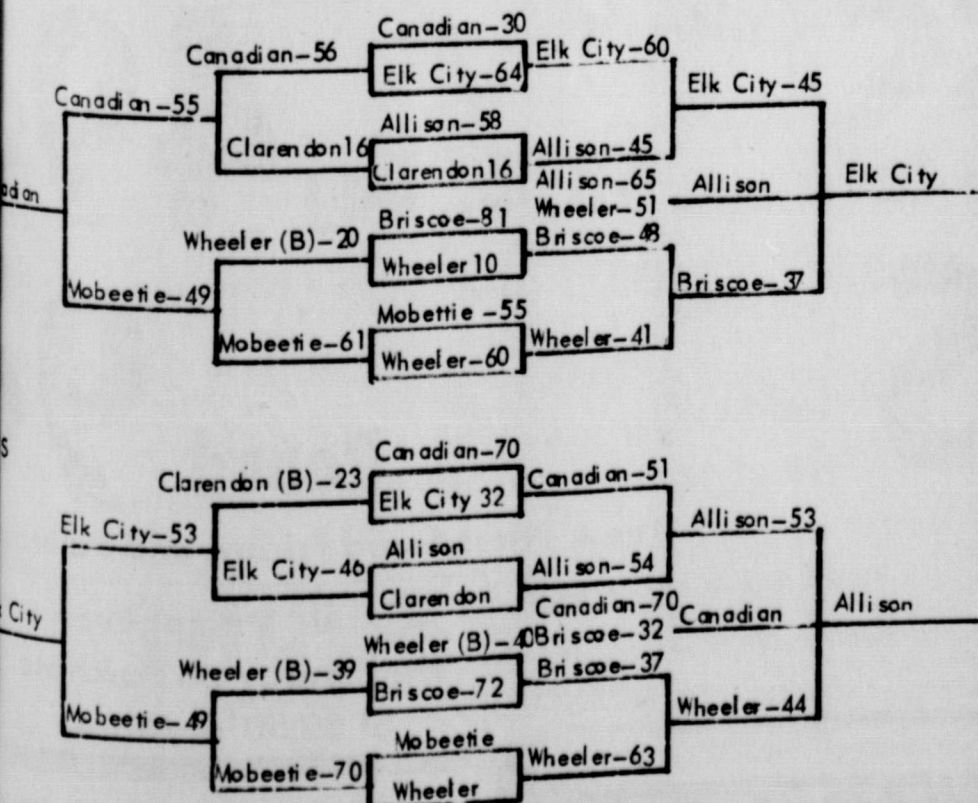
If we are going to insist on delegating so much responsibility, we must back their play.

We are blessed with some of the finest young people I have ever been privileged to know. I am proud to know them. I say let's stop letting them have too much authority before they can handle the responsibilities that go with it. Let's dig up the rules to lay down and enforce guidelines by which they can operate. Let's show them it's not so bad or tough to belong to the "establishment" and to be "right".

In other words, let's show a little old-fashioned discipline both to our kids and to ourselves and kick them back into line so that once again we can all proudly talk about the people in "my town" being one big happy family.

Parents and students are urged to be at the meeting for a very informative program on one of today's worst problems.

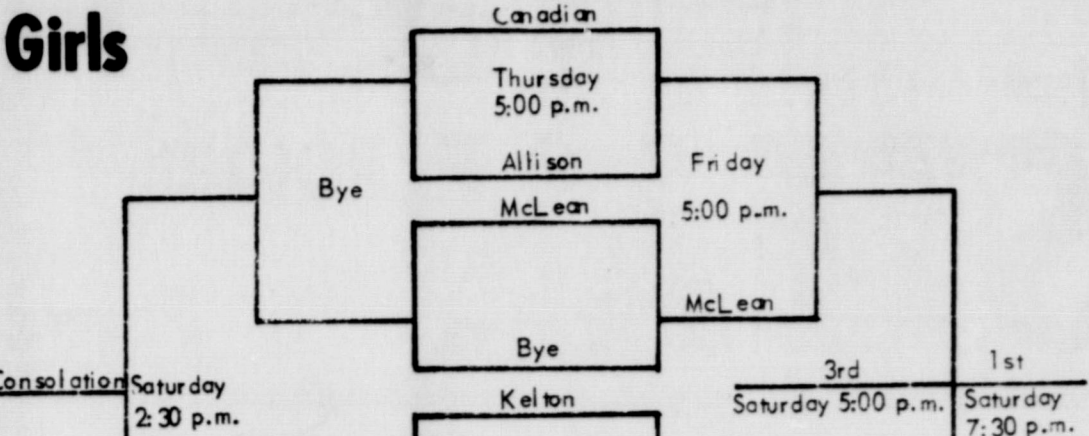

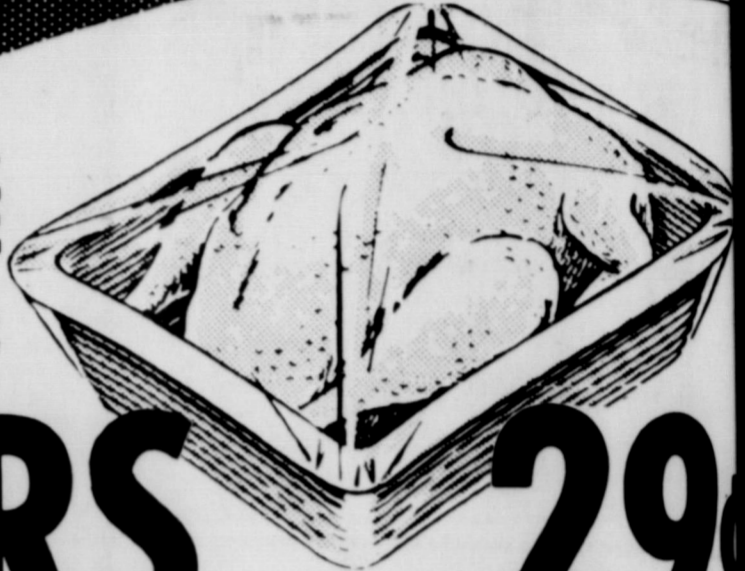

PAT'S PARAGRAPHS

I noticed several homes have put up Christmas trees and decorations. Many other families will be doing the same this week.

As you think about Christmas lighting, there are a few things you should remember.

Before hanging Christmas lights examine the strings carefully, replacing those that have frayed wires or damaged sockets. Next check the bulbs, replacing old ones with new in places that may be difficult to reach once the strings are positioned.

Protect spots where outdoor plugs and connectors join with wrappings of plastic film. Seal the ends with plastic tape.

For outdoor Christmas lights, sockets must be weather-proof and bulbs should be made of glass that is resistant to sudden temperature change, in case of rain or snow.

When putting lights on an indoor Christmas tree, examine the branches daily, and if there are dried needles near or around the lights, move the lights to another position. Never leave lights burning for extended periods of time.

Speaking of Christmas trees, in order to keep yours looking pretty longer, shop early and select one that is fresh. To determine how fresh the tree is you can do the following things. Shake or bounce the tree on the ground lightly to see if the needles are firmly attached. If only a few drop, the tree is fresh. The needles on a fresh tree should be resilient and not brittle when bent.

You can plan now for the holidays ahead and avoid the last minute mad time and party preparation rush.

Make full use of your freezer by preparing main dishes, desserts, garnishes and party fare well ahead of time and freezing them until needed. One caution to keep in mind is to use moisture-vapor proof wrapping or air-tight containers to insure good keeping of foods.

For those of you who bake a lot of cookies, I have in my office a basic butter cookie recipe which can be added to or fixed in different ways for different cookies. There are six different cookies that can be made from this basic cookie recipe. Since it would take a lot of space to print all of this, in this column, come by my office and pick up a copy of the recipe. Or, you may call and I will send it to you.

Here's a mix you can make ahead of time, for quick cups of hot chocolate.

Cocoa Mix for Hot Chocolate
1 8 qt. box of powdered milk
1 11 oz. jar of instant cream
1 box powdered sugar
1 large box Instant cocoa mix
1/2 teaspoon salt

Mix all together and stir well. Store in tight container such as coffee cans. This makes up to 22 lb. cans and 1-1 lb. can. For 1 cup of hot chocolate use 1/3 cup of mix and hot water.

Looking for a good Christmas or party punch recipe? Here's a delicious one that Opal Heffley serves.

Party Punch
4 cups sugar
6 cups water
5 mashed bananas
1 large can frozen orange juice
1 large can frozen lemon juice
46 oz. can pineapple juice
Mix sugar and water, cook three minutes, and let cool. Mix bananas, frozen orange juice, lemon juice, pineapple juice and sugar and water mixture. Freeze this mixture.

When ready to serve, add two bottles of ginger ale and serve it mushy. Serves 25 people.

DRUG ABUSE EDUCATION PROGRAM AT WHEELER P-TA

A Drug Abuse Education Program will be conducted for parents, students and teachers on Monday night, December 14 at 7:30 p.m. at the Wheeler High School Auditorium.

Mrs. Richard Brown, program chairman for the Wheeler P-TA pointed out that parents of our youngsters generally are confident that their youngsters will resist temptation to experiment with drugs.

She noted, however, that complacency has no place in fighting the problems of drug addiction which now affects more than 500,000 people who are obtaining drugs illegally and depend upon them to get through the day. She emphasized that this will be a very special meeting that will be of interest to everyone in the county. A special invitation will be given to all students as well as adults.

"Knowing the Facts About Drugs, the Consequences of Experimentation and Addiction" will be the topic discussed by Ronald Roberts, Coordinator of the Drug Abuse Team from Amarillo.

Roberts is coordinator of the Amarillo Drug Abuse School, sponsored by the Amarillo Police Department which is financed by W. J.

Helm, owner of Plains College. This program is approved by Operation Drug Alert.

Mr. Roberts holds a BS in Animal Science from Texas A&M University and a degree in Biochemistry from the University of Texas at Austin.

Before accepting his position, Mr. Roberts was Assistant County Agent of Potter County which time he developed a 4H Drug Abuse Team program enlisted the help of the police. After the program, the youths themselves passed on information to teens. As a result of the work and others in West Virginia, Tennessee and the 4H drug abuse Education Program is getting high priority in 4H work on the National level.

Mr. Roberts was contacted through the Wheeler County Agricultural Agent, Max Miller for this program. Informing our county youth on dangers of experimentation with habit forming drugs project encouraged by the County Rural Development Committee and the Co. Program Building Committee. Again, let us stress that invitation is extended to adults and students in Wheeler County to attend this very informative meeting.

November 15-20. Sergeant Leatherman is a jet engine mechanic on the hand-picked team that will support the B-52 Stratofortress bomber crew from the 804th Combat Support Group at Grand Forks AFB, N. D. He was selected on the basis of his technical skill, proficiency and outstanding performance.

Fifty-five SAC aircraft and crews, along with three Royal Air Force (Great Britain) teams, will be competing in the "world series of bombing and navigation".

SAC's newest bomber—the General Dynamics FB-111—is making its debut in the competition. Two of the supersonic bombers and two-man crews will match their bombing and navigation skill against 24 B-52, 29 KC-135 Stratotanker and three British delta-wing Vulcan bomber crews.

Each bomber team will fly two scored missions and will be judged on navigation coupled with simulated bombing from both low and high altitudes. Tanker crews will fly one mission, vying only for navigation honors.

The crew with the highest point total in combined bombing and navigation will win the coveted Fairchild Trophy. The Saunders Trophy will go



Wayne Leatherman to the tanker team compiling the most points in navigation. "Bombing targets" for the bombers will be located near Wheatley, Ark., and Arcadia, La., and accuracy of simulated bomb releases will be computed by mobile radar scoring units.
