"Texas" Begins Sixth Season

The deep roots which the Pioneer Amphitheatre and the "Texas" production have in the Panhandle showed June 24th, at the opening of the sixth season of the show. Thirty-four cities sent their mayors or mayors pro-tem to celebrate the tenth anniversary of work on the project. Most of the same cities sent people to break the ground for the theatre in 1962 and ten of the original mayors returned to be especially honored. These were John A. Williams of Canyon, R.A. Armitage of Vega, Tom Daughtry of Wheeler, S.W. Ross of Floydada, R.K. Fleming of Friona, and Robert Eastman of White Deer. They received certificates of recognition.
The thirty-four mayors who were represented had an additional honor. Introduced by Joe Gidden, first vice-president of the Texas Panhandle Heritage Foundation, they were greeted by Dean Kelley who plays Uncle Henry in the "Texas" musical drama. He made them honorary mayors of Henryanna, Texas the imaginary town in the show. Max Sherman, state senator, assisted by Tom Christian, representative, presented them with certificates designating them with the honor, and they were congratulated by state representatives Ben Bynum and Byron Poff.
The sixth version of the "Texas" production delighted its audience which filled the theatre.
The opening chorus brought a gasp of delight when it burst on the stage dressed in colors of the canyon, an innovation this year. Among the other new things, was a restyled ranch house, a dug out door used for entrances and exits, a complete change of the letter-writing scene, and some trick roping in the finale, and the introduction of the train's new name P-VINE.

ARMY COMMENDATION MEDAL Maj. Bobby Helton Receives Medal

The Secretary of the Army has awarded the Army Commendation Medal, Third Bronze Oak Leaf Cluster, to Major Bobby K. Helton, Medical Service Corps, United States Army, distinguished himself by exceptionally meritorious service directed toward the completion of the Administrative Residency, United States Army Training Center Engineer and Fort Leonard Wood, Fort Leonard Wood, Missouri, from 15 June 1970 to 15 May 1971.
Major Helton's performance in his residency was characterized by outstanding professional qualities and high personal standards of efficiency and diligence which contributed materially to the overall accomplishment of the mission of the United States General Wood Army Hospital. He was frequently the subject of high praise from Division and Service Chiefs whom he assisted during his administrative rotation, especially for his devotion to duty, administrative acumen, and his unique ingenuity in the application of hospital administration principles to problem solving techniques. Major Helton was instrumental in the establishment and implementation of a system of Committee Organizations to comply with stringent requirements of the Joint Commission on the Accreditation of Hospitals. Major Helton's distinguished performance was in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service and reflects great credit upon himself, Fort Leonard Wood, and the United States Army.

Postal Service Takes Over

The inauguration of the new United States Postal service will be observed on Thursday July 1, 1971 by the Wheeler, Briscoe and Allison Post Offices, along with the Postal Department in Washington D.C. and every other Post Office in the United States. Postmasters Hiram Whitener, Dorothy Walker of Briscoe and Vance Boydston of Allison have announced that all members of the community are invited to visit their local post office on July 1st and enjoy the hospitality of the men and women who comprise the new U.S. Postal Service.
Dedication ceremonies in Washington will be hosted by Postmaster General Blount. Honored guests at the dedication will include members of Congress, former Postmasters General, the Board of Governors of the new Postal Service and their wives, as well as Assistant

Postmasters General, Headquarters personnel and other dignitaries.
Visitors to the post office will be given a souvenir envelope imprinted with the old and new insignia of the Postal Service. This envelope will also be made available in limited numbers as a first day cancellation-for just the cost of an 8¢ stamp by stamping and cancelling

half of the souvenir envelopes in advance. This will be the first time First Day Covers have been available in all U.S. Post Offices.
A photographic display of modern Postal Service jobs and functions will help visitors learn more about the men and women of the Postal Service and how each mail user can help them to serve the community better.

Summertime is barbecue time! Everyone knows that, but did you know that Hai-

tians used to sleep on their "barbecues!"

The word as we know it seems to have its origin in a Haitian term "Barbacoa" from the Spanish meaning "a rude framework of stocks set on posts... whether for cooking or sleeping."

Another origin possibility might be from the French "barbe-a-gueule", meaning from snout to tail!, this term referring to a whole animal roasted or broiled in its entirety for a feast, or the feast at which such meat is served.

No matter where it came from, the institution of the American barbecue has become quite a tradition. Whether it was the Indians who propped a carcass upon a stick platform and roasted it, or a family who tantalizes the neighborhood with the

smells of barbecued burgers, the outdoor cooking method does something to the flavor of anything prepared in this way.

In recent years, the outdoor

preparation of meals has become increasingly popular, and the principle of the elegant barbecue feast has been simplified to fit the smallest suburban yard. The

home barbecue varies from a hooded or open portable grill to an elaborately constructed fireplace with ovens and flues.

And whichever method you prefer, the array of meat available for outdoor cooking goes beyond steaks and hamburgers to include chicken, turkey, chops, kabobs, sausage products, rotisserie roasts, and frankfurters, plus any other high quality meat that is satisfactory for dryheat cookery.

It is necessary for you to know meat cuts to guide you in methods of outdoor cookery. Meat selection is easier if you look for the U.S. Department of Agriculture inspection stamp for wholesomeness and take advantage of grades for quality guidance.

USDA's Consumer and Marketing Service recommends turkeys, which are plentiful this month, for your outdoor eating enjoyment.

The outdoor chef can make the meat dish unique by concocting a specialty barbecue sauce or marinade with a gourmet touch. Try your hand (or your husband's hand) with the following superb sauce ideas. They go great with turkey.

Try this SUPERB BARBECUE SAUCE on grilled turkey pieces, and serve extra with turkey at the table.

- 1/4 cup vinegar
- 1/2 cup water
- 1/4 cup brown sugar
- 1 tablespoon prepared mustard
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/8 teaspoon cayenne pepper
- 1 thick lemon slice
- 1 onion, sliced
- 1/4 cup butter or margarine
- 1/2 cup catsup
- 1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce
- 1 1/2 teaspoons liquid smoke

In saucepan, mix all ingredients but the liquid smoke. Simmer, uncovered, for 20 minutes. Add smoke; bring to a boil. Brush on turkey while cooking. (Makes 1-1/4 cups.)

LEMON, BARBECUE SAUCE
It is a tangy complement to cup-up turkey, and this recipe makes enough for a 4 to 6 pound turkey.

- 1 clove garlic, minced
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/3 cup oil
- 1 cup lemon juice
- 1/4 cup chopped onion
- 1/2 teaspoon pepper
- 1 teaspoon thyme

Combine all ingredients and blend well. Refrigerate 8 hours. Baste turkey parts with lemon juice while cooking, turning often.

If you like the lemon idea, why not try Lemon Herb Sauce at another time.

- Combine 1 cup peanut oil,
- 1 cup lemon juice, 1/2 cup finely crumbled blue cheese, 1 mashed garlic clove, 1 teaspoon dried rosemary, 1/2 teaspoon each dried mint leaves and salt, and coarsely ground black pepper as desired.

Across the Fence

 Cotton and milo are up to good stands in most parts of the county. Now's a good time to cut Lovegrass hay. We figure you need to have the grass tender to keep your cattle doing well. Even an unfertilized grass, they'll gain if it's kept tender.
 We now have an entomologist to help folks with insect problems. He's been transferred to the Amarillo area from Lubbock. He's Bill Clyner who helped us with our "dust bag" work on horn fly control a few years ago. From the interest you folks showed in this demonstration, I'm sure Bill will be most helpful in his new location.

Top 4 H Horsemen in County to Vie in District Show
 The top 4-H horsemen in Wheeler County will be vying for honors in the Extension District 1 4-H Horse Show at Amarillo, July 8 and 9 with hopes of qualifying for state competition.
 The district show will be held in the Bill Cody Arena at the State Fair Grounds in Amarillo.
 Halter classes and showmanship will be judged on July 8 beginning at 10 a.m. while the performance classes will be judged the following day starting at 9 a.m. Entries will be verified from 8 to 9:30 a.m. on July 8.
 Some 174 entries are expected from 4-H boys and girls in the 22 Panhandle counties in the district. Official show judge will be Mrs. R.C. Jones of Tatum, New Mexico.
 The top 20 contestants from

the district-wide show will be eligible to compete in the State 4-H Horse Show which will be held July 29-31 in the Will Rogers Coliseum in Fort Worth.
 Wheeler County 4-Hers who will be competing in the upcoming district show are Judy Parker, Janice Bachmann, Regina Bachmann, Rhonda Bachmann, Mark Knoll, Crystal Bradstreet, and Charlotte Smith.
 If county livestock producers give special attention to harvesting good-quality hay at the right time, they will find out that this means extra dollars when the hay is fed next season.
 Two main factors that determine the quality of hay are the amount of fertilizer it receives and the age of the crop when it is harvested.
 A soil test is the best indicator of what nutrients are needed to produce abundant amounts of hay crops. If no tests were made earlier in the year, and present growth of forage or yields from first cuttings are not up to par despite fertilization, a soil test should be considered.
 While nitrogen influences protein content, phosphorus, potassium, and other nutrients also help to improve protein and the quality of hay. After baling, an immediate topdress with fertilizer will aid in faster, high quality regrowth.
 Delaying harvest of hay will result in an increased tonnage, mostly in the form of stalk and fiber, but overall quality will be lowered.
 Johnsongrass, sudan hybrids, and Love grasses which produce seedheads should be cut before the seedheads emerge. Crops such as Midland Bermuda grass should be cut when the growth is about four weeks old or less. Plan to cut alfalfa when it's one-tenth to one-fourth in bloom.
 Cutting hay at these stages gives the highest production a total digestible nutrients (TDN).
 Another important point to remember in producing high quality hay is to start baling as soon as possible after cutting. A hay conditioner may be helpful in hurrying up the drying process.
