Grass is one of the most effective pollution control and air conditioning devices that nature has to offer.

"One acre of grass releases about 2,400 gallons of water on a summer day throu- food and cover for more kinds ah evaporation and transpiration," according to Bill Brooks, head of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Sail Conservation Service office in Wheeler.

"This much evaporation equals the cooling effect of a life and livestock that can 70-ton air conditioner," Brooks be planted in range seeding continued. "And grass is ideal for erosion control, beautification, and animal forage."

Brooks said grasses vary widely within individual species. There may be dozens of strains of side-oats grama, for example, growing within an area of only a few counties. These variations are caused by differences in climate, soils, elevation and other factors.

SCS conducts a constant search for superior strains of grasses and other plants, Brooks said.

"What we're looking for are strains of grasses that will help solve some specific environmental problems," Brooks explained. "In Texas in Central Texas, It is used we need grasses that will thrive on several drouthy



the open? But, do you know if the hamburger is safe to eat? With warm weather and the exodus outdoors, the potential danger of food poisoning accompanies every outdoor meal, be it a backyard picnic or a camping cookout, says USDA's Consumer and Marketing Service.

Germs capable of causing severe gastrointestinal upsets thrive in perishable foods which have not been properly or adquately refrigerated. Common sense and careful handling can prevent a dis-

Cold foods should be kept cold-below 40 degrees F. - and hot foods should be kept hot-above 140 degrees F. Bacteria and micro-organisms which produce harmful toxins grow most rapidly in food that is just warm, not hot or cold.

This moderate temperature is ideal for the rapid reproduction of Salmonellae, Perfringens, Staphyloccocus, and Botulinum bacteria. Most of the disease-carrying organisms can be eliminated by keeping foods at recommended temperature.

Bacteria grow best in nonacidic foods like meats, fish, poultry items, eggs, dairy products, and foods made from them. Particularly susceptible are recipes of finely chopped foods made

finely chopped foods such as chicken or potato salad, meat or egg sand wich fillings, casseroles, and cream, custard, or meringue pies. All of these foods must be kept very cold until eating time, and that does not mean sticking them in a box or

basket and packing them in the trunk of the car.

There are inexpensive ways to keep foods cold-properly packed in an ice chest or in dry ice packs. Empty milk cartons, coffee cans or other containers with tightfitting lids can be filled with water and frozen for use in ice chest; a plastic bag filled with ice cubes placed in a sturdy container will cool foods and the cubes can be used at campsite. Cubes, loose or in plastic bags, and ice in cartons should be distributed evenly throughout the cooler.

Inexpensive insulated coolers can be purchased, or a simple cooler-carrier can be made out of two cardboard boxes. One should be smal-

ler than the other, with a lid. Put at least a half inch thickness of newspapers on the bottom of the larger box and set the smaller one inside. Line newspapers between the sides of the two boxes. Put in chilled food and ice, then close the small box lid. Keep all coolers out of

direct sunlight! It is so much easier to take the precautions before you fird out how the bacteria can affect the potato salad or the deviled eggs!. Food poisoning is not funny.

There are about 20,000 cases probably exceeds two million. The very young and the elderly are more suscep-

tible because of their lower resistance.

Both staphylococcal poisoning, know as "Staph", and perfringens poisoning cause vomiting, diarrhea and acute stomach cramps, but may be prevented by correct food handling.

Botulism, the rarest type of food poisoning in the United States, is also the deadliest.

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

Upstream Flood

Temple. The 1,500th upstream flood prevention dam to be built in Texas was contracted for construction this week, reports State Conservationist Clyde W. Graham of the USDA Soil Conservation Service.

East Fork Construction Company of Seagoville was low bidder for the contract. The dam is Site No 13 in the Hickory Creek watershed near Denton. The Hickory Creek project will pro-

vide flood prevention and recreation for the City of Denson while protecting cropland, roads, bridges and other property in the watershed. The dam will be the sixth in a series of 16 to be built in the watershed.

The project, including conservation land treatment in the watershed, is expected to keep 58,000 tons of sediment out of Garza-Little Elm Reservoir each year when completed. Garza-Little Elm serves as a water supply for Denton, Dallas and other cities in North Texas.

"The 1,500th dam marks another milestone in the watershed approach to resource management in Texas," Graham said. "Up stream watershed projects have vast environmental benefits; they not only cut flood damages but they also reduce erosion and sediment damage. And sediment is still our state's biggest pollutant. It fills lakes, streams and harbors; it kills fish and ruins their spawning grounds. Graham said watershed lakes also provide recreation areas while creating new fish and wildlife habitat.

The Hickory Creek project includes two lakes planned above the City of Denton which will supplement the city's long range recreation and flood control program. The city is buying land around the proposed lakes which will be converted into a 327-acre regional park. The city is working with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department in developing

the park. The creek below the park area runs through Denton and has a long history of flooding. The city has widened and concrete lined part of the creek to reduce flooding. The city has widened and concrete lined part of the creek to reduce flooding however rapid urban growth has intensified runoff, making the channel capacity inadequate. Massive expansion of the creek channel would be needed without the two

upstream watershed lakes. Jim White, City Manager for the City of Denton, says the Hickory Creek project will save the city several million dollars. Without the watershed project, he says engineering consultants estimate it would cost the city \$17 million to widen and concrete line the channel

sufficiently to provide adequate flood protection. 'We're not only saving money through the watershed project," he pointed out, 'but we'll also have a beautiful regional park with two watershed lakes. On top of that, the project will reduce flooding, erosion, and sedment damage which will bene fit our city as well as the

entire Trinity basin." State Conservationist Graham said some 2,200 upstream watershed lakes have been planned in Texas in 118 watershed projects now in operation. The projects usually include a combination of stepped up soil and water conservation work in the watershed plus a series of dams to retard floodwater during heavy rains. Sediment storage space is provided in reservoir areas which form small lakes averaging 15 to

25 acres in size. Other measures which can be included in upstream watershed projects include treating critically gullies areas, municipal water supply storage space, floodwater diversions, and cleaning out sidiment-choked stream chan-
