

Using wide strips of black plastic in your garden can cut down weeding time, conserve moisture, and lead to cleaner fruit and vegetables. To use the plastic, hoe up

all weeds, lay the plastic piece in place and cover the edges with dirt. If the garden is up, you will have to work the plastic around the plants. One of the secrets to success with the plastic

is to punch holes in it with a potato fork, or something about this size, in order to get moisture into the soil. The plastic is also excellent to use in ornamental ner layer of bark can then be used around the shrubs, flowers, and bushes.

Gardeners will be limited to the flat areas of the yard when doing this because the bark will tend to wash off plastic undercoatings on steep ground.

Black plastic is fairly inexpensive and can be obtained in most garden supply stores or lumber yards. We've tried it on some of our result demonstration work on watermelons and find it fairly satisfactory. However, the hailstorm we had in June, knocked holes in it the size of your fist.
