

gardening fever will be on the

Raising your own vegetable garden not only can save on the grocery bill but can assure an abundance of nut; ritious foods for your family. Selecting adapted vegetable varieties is a jajor table varieties is a major step in successful gardening. Just as much time is involved, plus labor and an expense, to produce a crop using poorly adapted varieties as it does with proved ones. Plants cost little or no more for the varieties that will do best in our area.

Vegetable seed left over from the previous year may or may not be satisfactory for planting. It depends upon the kind of seed and how it was stored. Most unused seed should be stored cool and dry. It's usually cheaper to get seed each year from a reliable seed company.

Soil moisture at planting time is an important factor in getting a good stand. It may be necessary to soak the seedbeds before planting if soil moisture is short. Planting seed should also be treated with the recommended materials to help insure stands of vigorous growing plants. Purchasing healthy plants already growing that can be set directly in the garden is a practice catching

on rapidly.

Once the plants are growing good management will insure a longer producing season and vegetables the like of which are hard to find in

the grocery stores. Grasshopper Alert-A survery made last fall showed more than 2.3 million acres of crop and rangeland, mostly on the High and Rolling Plains of Texas, could suffer severe infestations of grasshoppers this spring. Reed Green, Extension survey entomologist, advises farmers and ranchers in the area to keep a close watch on the situation, especially if weather conditions are favorable for a good hatch and survival during the hopper hatching season-April-June.

exas Cattle Numbers Continue Up-For the sixth consecutive year, the number of cattle in Texas on January 1, 1971 was up, this time by three percent. At the same time, the Texas Crop and Livestok and Livestock Reporting Service released figures on the 1970 calf and lamb crops. For the first time since 1961 lamb and sheep numbers were up by two percent. The

calf cro rwas estimated at 5.4 million head in 1970. Texas cattle on feed on Feb. numbered 1.6 million head, 12 percent above a year ear-Peach Disease Common-Regardless of whether peach

SCIL AND WATER Conservation

Is wind erosion important? Ask any housewife that has to clean up the after effects of blowing dust and pay high prices for food produced on worn out land. Mhen one considers the proven fact that on a day when a slight haze is in the air there is enough soil suspended in the air to a height of one mile over a section of land to cover an area of 60 acres to a depth of one foot. This: soil would weigh 126,000 tons. The allowable soil loss from one acre for a year in order to maintain fertility and adequate depth for lasting production is five tons. This would mean that 25,200 acres have, in one slight dust storm, lost the allowable five tons per

We also know that the dust that is suspended is made up of smaller particles and is very high in organic matter. When we lose our organic matter and smaller soil particles we change the texture of the soil, reduce the fertility and lose the ability to produce. This can be seen in the dune areas in our sandy soils 1.

In reducing wind erosion we cannot control the mois ture and temperature of our natural climate. We can control the roughness and ridges in our fields with emergency tillage in dry seasons. The best way for land users of the Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation District to control wind erosion is to prepare a means of control before the wind starts. This can be done by having our land protected by wind breaks; close spaced high residue pro-ducing crops and leaving large amounts of residue on the land.
