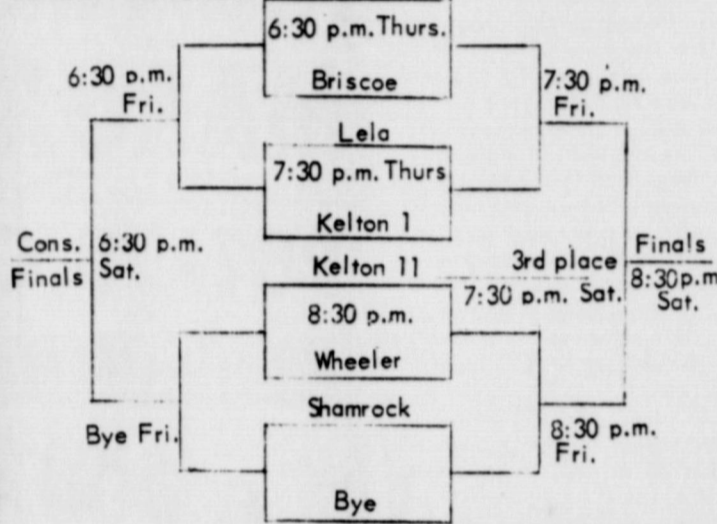

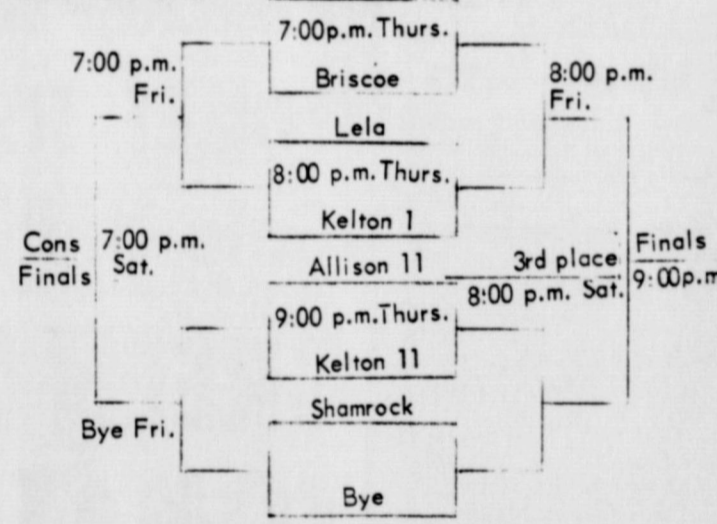

In continuation of the articles about cleaning products, here's some information on detergents.

You can tell that a product contains a detergent when some suds appear. Chiefly, detergents help loosen dirt from surfaces. If complex soluble phosphates called builders have been added to a detergent, it has greater ability to remove oily dirt. When a builder has been added, the product is marked "heavy duty" or "all purpose."

The USDA has reported that supplies of the many pork cuts are plentiful now. Here's a recipe using pork, which you might like to try.
HAM PIE WITH CHEESE BISCUITS
1 can (10 1/2 oz.) cream of mushroom or celery soup, condensed.
1 3/4 cup light cream
1/4 cup sliced mushrooms

1/2 teaspoon salt
2 teaspoons onion, finely chopped
1/2 Teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
2 cups diced, cooked ham
2 2/3 cups slightly cooked cauliflower, drained
1 1/2 cups cooked or canned peas, drained
1 cup biscuit mix
1/3 cup milk
3/4 cup finely shredded Cheddar cheese
Combine soup, cream, mushrooms, salt, onion, Worcestershire sauce, ham, cauliflower, and peas in a three-quart saucepan. Set aside.

Combine biscuit mix, milk and 1/2 cup cheese. Roll out on a lightly-floured surface into an 8x6 rectangle. Sprinkle with 1/4 cup cheese. Roll up from short side and seal edges by pressing dough together. Slice into

half-inch pinwheels. Preheat oven to 425F. Grease a 1 1/2 quart casserole. Heat the mixture in the saucepan to bubbling, over low heat. Pour into casser-

ole. Arrange biscuit pinwheels about a half-inch apart on top of hot filling. Bake for about 15 minutes, or until biscuits are lightly browned. Makes six servings.

Across the Fence

enjoyed while at their best to insure the success of your project. Use the flowering annuals for borders along the fence, at the side of the house or around the patio. Beds should contain fertile, well drained soil. If it is poorly drained, consider using redwood or brick edging to raise the bed level above the surrounding area. Broadcast a 12-12-12 fertilizer or its equivalent over the bed at a rate of 2 to 3 pounds per 100 square feet and work it into the upper 6 inches of soil. Place the plants in the beds in an irregular pattern or in a design. The design should first be worked out on paper. The taller plants should be placed in the middle. Provide adequate moisture after the plants are set for continued growth but avoid over watering. The soil should not remain saturated with water. Fertilize the plants every 3 to 4 weeks at the rate of 1 1/2 to 2 pounds per 100 square ft. Finally, for the beautiful flowers desired, insects and diseases must be controlled.

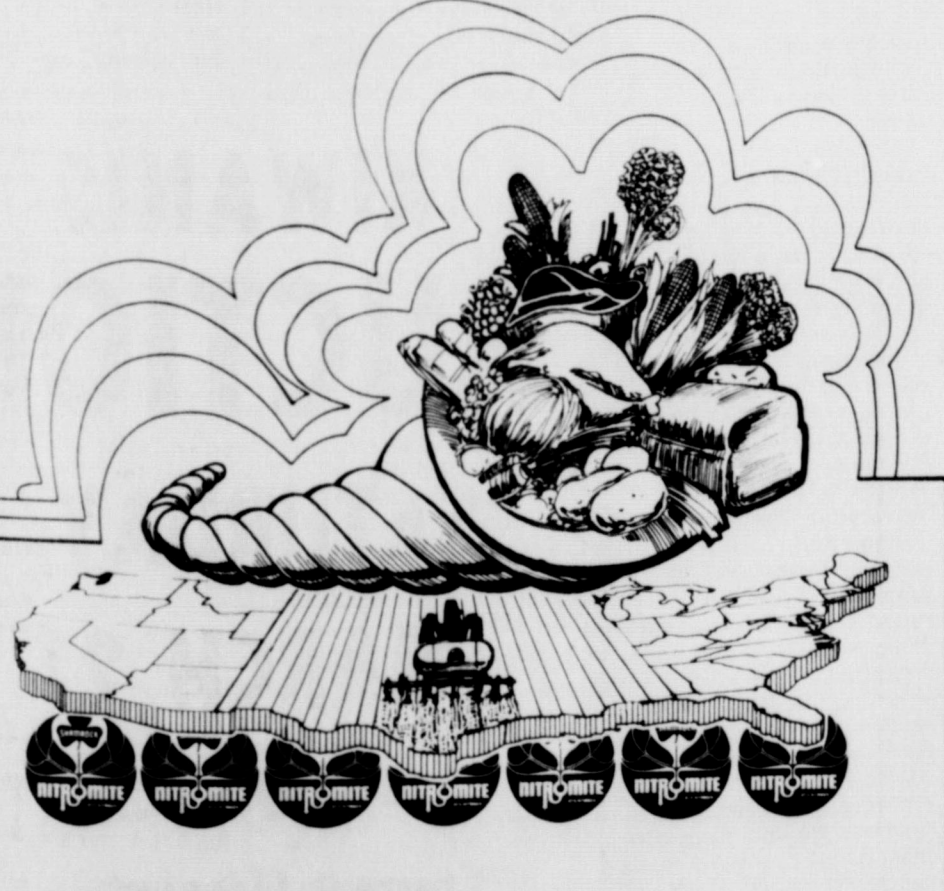
