## Cholera Means State Quarentene

The Texas Animal Health Commission has ordered a state-poide quarentine on the movement or sale for movement of all hogs except for purposes of slauchter. This quarantine shall be effective March 29, 1971, and shall continue in force and effect for sixty (60) days. This quarantine was placed to help eradicate hog cholera from our state. Similar actions has been taken in other states that

are now free of cholera. Hogs for slaughter can move to a packing house or to a market without a per-mit. The important thing to remember is that any hog leaving a farm without a permit will have to be slauantered. We suggest that producers take only market type hogs to a market.

Hogs may be moved from one farm to another with no diversion in route if they are inspected and are accompanied by a permit to move. Movement permits may be issued by representatives of the Texas animal health commission, which includes all local veternarians who can issue permits. We have the permit forms at our office.

During 1971 many Wheeler County farmers may consider planting guar as an alternative crop on setaside acres and taking less

government payment. Listed below are the major points to consider in plant-

ing guar on set-aside acres:
1. Guar may be planted for harvest on set-aside acres. At the time of certification the farm operator will designate the exact location of his setaside acreage.

2. Guar cannot be harvested on conserving base ocres.

3. There will be a flat reduction rate of \$10.00 per acre for all acres of setaside which are harvested. 4. Dates for 1971 are not




