CITY COUNCIL Winslow, Markham Installed

The Wheeler City Council met Monday, April 19 in the city office. Two new council members took the oath of office. Mayor Pete Burton administered the oath of office to Glenn Markham and J. Robert Winslow, newly elected councilmen. John C. Vise, who begins his third term on the council was unable to be present. Commission assignments were given the councilmen. Robert Denson will serve as Mayor Pro-tem and be in charge of the Water and Sewer Department; Louis Stas, Fire Department and Dump Grounds; John C. Vise, Streets and Airport; Glenn Markham, Transportation; and Dr. Winslow, Park and Swimming Pool. Warren Phillips met with the council for the signing of the contract for the operation of the swimming pool. Phillips will be in charge of the operation of the pool beginning Tuesday, June 1. Rules and regulations and admission will remain the same as they have been in the past. The council voted to endorse a Rabies Clinic for Wheeler. The clinic will be held by Dr. William Breeding of Miami. It is slated for Saturday, May 1. Charles Gregg of Shamrock was hired to clean the pool and prepare it for opening. The meeting adjourned.

HIRAM WHITENER IS NAMED POSTMASTER FOR WHEELER OFFICE

The appointment of Hiram Whitener as Postmaster at Wheeler, Texas, effective April 17, 1971 was announced by W.L. Crawford, Regional Director for the two state Dallas Region of the U.S. Postal Service. Hiram has served as "Officer in Charge" of the Wheeler Post Office since the retirement last August of Postmaster Virgil Jamison, Jr. Hiram, who is 46, is a career postal employee with 20 years service. He began as temporary substitute postal clerk in October, 1950, and was promoted to a regular position in 1958.

Whitener, a veteran of World War II, having served three years in the Army Air Force, is an active member of the community. He is presently a member of the Chamber of Commerce, Masonic Lodge and Baptist Church, and presently in the Kiwanis.

Whitener has served on the Wheeler Volunteer Fire Department and City Council. As a Charter Member of the North Wheeler County Hospital District, he served as secretary and treasurer. Whitener's appointment brings to 193 the number of postmasters named so far by Postmaster General Winston M. Blount in the Dallas Region under the new, non-political, merit system established by the Postal Reorganization Act of 1970. Recommendations for postmaster appointments are made by a Regional Management Selection Board and do not require Senate confirmation. DALE RICHESON SPEAKS AT CHAMBER MEETING

Dale Richeson, head of personnel and public relations with Natural Gas Pipeline, addressed the regular monthly meeting of the Wheeler Chamber of Commerce. The meeting was held in the Production Credit Meeting Room Tuesday evening. Richeson covered the highlights in the history of the 40 year old company, NGPL. From its beginning in 1931 with the laying of 900 miles of line, the company now delivers 4.3 billion cubic feet of gas daily. The local NGPL plant was established in Wheeler in 1956. The company has approximately 14 full time employees who live in Wheeler. The annual payroll for last year for the local plant was \$101,485. Last year, NGPL paid \$125,000 in county taxes. NGPL encourages its employees to become active in the community and the company whenever possible offers time, labor and money toward community projects. In closing, Richeson stated, "Natural Gas Pipeline is happy to be a part of this community." A film, "84 Hours" was shown. The film produced by NGPL shows the activities of the company in taking the gas from the wells and delivering it to the customer. 84 hours are required from the time the gas enters the lines until it is delivered to the user.

N.G.P.L. To Give Safety Awards

Awards for on-the-job safety performance will be presented to area employees of Natural Gas Pipeline Company of America during a program April 22 at the company's Briscoe facilities. The awards are presented annually to employees and work crews in 10 states in recognition of individual and group achievement for having worked safely during 1970 without experiencing a disabling injury from a job-related accident. Natural, a subsidiary of Peoples Gas Company of Chicago, each year moves more than trillion cubic feet of natural gas energy through its transmission system for delivery to Chicago and Midwest markets. Last year Natural ranked among the top pipeline companies in the United States for the fewest lost-time accidents per man hours worked. Donald W. Reeves of Wheeler will be honored at Briscoe for 10-years' continuous service without a disabling accident. One-year awards will be presented to Terry D. Hardy of Fritch, and Jerry D. Weidner, Doyle E. Pond and Thomas R. Atwood of Wheeler. The Wheeler pipeline and measurement departments and the Briscoe purification plant crew will be honored for having no disabling accidents during 1970. This marks the 19th consecutive year the measurement crew has worked safely, and the 13th consecutive year for the pipeline department.

F.L.B. Loan Rates Reduced

Jack L. Williams, Manager of the Federal Land Bank Association of Shamrock announced today that the Federal Land Bank of Houston will reduce the interest Billing rate on variable rate loans to 7 1/2%. "This reduction will be effective on installments maturing on or after June 1, 1971 and affects more than \$110 million in variable rate loans to over 3200 Texas farmers and ranchers," Williams stated. The variable rate loans, which was introduced by the Houston Bank in July 1969, lets the interest rate "float" over the variations in the money market. This is the second time since January 1 that the billing rate has been reduced and the third such reduction in the past year. "This action is in line with the Bank's policy in providing farmers and ranchers credit at the lowest possible cost consistent with sound business practices," Williams stated. The Federal Land Bank of Houston makes long term real estate loans on farms and ranches throughout Texas. The Bank has over \$540 million in volume of loans outstanding. The local association makes and services loans in Wheeler and Collingsworth Counties. Member of the local board of directors are J.C. 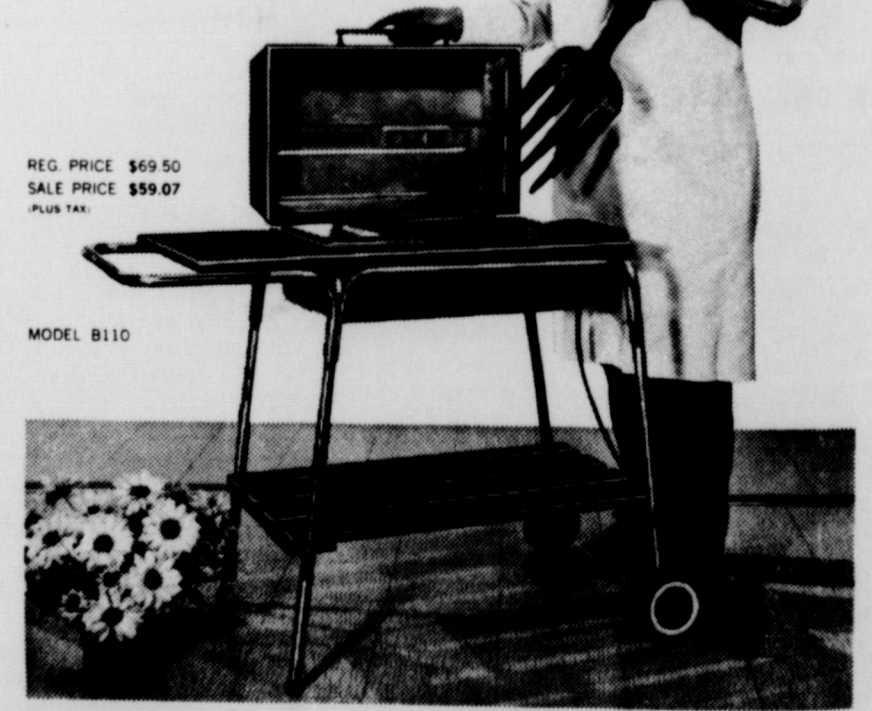

Across the Fence

Well, we've mused through the "Ides of March", including the snow and the dust; and are now up to the official beginning of spring. The thought of the coming of spring is a pretty good 'sulfur and molasses' tonic in itself. For most it not only gladdens the heart but quickens the pulse, sharpens one's intentions, and firms up every one's resolutions producing a flood of ideas and plans. How many of these ideas are put into practice in the days ahead depends on how well you make good on your planning efforts. As the old saying goes, "The road to Hades is paved with good intentions". You don't have to wait 'til you get there to find out. I've seen a lot of ranches with a heavier stand of good intentions than grass, and somehow those intentions don't have a very high conversion ratio into pounds of beef.

For one thing, nature hasn't cooperated with us too well in providing rainfall to grow grass. Another thing is that a lot of folks haven't made any provision for cross fencing so one area of their pasture can recover while the cattle are grazing on the other part. If there's anything our beef cattle re-

search has pointed up that I'd recommend following, it's crossfencing to allow for rotation. I'm not advocating everyone getting a claw hammer and cedar posts and taking to the fields, but you know where a crossfence needs to be. This is one practice I believe will help you fight the drought and let your grass recover.

On top of the drought, it looks like we're going to have a good grasshopper buildup. Right now our entomologists tell us there are eight or more grasshoppers per square yard, are found. We suggest farmers and ranchers keep a close eye on these grasshoppers. We've seen the time when a dollars worth of insecticide was worth three dollars of fertilizer, cause what's the need to fertilize if the hoppers eat the grass anyway?

Clyde Carruth, Superintendent of the Top O' Texas Junior Livestock Show, tells us that calves for next year's Pampa show will have to weigh 825 pounds and will have to weigh 850 pounds for the 1973 show.

The drought has got a lot of farmers thinking about irrigation. In most cases, a minimum investment of \$10 to \$15,000 initially is required. This will amount to nearly \$100 an acre in some installations. John Manning, Farmers Home Administration Supervisor, reports that his agency would be very much interested in assisting farmers in securing money for this type of project. He also said something we weren't aware of; a farmer needing loan money doesn't have to be unable to get money from somewhere else to qualify. By mentioning something like this in our column, we are not purposely repeating Will Roger's jibes at government efforts to help farmers when he said, "Mr. Coolidge told the farmers, 'we can't help you make any more money, but we will show you where you can owe some more'."

Any more, I'm a little more conservative on advice. Four years ago, I told a farmer here that the hog business was good, most folks listened until hogs got down to 15 cents. We have a new bulletin entitled, "Raising Channel Catfish in Cages". This bulletin is available at our office and it illustrates, with blueprints, an interesting new way to raise catfish. We understand that this practice has proven to be economically feasible.
