Postage Increase Goes Into Effect Sunday, May 16

Postmaster Hiram Whitener said today that increases in most postage rates will take effect May 16 as the new United States Postal Service begins its task of achieving self-sufficiency as required by the Postal Reorganization Act. Whitener noted that general postage rates have been increased since 1967 when Congress passed what was to become its final legislative act in this respect.

He pointed out that, earlier, requests for rate increases were proposed to Congress in 1969 by both President Johnson and President Nixon. In addition, President Nixon proposed an increase again in 1970, although none of the proposed increases was acted upon by Congress. Mr. Whitener explained that the new increases—authorized on a temporary basis until the newly created Postal Service on permanent changes—will raise first-class letter rates from 6 to 8 cents on an ounce, and airmail letter rates from 10 to 11 cents on an ounce. Post cards will go from 5 to 6 cents each and airmail post cards will go from 8 to 9 cents. The increases will be borne more by business than by individuals, the postmaster pointed out, since about 75 percent of first class and airmail is from commercial mailers.

Tuesday, May 18 will be election day for Texas. Voters will be going to the polls to vote on a State Ethics Commission, giving the legislature the right to propose constitutional amendments in both regular and called sessions, removing limitation on state appropriations for welfare and authorizing the issuance of \$100 million in bonds for water quality enhancement.

One of the most pressing matters before the 62nd Legislature when it convened on January 5, 1971, was the provision of sufficient funds to meet state welfare needs. Restricted by a constitutional ceiling on welfare spending from state funds, the legislature found it necessary to propose a constitutional amendment for immediate consideration by the Texas electorate to make it possible for welfare recipients to continue receiving their monthly payments.

The legislature acted promptly in proposing an amendment which would remove the ceiling from welfare expenditures for three classes of recipients—the needy aged, the needy blind, and the needy disabled. A new ceiling of \$55 million would be established by the amendment for the fourth class of recipients—needy dependent children and the caretakers of such children. Date for election on the proposed amendment, which is listed on the ballot as No. 3, was set on May 18, 1971, since that date would allow sufficient time following adoption of the proposal to provide the funds essential to carry on the welfare program.

Three additional amendments have been proposed and will also be considered at the same election. Listed below, in the order in which they will appear on the ballot, are the four proposed constitutional amendments to be considered by the Texas electorate on May 18, 1971.

AMENDMENT NO. 1
Establishing a State Ethics Commission empowered to set rules of ethics for members of the legislature, state officers, and legislative officers and to investigate violations; to recommend compensation for members of the legislature and the Lieutenant Governor; and to recommend improvements and economy in the legislative process.

AMENDMENT NO. 2
Providing that the legislature may propose amendments to the Constitution in called as well as regular sessions of the legislature.

AMENDMENT NO. 3
Removing the limitation on the total state appropriations for assistance grants for the needy aged, the needy blind, and the needy disabled, and setting a limitation on total state appropriations during a fiscal year for assistance grants for needy dependent children and the caretakers of such children.

AMENDMENT NO. 4
Authorizing the issuance of \$100 million in bonds to provide financial assistance to cities and other public agencies for water quality enhancement purposes; providing for improvement and continuance of the water resources program, and establishing an interest ceiling on Water Development Bonds at 6 percent.

When these four proposed amendments are submitted to the Texas electorate on May 18, the total of such proposals for constitutional amendments since the Constitution of 1876 was adopted will number 331. Seven amendments were proposed in 1970 and of that number five were adopted. The Texas Constitution of 1876 has now been amended 200 times.

Historical Survey Committee Meets

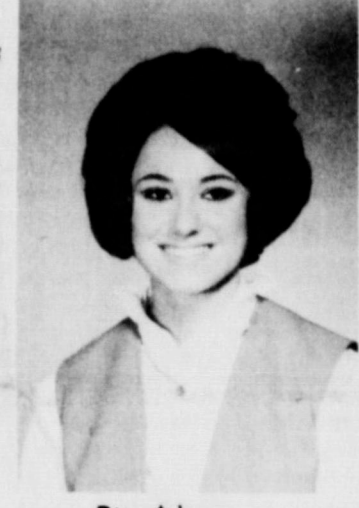

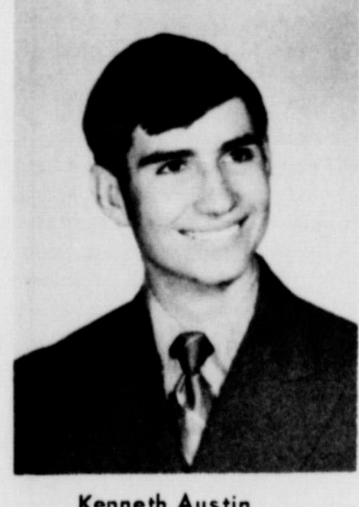

NGPL Plan To Expand Plant

Natural Gas Pipeline Co. of America is currently expanding its Buffalo Wallow gas treatment plant in Hemphill Co to increase the plant's daily processing capacity 25 percent to 250 million cubic feet. New facilities, which will be placed into operation in June at an estimated cost of \$1.9 million, will enable Natural to purchase and process larger quantities of gas from the Washeta Creek and Buffalo Wallow fields. Natural, a subsidiary of Peoples Gas Co. of Chicago, opened the Buffalo Wallow plant in February, 1969. When the expansion is completed the plant's daily processing capacity will have been increased five-fold from its original 50 million cubic feet capacity. The plant utilizes the Sulfinol process developed by Shell Development Company to remove acid gasses—carbon dioxide and hydrogen sulfide—from the raw gas. This process brings gas up to pipeline quality for more efficient transmission and ultimate consumption. Natural is the principal pipeline supplier of the four gas utilities serving the greater Chicago area, along with 44 other distribution companies in the upper Midwest.





Across the Fence

By Max Hatter C.A.A.

The dryland boys are in real trouble. If our farming and ranching operations as a whole hadn't jumped off the cliff, at least both feet have slid off and we are hanging by one hand from a very shallow rooted bush. No rain, no grass, no reserve supply of roughage or hay is the story of a drought that appears to be trying to set new records. Remember 1967? I do. It rained 3.4 inches in April 1 1/2 inches in May, and 3.7 inches in June, followed by over 6 inches in July, and nearly 4 inches in August. In 1968 it was a similar story except it rained 7.32 inches in May. So far, that's 7 more inches than we've had this month. Our situation here must be much like the farmers of the '30's. They survived by just hanging on. Many farmers have turned to irrigation and we foresee that irrigation will enable a lot of folks to continue farming in our area.

We have too many cattle for the amount of grass. Last week, we took the cattle off our grazing study plot. We know the situation Cowmen are in. Baling wheat that's not worth harvesting and grazing C-A-P and set-aside acres are measures some experienced cowmen are employing to fight the drought. None of the present government programs are going to help unless it rains. Paying 2/3 of the freight on shipped in hay sounds good, but if you have any money at all you won't qualify.

Well, the dry weather hasn't marred the home gardener's enthusiasm. Cutworms appear to be playing havoc with tomato plants lately. Tomatoes can be protected from cutworms with a strip of stiff paper wrapped around the stem. The paper collar should extend one to two inches above the soil and one to three inches below the soil to hold it in place.

May is a busy month for most of Texas gardeners regardless of the area in which they live. This year, throughout much of the state, rainfall has been

below normal during the early spring. The lack of reserve moisture in the soil has slowed down the normal rate of development of many garden plants, but especially the development of leaf size on woody trees and shrubs. To overcome this, more thought will have to be given to watering garden plants during May.

Careful attention to the moisture content of the soil is most important since many of the most popular garden subjects such as irises, roses and many permanent plantings of trees, shrubs and vines reach their peak of perfection during May.

Most gardeners are also lawn enthusiasts and proper watering must be practiced to insure maximum results in the growth and development of lawn grasses at this time.
