The symposium runs from June 7th through June 10th and will be held on the campus of the University of Texas at Austin.

Administration said today. President Nixon has asked the Congress to add \$65 million to the fund from which

Current interest rates on emergency loans are 47/8 percent, repayable as soon as possible consistent with the financial ability of borrowers, Mr. Futch said.

Application for loans should be made at county offices of Farmers Home Administration, usually located in the County seat town in which the farm property is located. The Wheeler County office is located at 112 West Oklahoma in Wheeler and the County Supervisor is John L.




