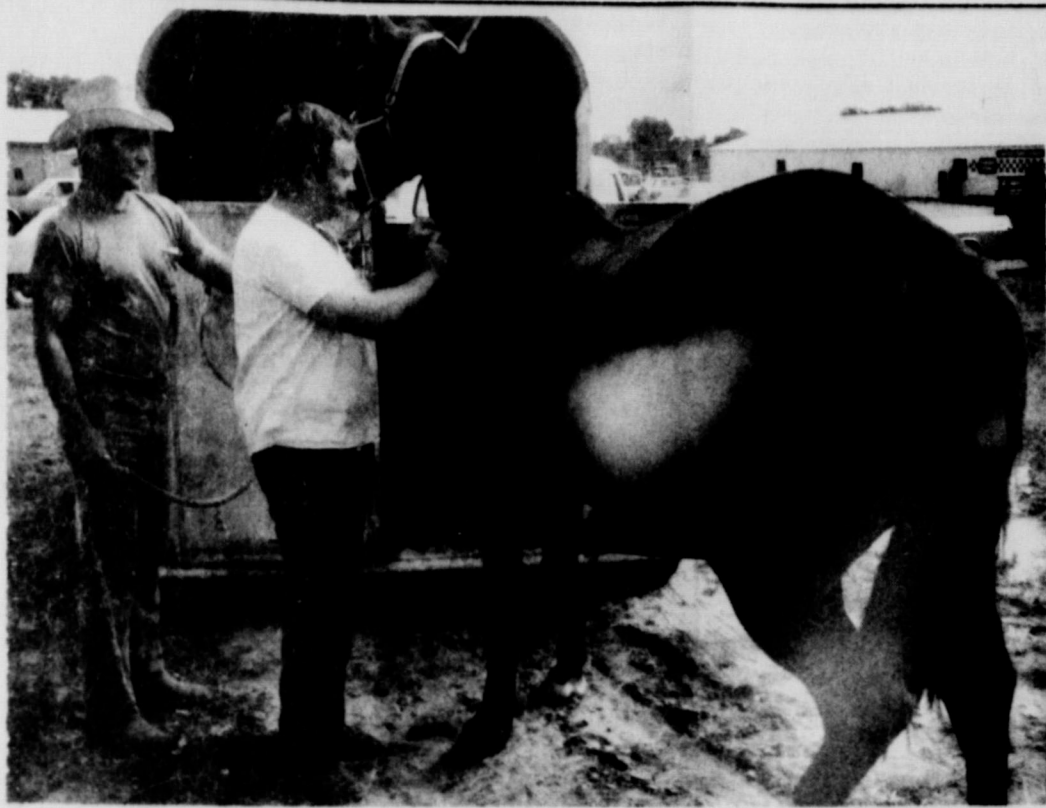

### Are You Authorized To Perform Marriage Cere.?

Are you a licensed or ordained Christian minister, a Jewish Rabbi, a Muslim cleric, or a member of a religious organization and authorized by the organization to conduct marriage ceremonies; a justice of the peace; a judge of the court of criminal appeals; a judge of the court of civil appeals; a judge of the district court or probate court; a judge of the county court of domestic relations and juvenile courts; a judge of the court of the peace, or a judge of the federal courts in this state, then you are authorized to perform such ceremonies. There are some things you should know: 1. The person who conducts the ceremony shall enter the date and time in which it was performed and his or her name in the record book. 2. The person who performed the ceremony, subscribe to the LICENSE TO RETURN TO THE COUNTY CLERK ISSUED IT within 30 days after the ceremony is performed. A person who fails to comply with this provision of this statute is guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction is punishable by a fine of less than \$200 or imprisonment for not more than 90 days, or both. There are many instances in which the person performing the ceremony has entered into the record book the name of a person instead of re-

## CITY COUNCIL

### Civil Defense, Fire Hats, Grader, Dump, & Del. Taxes

The City Council of Wheeler met Monday evening in the city building. Neil Rogers, Robert McPherson and Leo Hamel met with the council. Neil Rogers, County Civil Defense Director, met with the council to present a list of items available to the city through army surplus. Rogers, also a rural area fireman ask the council to purchase a tarp to be used on the firetruck to protect the hose when it is not in use; the council voted to buy the tarp. Rogers advised the

council of the need for additional helmets for the firemen; he is to meet with the council again after obtaining a price list. Rogers is working to obtain a siren for the south end of town through Civil Defense. Leo Hamel of Amarillo met with the council and presented material on a new Allis Chalmers grader. The city attorney, Robert McPherson, met with the council to discuss the collection of delinquent taxes. McPherson informed the council that two cases had been filed and is present preparing other cases for filing. The Mayor Pete Burton, presented two bids from Plains Machinery Co for motor graders. The council voted to purchase a used Caterpillar model 12. The secretary was instructed to write Lewis Construction Co. concerning the repair of the 600 block of E. Seventh. The street was damaged by the heavy rain in June. The council voted to ob-

tain bids for the running of a 6" water line across highway 152 to the Vise Addition. The houses presently in the area are being served by a 2" line. The six inch line will furnish water for a fire hydrant on South Jackson Street. The council recognized the need for the digging of a new trench at the city dump. Following the payment of the bills, council was dismissed by Mayor Pete Burton. Present at the meeting were Mayor Pete Burton; Councilmen, Robert Denson, Glen Markham, Louis C. Stas, John C. Vise, and Dr. J. Robert Winslow; Secretary, Mildred Ramsey; and Cecil Snelgrooves, water superintendent. Water superintendent Cecil Snelgrooves received his certificate of competency for a Grade C Water Waste Operator. The certificate was issued July 7, following twenty hours of schooling, on the job training, and a written test given by the state.

Groundbreaking ceremonies were held in Shamrock Monday afternoon for their new library. The library will be built and furnished at a cost of \$50,000. Mayor Troy Johnston; Chairman of the Library Committee, Mrs. Raymond Ziegler and Building Chairman, R.L. Roberts turned the first shovels of dirt at the ceremony. Plains Steel Building Company of Pampa won the contract for the building. Their bid for the construction of the building was \$37,000. The ceremonies were preceded with over two years of work and a year long fund drive. The library is being made possible through public subscription with no Federal funds being used in the project.

He has been president of the Kiwanis Club of Algona, Iowa, lieutenant governor and governor of the Nebraska-Kiwanis District, and both a member and chairman of the International Committee on New Club Building, and the Board's Committees on Membership Development and Retention, Laws and Policies, Program Development, Leadership and Council, and Finance, and most recently he has been a member of the

International Committee on Resolutions and the Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees. Bartlett has been a Kiwanian for twenty-five years. Bartlett owns and operates a retail furniture and floor covering firm in Algona. The Kiwanis leader is past president of the Algona Chamber of Commerce, the Algona United Fund, the Algona Industrial Development Corporation, and the Kossuth Community Concert Association. He was a member of the Kossuth County Board of Education for 22 years and served as President of the Board for 12 years. He has been active in Boy Scout work for the past thirty-seven years. Bartlett, a former adviser to the Algona Explorer Scout Post, holds the Silver Beaver Award and membership in the Order of the Arrow. Bartlett is an active member of the United Methodist Church and has been a lay delegate to its Iowa Area Annual Conference. He has also served as secretary-treasurer of the Conference, and as a member of its board of trustees. Other new officers and trustees elected at the convention were: Lorin J. Badskey, Lakeland, North Webster, Indiana, President-elect; Roy W. Davis, Chicago, Illinois and Ted R. Osborn, The Blue Grass, Lexington, Kentucky, International Vice-Presidents; and William M. Eagles, M.D., Chesterfield, Virginia, Treasurer. Elected to two-year terms as International Trustees were: P. Blair Ellsworth M.D., Idaho Falls, Idaho; T. Ben Hagler, Ph.D., Auburn, Alabama; Aubrey E. Irby, Tyler, Texas; Charles M. Roberts, Fort Myers, Florida; Mark A. Amth, Jr., North DeKalb, Georgia; and Hilmar L. Solbert, Appleton, Wisconsin. The fifty-sixth Annual Convention of Kiwanis International in San Francisco attracted 16,000 people, Kiwanians and their families. 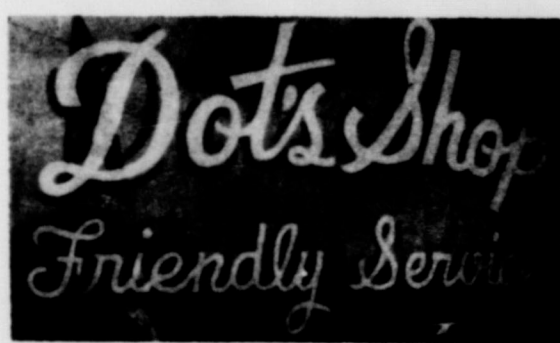

# Across the Fence

By Max Hatter CAA  
 The spirit of farm folk  
 usually rises at planting  
 time, but the spark seems  
 missing this year. Maybe  
 it's because we haven't re-  
 ceived but a third of the an-  
 nual rainfall we're supposed  
 to get and it's the middle of  
 July. There's no subsoil  
 moisture to speak of and  
 grass is fading fast in many  
 fields. Surprisingly enough,  
 we've seen some stands of  
 newly planted lovegrass that  
 may just hold on until the  
 next rain.  
 We put four pair of two

year old cows and their  
 calves on our grazing study  
 plot on June 18. They gained  
 an average of 1 1/2 pounds  
 day and their calves gained  
 an average of 2 pounds a day.  
 We also proved statistically  
 what most folks have known  
 for a long time anyway.  
 After seeds heads form,  
 cattle won't gain much on  
 love grass. From the middle  
 of June til the first of July,  
 the average daily gains  
 were fantastic on the heifer  
 studies - 2.44 pounds - and  
 then plummeted to almost  
 nothing the first two weeks

of July after the seed heads  
 became so numerous. The  
 stocking rate was 11 heifers,  
 4 cows and 4 calves, and 1  
 bull on a little more than  
 ten acres.

We had the opportunity of  
 meeting Joe Reeder, the new  
 welfare worker for Wheeler  
 County. Joe impressed us as  
 having the concern of people  
 in need at heart. I'm sure Joe  
 will be very helpful to folks  
 needing his services.

The Southwestern Great  
 Plains Resera  
 Plains Research Center at  
 Bushland is sponsoring a

 problems of cattle grazing

 information and concepts  
 pertaining to small grain  
 grazing and management will  
 be presented. The Panhandle  
 Economic Program is one of  
 the sponsors.

4-H Record Books are due  
 in our office on Monday, July  
 26, by 12:00 noon. All 4-H  
 members who expect to re-  
 ceive recognition this fall  
 should plan to turn in their  
 record book.

What kinds of federal assis-  
 tance are available to farm-  
 ers, ranchers, farm workers,  
 small business men, and  
 others hit by the severe  
 drought in parts of Texas,  
 Oklahoma, and New Mexico?  
 Answers, in general terms,  
 have consolidated in a 16  
 page pamphlet prepared in  
 English and Spanish by the  
 President's Interagency  
 Drouth Committee, Dallas.  
 It's called "Guide to Federal  
 Emergency Drouth Help  
 Available," with separate  
 versions for each state.

Copies of the pamphlet are  
 available at county offices  
 that handle U.S. Department  
 of Agriculture drouth assis-  
 tance programs and infoma-  
 tion, including County Ex-  
 tension Agent, Agricultural

Stabilization and Conserva-  
 tion Service (ASCS). Farmers  
 Home Administration (FHA),  
 and Soil Conservation Ser-  
 vice (SCS).

"Information on federal  
 assistance in the pamphlet  
 has to be general because all  
 programs are not effective in  
 all counties of the state,"  
 points out George Hastings,  
 chairman of the Interagency  
 Drouth Committee.  
 Specific types of assistance  
 have to be requested, county  
 by county, depending on  
 need, Hastings said.

Martin Garber USDA rep-  
 resentative and committee vice  
 chairman, suggests that any  
 farm operator or owner who  
 needs assistance through the  
 federal government should  
 discuss his needs with his  
 county ASCS, SCS, or FHA  
 office. These offices know  
 which programs operates in  
 each county and can place  
 requests for additional assis-  
 tance that may be needed.

Efficient utilization of pas-  
 tures during drouth can be  
 the key to higher profits for  
 stockmen.

Adequate plant food is the  
 first consideration to be  
 made in growing more for-  
 age. Even during drought  
 periods, local showers can  
 produce good-quality forage  
 if adequate plant food has  
 been applied.

Using the forage efficien-  
 ly is of utmost importance.  
 Efforts to conserve quality  
 and prevent wastage should  
 be included in every forage  
 management program.

One thing this means is  
 that high-quality forage should  
 be grazed by animals with  
 highest nutritive requirements.  
 For example, beef cows with  
 young calves have higher  
 nutritive requirements than  
 dry cows and should receive  
 the high-quality forage.

Another way to conserve  
 quality is by limiting graz-  
 ing of high-quality pastures  
 to the time required for ani-  
 mals to obtain their nutri-  
 tive requirements. Cattle  
 that are grazing good pas-  
 tures can usually obtain  
 their requirements in a few  
 hours each day. If the cattle  
 are permitted to graze the  
 area more extensively, for-  
 age losses may occur be-  
 cause of trampling and spoil-  
 ing.

Test the forage to deter-  
 mine quality. Testing enab-  
 les the producer to deter-  
 mine if any supplements are  
 needed to meet the animals'  
 nutritive requirements.

A localized rain during the  
 summer months can produce  
 more forage than animals  
 can readily consume. Where  
 this happens, steps should be  
 taken to use the forage effi-  
 ciently and to harvest hay  
 from excess growth.

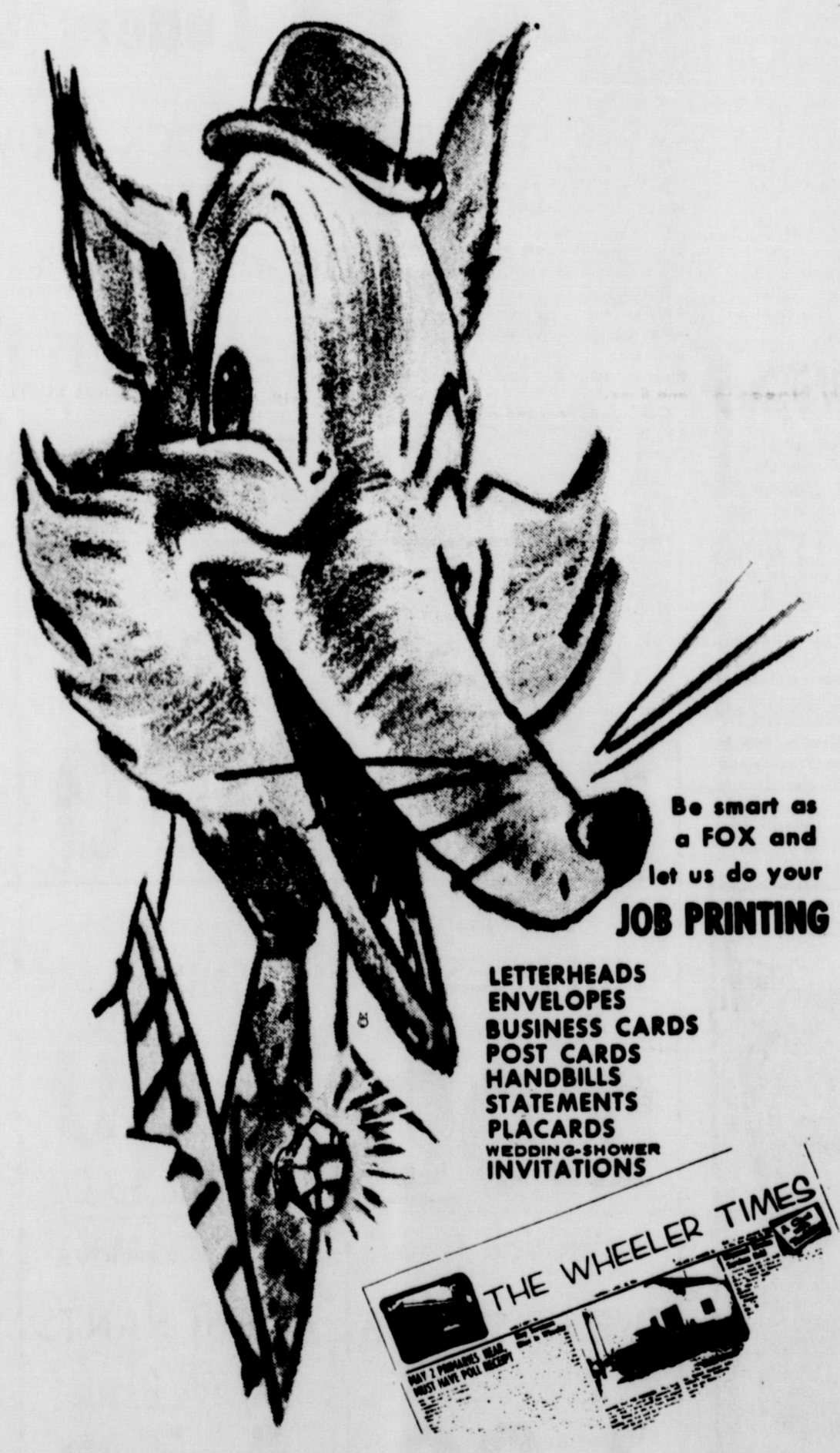
