How much fat is in the hamburger you buy?  
It all depends on what you select. If it was processed and packaged for retail sale under federal or state inspection, it shouldn't contain more than 30% fat.  
Pick up a package. If the label bears a small round mark, "U.S. Inspected and

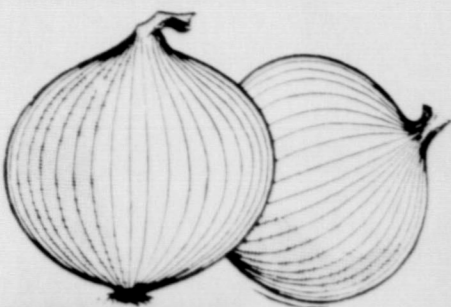
Passed by Department of Agriculture", that meat has been passed inspection by USDA's Consumer and Marketing Service. All meat produced by plants selling products across state lines must pass this federal inspection, which begins with checks of animals before they are slaughtered and continues right through final processing. Plant sanitation, product standards, and labeling must all meet federal requirements.

Hamburger and ground beef produced and packed into consumer-size packages in plants or retail warehouses under federal inspection are limited to 30% fat. Such products, when labeled "ground or chopped beef", may contain only as much fat as is naturally found in the meat they're made from—as long as it's 30% or less. The same requirement applies to ground chuck, round, and sirloin. But meat labeled "hamburger" and bearing the mark of federal inspection may contain added fat to bring it up to the 30% limit.  
Federally-inspected hamburger and ground beef may not contain added water, binders or extenders.  
Hamburger and ground beef bearing a mark of state inspection must meet the same standards as federally-inspected meat. Forty-seven states (all but Minnesota, Montana, and North Dakota, whose plants are under federal inspection) now inspect plants producing and selling meat within their state lines.  
But most of the hamburger and ground beef sold in retail stores is ground and packaged right there and is not subject to those federal and state fat limits. Some special state laws and local ordinances do set restrictions for store-packed products, though.  
Remember that different

counts of meat contain varying amounts of fat—just because of the part of the animal they come from. Ground chuck usually contains more fat than ground round, and ground round more than sirloin. The less fat, however, the more expensive ground meat is likely to be.  
Keep these facts in mind when you shop—you'll find it easier to choose the ground meat that's most economical for the meal you have in mind.  
If it's the same old routine for summer beverages, add some snap and sparkle to your drinks with cranberry juice!  
Replace the seasonal of this favorite fruit juice with hot steaming punch, tart and spicy—with a tall, chilly, refreshing glass of CRANBERRY FROST

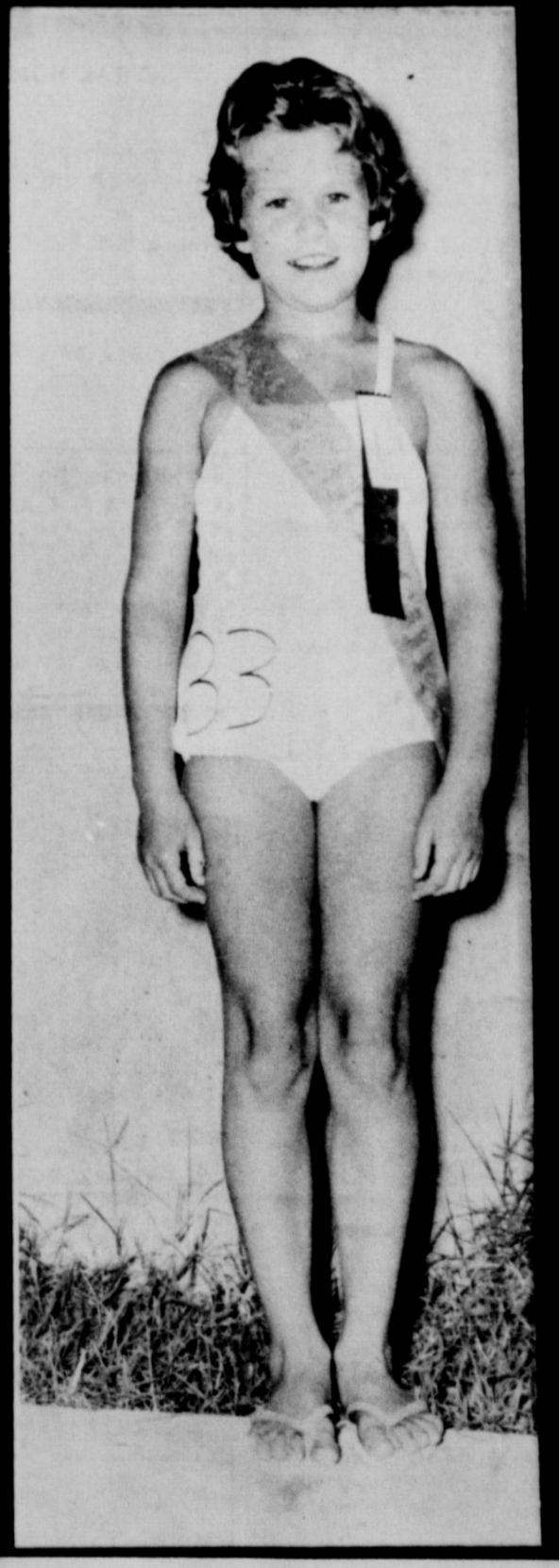
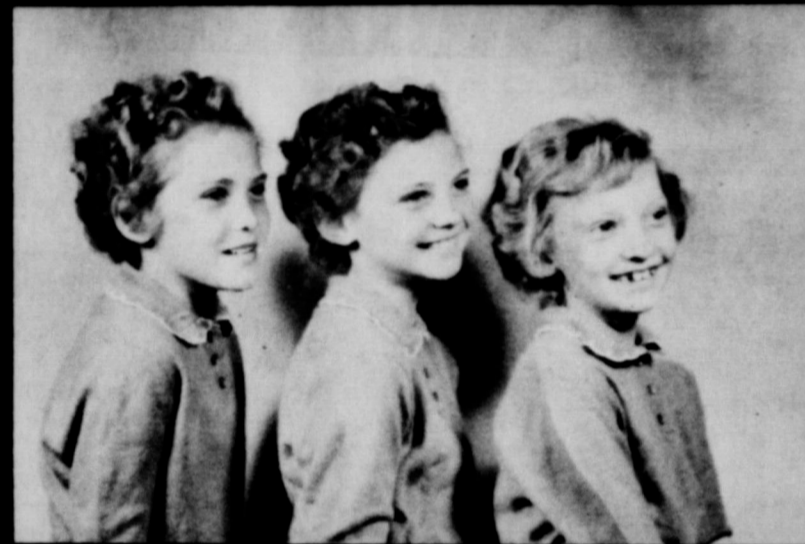
