PAT'S PARAGRAPHS

All the hustle and bustle of going back to school almost makes me want to go back! The first of a new school year, whether it was grade school, junior high, high school, or college, was always an exciting time to me!

Attention, those of you that are canning, or will be canning. I do have equipment for testing your pressure cookers, if you feel they need to be tested.

Rather than bringing your cookers up to my office, call and arrange for a time to take

the "tester" to your home. The "tester" is a thermometer. Included are instructions on how to use the thermometer to test your cooker. It's really very simple to do!

Even though many of you do a lot of canning, sometimes you buy either canned or frozen vegetables at the grocery store. The following test, highlights many points helpful in making a wise choice from the shelf or frozen food counter.

Try it and see how you do! Answers are given below.

VG (VEGETABLE QUOTIENT) TEST

- Questions
1. Vegetables that are canned and frozen are—
 - a. Left over fresh vegetables.
 - b. Grown especially for canning or freezing.
 - c. Grown in hothouse.
 2. The least expensive styles of vegetables are—
 - a. French-style or julienne.
 - b. Whole vegetables.
 - c. Dices, short cuts, or pieces.
 3. You can tell a canned or frozen vegetable is of high quality by its—
 - a. Taste.
 - b. Appearance.
 - c. Price.
 - d. All of these.
 4. The term "U.S. Fancy" on a can or frozen package of

vegetables refers to—

- a. The style of the vegetable.
- b. It's quality.
- c. The sauce it is packed in.
- d. The size of the can or package.

5. Bulging or swelling of a can indicates—

ANSWERS

1. (b)—Grown especially for canning or freezing.

Because vegetables should be canned or frozen as soon as possible after harvest to retain their nutritional value and quality, canners and freezers usually contract to buy vegetables before they are planted.

2. (c)—Dices, short cuts, or pieces.

Whole vegetables usually cost more than cut styles, because it is hard to keep these fragile products whole during processing. French-style or julienne vegetables, which are sliced lengthwise, are more costly to process than other cut styles. Short cuts, dices and pieces are least expensive, and a good buy for use in soups, stews, or souffles.

3. (d)—All of these.

Top quality canned and frozen vegetables are the most tender and flavorful and most uniform in color and shape or size. They therefore usually cost more than lower qualities.

4. (b)—Its quality.

U.S. Fancy is another name for U.S. Grade A. U.S. Grades A, B, and C were established by USDA to describe different levels of quality in canned and frozen vegetables.

U.S. Grade A, top quality is the kind of vegetable you'd probably serve at special meals.

5. (a)—spoilage.

Don't buy or use cans that are bulged or swelling.

6. (c)—Firm.

Don't buy soft, limp, wet or sweating packages. These are signs that the vegetables have defrosted or are in the process of defrosting. The vegetables may be safe to eat, but normally there will be a loss of quality.

7. (b)—False.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture does inspect canned and frozen vegetables for quality, upon request of processors, but assurance of the wholesomeness of these products is the responsibility of the Food and Drug Administration.

Inspection for quality (grading) is not required by law and processors must pay a fee for the service.

8. (c)—The style of the vegetable.

The grade of the vegetable, even if it has been packed under continuous USDA inspection, is not required to be shown. Federal law also does not require listing the number of servings, but if this is shown, the law requires that the label give the size of the servings in common measures, such as cups or ounces.

9. (a)—The weight of the vegetable including any liquid in the can or package. Contents of canned and frozen vegetables are shown as net weight, not volume.

10. (2)—True.

Most processors and distributors have quality control programs whether or not

Legal Notice

AN ACT relating to the recording and rerecording of livestock brands and marks, and declaring an emergency.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS

Section 1. (a) This Act shall apply to every county in this State. In all the counties, each owner of any livestock mentioned in Chapter 1 of Title 121 of the Revised Civil Statutes of 1925 shall within six months after this Act takes effect, have his mark and brand for such stock recorded in the office of the county clerk of the county. These owners shall record the marks and brands whether the brands and marks have been previously recorded or not.

(b) The owner shall have the right to have his mark and brand recorded in his name who according to the present records of the county first recorded the brand and mark in the county, or in event it can not be ascertained from the records who first recorded the brand and mark in the county, then the person who has been using such mark and brand the longest shall have the right to have the brand and mark recorded in his name.

(c) After the expiration of six months from the taking effect of this Act, all records of marks and brands now in existence in the county shall no longer have any force or effect and after the expiration of six months, only the records made after this Act takes effect shall be examined or considered in recording marks and brands in the county.

(d) Immediately upon the taking effect of this Act the county clerk of the county shall have this Act published in some newspaper of general circulation in the county for a period of thirty days. The publication shall be paid for by the county out of the general county fund.

Sec. 2. All clerks in re-registering brands shall comply with Articles 6890 through 6899, inclusive, of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925, as amended, and with Section 1, Chapter 273, Acts of the 41st Legislature, 1929, as amended (Article 6899a, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes), and shall also be aware of and comply with Articles 1484, 1485, and 1486 of the Penal Code of Texas, 1925.

Sec. 3. All brands and marks registered under the provisions of this Act shall be re-registered every 10 years in the manner prescribed in Section 1 of this Act.

Sec. 4. The importance of this legislation and the crowded condition of the calendars in both Houses create an emergency and an imperative public necessity that

that a fat chance and a slim chance meant one and the same thing.

Lehmann Love grass, which is sort of new to us, yielded as much forage as Ermel love grass on our observation plot. Old World Bluestem had comparable yields to Ermel. We plan to give the results at the Annual Northwest Texas Research Demonstration Program Barbecue, September 28, at the Kelton School. Make plans now to attend. Grazing study data is now catching up with last year's due to welcome rains.

I see something to the effect that we have reached some kind of an agreement with the government of Turkey to get their farmers to stop raising poppy seed and produce some other crop in order to cut off a major source of drugs. That is a noble idea, but I get more amazed each passing day at our government getting into a farm program that far from home when we have wild marijuana patches scattered over our country side that haven't been sprayed out or eradicated.

Harrison Hall was planting his wheat last week when we visited his place to inspect his scales.

Recent moisture has brightened prospects for small grain crops in the county. Planting time is at hand and next year's grain harvest and the amount of grazing this fall and winter from the crop may well depend on the variety planted.

We suggest that producers purchase the best seed available of varieties adapted to this area. The choice of a variety is influenced by whether the crop is seeded on dryland or irrigated, low

or high fertility conditions, whether used for grazing or grain or both, and its resistance to diseases and insects. Shattering and lodging characteristics and quality, especially in the case of wheat, should also be considered.

The recommended wheat

varieties for this section of Texas include Tascosa, Sturdy, Caprock, Caddo, Scout 66, Kaw 61, Improved Triumph, Parker, Concho, and Triumph 64.

Recommended oat varieties include Norwin, Wintok, Cimmaron, and Broncho.
