### OVERNIGHT DELIVERY AREAS ANNOUNCED

Postmaster Hiram Whitener amplifying on a new mail service program recently announced by Washington headquarters, today identified local areas which are to receive overnight delivery of first-class mail originating within the Amarillo area.

Postmaster Whitener said eight areas contiguous to Amarillo will benefit from the next-day deliveries under a new mail service goal announced by Postmaster General Winton M. Blount.

These areas, Postmaster Whitener said, include the following Sectional Centers: Amarillo, Texas; Childress, Texas; Clovis New Mexico; Liberal, Kansas; Lubbock, Texas; Roswell, New Mexico; Tucumcari, New Mexico; and Wichita Falls, Texas.

Postmaster General Blount on August 26 unveiled the Postal Service's new goal of overnight delivery of local area first-class mail deposited by 4 P.M.

"The Postmaster General has pointed out that this program will affect more than half of all first-class letter mail sent in the United States," Postmaster Whitener said. "So customers of every post office in the country will be benefitting from the new service goal."

Substantially more than half of the 52 billion pieces of first-class mail handled

annually are for delivery in the city where deposited or in nearby communities.

The areas outlined today by Postmaster Whitener are those within which next-day delivery will be provided for ZIP Coded first-class mail deposited by 4 P.M. on week- days in business areas, and at collection points on main thoroughfares.

The Postal Service set October 31 as the deadline for achieving the 95 per cent goal.

The areas to which next-day delivery can be provided include a total of 308 post offices, the most distant of which are more than 200 miles from the Amarillo Sectional Center Facility.

### FREE AND REDUCED PRICES AVAILABLE AT WHEELER CAFETERIA

The Wheeler Independent School District today announced a free and reduced price lunch policy for Wheeler School children unable to pay the full price.

Local School officials have adopted the following family size and income scale to assist them in determining eligibility.

Families falling within these scales or those suffering from unusual circumstances or hardships are urged to apply for free or reduced price lunches for their children. They may do so by filling in the application forms sent home in a letter to parents. Additional copies are available at the principal's office in each school. Appli- cations may be submitted any time during the school year.

The form itself is simple to complete and requests information needed to determine economic need based on the income and number of persons in the family and any unusual circumstances or hardships which affect the family's ability to pay for school lunches. The information provided on the application will be confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility.

Under the provisions of the policy the Principal will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent is dissatisfied with the ruling of the local official he may make a request either orally or in writing for a hearing to appeal the decision. The Superintendent, whose address is Box 38, Wheeler, Texas has been designated as the Hearing official. Hearing procedures are outlined in the policy.

The policy also provides that there will be no identification of our discrimination against any student unable to pay the full cost of a lunch.

A complete copy of the policy is on file in each school and in the office of the Superintendent where it may be reviewed by any interested patron.

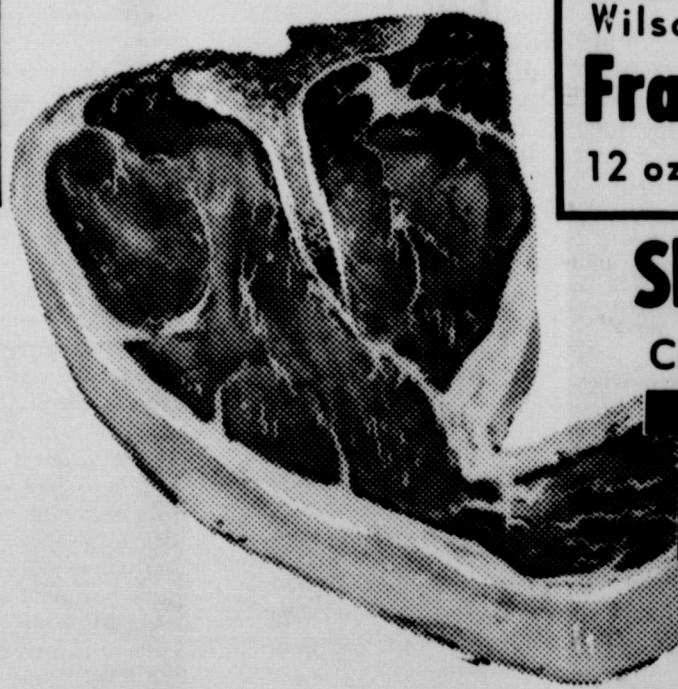

that the feed grain drought program had been cancelled for Wheeler County. Callingsworth County's still in effect, we understand. Unfortunately, the moisture we received during our growing season was spotted.

While Wheeler received nearly 17 inches according to Joe Rogers, other areas received only token amounts. We were out at Kelton last week and noticed milo and hay crops burning up there. Crops and pastures around Papan are very short and Shamrock is unusually dry. It looks like many folks will be hard pressed to

secure enough hay for livestock needs this winter. Kentucky 31 Fescue grass, seeded last fall, is looking real good on a well watered bottom land site on the Gwen Edwards place north of Wheeler. An important characteristic of this grass is the ability to remain green during the winter, and the fact that it is a perennial means that you don't have to seed it every year. Many folks feel it could fill the winter grazing gap between November and March before lovegrass comes out.

The Amarillo fair will begin on September 20. We plan to set up an Agricultural display of farm and garden products. If you have some farm or garden produce that you feel other folks would enjoy seeing, let

us know. Several cases of prussic acid hydrogen cyanide poisoning in cattle grazing Johnson grass and sorghum hybrids have been diagnosed during the past week at the Texas Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Laboratory at College Station.

Dr. John C. Reagar, toxicologist, said that in one case, 260 hungry cows were turned into a Bermuda grass field about 4:30 p.m. The upper edge of the field had a large amount of wilted Johnson grass, which the animals began to eat immediately.

The next morning, 27 were found dead. They never made it to the Bermuda grass.

In another case, 20 cows were placed in a small pasture containing volunteer Haygrazer from hay fed in early spring. The young, droughty plants were quickly grazed and 13 animals were found dead in the morning.

Dr. Reagar said prussic acid caused the deaths in both instances. Johnson grass and sorghum hybrids may contain high levels of the deadly poison when under drought stress followed by a summer rain shower.

Either the wilted or fast growing stage of the plant can be dangerous, the toxicologist points out. Problems usually arise when hungry animals are suddenly placed in these pastures.

Prussic acid is swift. Reagar said death can occur within five minutes after grazing affected plants, and almost always within 12 hours.

Hungry stockmen to graze their cattle in such pastures only with great caution. Hungry cattle should never be turned in.

Samples of muscle tissue may be submitted to the Texas Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Laboratory for testing, Reagar said. How-

ever, they must be "killed" in a 1 percent mercuric chloride solution for transport to the lab because prussic acid is not stable.

The lab also offers a testing service on plants suspected to be poisonous. Reagar said the fee for the muscle tissue or plant test is \$2 per sample.

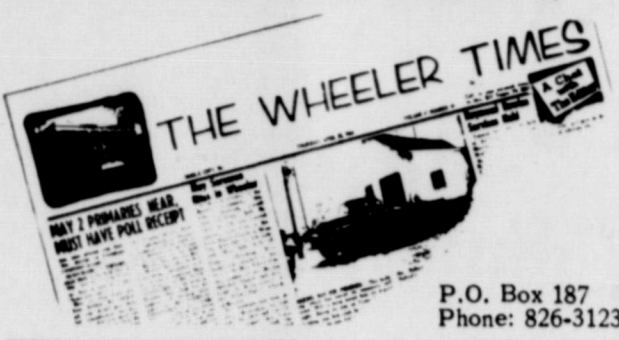

## Legal Notice

**AN ACT**  
relating to the recording and  
rerecording of livestock  
brands and marks; and de-  
claring an emergency.

**BE IT ENACTED BY THE**  
LEGISLATURE OF THE  
STATE OF TEXAS.

Section 1. (a) This Act  
shall apply to every county  
in this State. In all the  
counties, each owner of any  
livestock mentioned in Chap-  
ter 1 of Title 121 of the Re-  
vised Civil Statutes of 1925  
shall within six months after  
this Act takes effect, have  
his mark and brand for such  
stock recorded in the office  
of the county clerk of the  
county. These owners shall  
record the marks and brands  
whether the brands and marks  
have been previously record-  
ed or not.

(b) The owner shall have  
the right to have his mark  
and brand recorded in his  
name who according to the  
present records of the county  
first recorded the brand and  
mark in the county, or in  
event it can not be ascer-  
tained from the records who  
first recorded the brand and  
mark in the county, then the  
person who has been using  
such mark and brand the  
longest shall have the right  
to have the brand and mark  
recorded in his name.

(c) After the expiration of  
six months from the taking  
effect of this Act, all rec-  
ords of marks and brands now  
in existence in the county  
shall no longer have any  
force or effect and after the  
expiration of six months, only  
the records made after this  
Act takes effect shall be  
examined or considered in

(d) Immediately upon the  
taking effect of this Act the  
county clerk of the county

in some newspaper of general

Sec. 2. All clerks in re-  
registering brands shall  
comply with Articles 6890  
through 6899, inclusive, of  
the Revised Civil Statutes  
of Texas, 1925, as amended,  
and with Section 1, Chapter  
273, Acts of the 41st Legis-  
lature, 1929, as amended  
(Article 6899a, Vernon's  
Texas Civil Statutes), and  
shall also be aware of and  
comply with Articles 1484,  
1485, and 1486 of the Penal  
Code of Texas, 1925.

Sec. 3. All brands and  
marks registered under the  
provisions of this Act shall  
be reregistered every 10  
years in the manner pre-  
scribed in Section 1 of this  
Act.

Sec. 4. The importance of  
this legislation and the crowded  
condition of the calend-  
ars in both Houses create  
an emergency and an impera-  
tive public necessity that  
the Constitutional Rule re-  
quiring bills to be read on  
three several days in each  
House be suspended, and  
this Rule is hereby suspen-  
ded; and that this Act take  
effect and be in force from  
and after its passage, and  
it is so enacted.
