ed between treatments that should be given together. After all, it isn't simply a matter of unloading the cattle, throwing on a brand, and kissing em' goodbye at the unloading chute gate. Along this vein, we have a publication in our office free for the asking called "Healthy Stocker and Feed-

er Calves", #1098, that you'll find helpful in pampering stockers for profit. We also can get a copy of the proceedings of the North Plains Sub-Area Stocker Management Shortcourse held last week that tells what was said there on stocker

Along with the good must come some of the bad. We're sure that there are lots of wet hay bales and wet hay in the windrows. Some of this hay is ruined. We don't have an estimate yet of the damage but it will be costly to cattlemen trying to get hay put up.

We had a large crowd, close to 300, attending this year's Northwest Texas Research Demonstration Program. All seemed interested in grazing management and wintering cows. Dodder, a parasitic weed with a peculair name can spell real trouble for alfalfa unless it is carefully controlled.

It shows up as a strawcolored tangled mat of vines wound among alfalfa and certain weeds.

Dodder can literally suck the life out of a valuable alfalfa crop if it is allowed to spread unchecked. It is most often introduced on a farm by contaminated crop seed, although it can also be spread by combines, mud or manure on animals and farm equipment. Dodder is a parasite, and

must live on a host plant to survive. The emerging seedlings are rootless and leafless with a fine yellow thread-like stem about one to three inches long. The seedlings rotate slowly until they find an object to vine on. If the object is the stem of a suitable host plant, the parasite twines around the host and sends suckers into it.

The seedling in direct contact with the soil then withers and the dodder thrives at the expense of the host plant. If it fails to reach a host plant, the seedling will After becoming attached

to the alfalfa or other host, the dodder produces many stems in a tangled mass and grows as much as three inch es per day. A single plant may spread ten feet or more in a year. Be caustious about buying

bargain alfalfa seed, because it may be contaminated with dodder. This bargain seed can be

extremely costly in terms of yield loss and later control expenses.

Dodder seed that is in hay can pass through an animal's digestive tract and still germinate later. The seed can remain viable in the soil and produce seedlings over a prolonged period of time, which makes control even more difficult.

Animals fed hay that is contaminated with dodder should be confined to a feedlot or the field where the hay originated. They can also be put on non-host fields where crops such as cotton, corn or grain sorghum will be grown the following

Be sure to clean forage equipment thoroughly before moving from a dodder-infested field to a clean field. Use compressed air and water to clean the equip-

There is very little danger of spreading viable dodder seed if the forage is harvested before the parasite

matures, and the alfalfa is made into alfalfa meal, silage, or even fed green. Any equipment that thor-

oughly stirs the surface soil and exposed it to drying will give good control on small dodder seedlings.

Dodder can also be controlled by mowing or shredding the host plants below the point where it is attached. It is important to control dodder before it has time to produce seed. Chlorpropham (CIPC) can

be applied in a granular form at six pounds of active chemical per acre on moist soils. This will control the parasite for about four weeks. Application should be about five days before irrigation when the alfalfa is at least four inches tall. This provides shade to keep the soil surface cool and moist, which in turn prolongs the persistence of the CIPC. The shade also retards later emergence of dodder, other herbicides such as dichlobenil (Casoron) and DCPA (dacthal granules or wettable powder) or registered for use in alfalfa grown for seed only.

Burning is another control method that will prevent dodder seed production, but flaming will not kill dormant seed buried in the soil.

If the fields are severely infested with dodder the most effective and economical control measure may be to rotate to a non-host crop. The parasite will still germinate, but the plants cannot survive in cotton, grain sorghum and other row crops. NORTEX ENGIN AND EQUIPMENT CO

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

Gov. Preston Smith and the State Comptroller's office hold different views on timing of a special session of the Legislature to pass the second half of the 1972-73 budget.

Smith apparently wants to wait until next June-when primary elections are over and a longer-range look at possible tax revenue is avgilable.

Comptroller's aides voiced concern that a session delayed that long could not produce needed new revenue by September 1, start of the state's fiscal year. A sales tax increase, for example, in April would not produce money to the state from merchants until the end of July or early August.

Smith was unimpressed: 'He (Comptroller Robert S. Calvert) is not the governor," Smith noted.

Smith's veto of the second year of the biennial spending bill necessitates a complete rewrite in special session sometime within the next year. A special session would have been required, anyway, since the 1971 Legislature did not pass a 1973

### PAT'S PARAGRAPHS

By Patricia Palmer CHDA have had many questions about mixes that a homemaker

can prepare herself. One is a biscuit mix, and the other is for pastry or piecrust. The name biscuit mix is somewhat misleading in that you can use it to make not only biscuits, but waffles, pancakes, nutbreads, coffeecakes, and muffins. Both of these mixes are very practical to have on hand and you can make your own mix using these recipes. You will find these homemade mixes save not only

time but money, too. This biscuit mix is simply a mixture of flour, baking powder, and salt that has solid all-vegetable shortening cut into it. Because the shortening is designed for storage at room temperature, the mix can be kept in a covered container (an empty 3 lb. shortening can is ideal) on the kitchen shelf. It saves time since all you have to do is add some milk plus maybe an egg to have pancakes for breakfast or biscuits for dinner.

The pastry mix is made by cutting pure all-vegetable shortening into a mixture of flour and salt. A pastry blender is a good little gadget for this cutting process-it does a very thorough job quickly and easily. When you're ready to make a pie crust, simply add water to a measured amount of mix and your pie crust is ready for rolling. One batch of this mix will make enough pastry for about three double crust pies or five single crusts. QUICK PASTRY MIX
