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MUSTANGS STOMP GROOM TIGERS 41-13

Wheeler's Mustangs rolled their fourth straight win swept Groom Friday night and did so with apparent ease as they came away with 41-13.

After Weatherly's interception, the Mustangs pushed the ball to the Wheeler 37 where Fischer found the Tigers bunched up on a fourth down try and burst straight up the middle for 63 untouched yards. Howard Britten broke through to block the extra point kick to break the string. Stevens started three touchdowns earlier.

Groom got on the board late in the game to become the first team to get two touchdowns against the Mustangs and this came on a disputed call that would have given the Mustangs the ball.

Cole intercepted a Tiger pass on his goalline and returned to the Wheeler 40 but an official said he was guilty of pass interference and the Tigers had a first down at the Mustang 4.

UNDEFEATED MUSTANGS & WILDCATS BATTLE FRIDAY IN HOMECOMING TILT

Two ball clubs with spotless records put on the line Friday night at Nicholson Field when the Mustangs of Wheeler take on the Wildcats of Canadian in the annual homecoming contest for the Mustangs.

This will be the final tuneup for both teams as they enter district competition next week and the Wildcats are being touted as the team that can take the crown away from White Deer, presently ranked No 4 in the state in Class A circles.

Prior to the 8 p.m. kickoff, the 1971 Football Queen will be crowned and this part of the nights activities will commence at 7:30.

The visiting Wildcats come into the fray fresh from a 19-13 win over the Clarendon Branchos to go along with their one sided victories over Booker, Erick and Follett.

The high powered Canadian offense is led by Steve Carter, a 200 lb. senior tailback, who not only is reputed to be one of the hardest runners in the Panhandle but has real good speed. Archie Trimble, former Wheeler griddler, gives the Wildcats the outside threat.

Carter, along with East, a 205 lb. offensive end, man the tackle spots on defense and they anchor the defensive forward wall that has been next to impossible to run against.

"One thing for sure, if we make as many mistakes as we did against Groom, Canadian will run us out of the park," Coach Jim Bateman said this week. 300 Attend Annual Demonstration Program

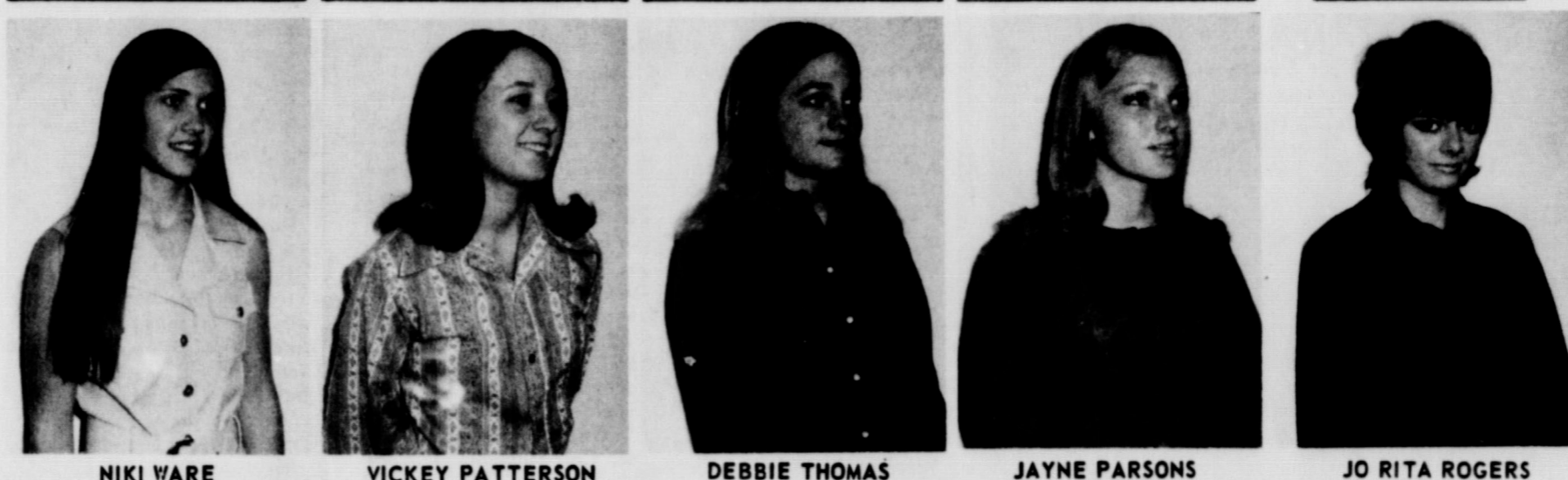
There was an extra-large turnout at the Grazing Management Conference Tuesday night, September 28, at the Kelton School Gym. Over 300 people from the Texas and Oklahoma Panhandle attended the program and free barbecue sponsored by the Wheeler Co. Farm Bureau, the Wheeler Chamber of Commerce, and the Shamrock Chamber of Commerce.

Master of Ceremonies for the evening was James Verden, vice-president and manager of Wheeler Production Credit office.

Speaker for the evening was Max Hatter, Co. Agricultural Agent. He gave the latest information on the on-the-farm county research being done on proper grazing management of weeping lovegrass. Topics covered were "Wintering Cows on Nothing, if They'd Eat It" and "Year Long Grazing of Ermelo Weeping Lovegrass". Research results demonstrated how cows can be wintered without hay or supplemental protein on properly managed standing cured Lovegrass. Three years of research have shown gross returns of over \$250 from one acre of Ermelo Weeping Lovegrass. The program was supported with slides showing the field as it was, as it is today, and the cattle run on it. An interesting feature brought out in the recent research concerns the so called dormant period of weeping lovegrass. In tests conducted in this county tests conducted in this county it was found to green-up in the milder winter months, the time period when the grass was thought to be dormant. The main problem in winter grazing is to have the cows maintain their weight. Mr. Hatter told the audience, "You have heard for years that cattle won't eat dry lovegrass, but these cattle did, and they pretty well held their own through the winter."

A wall chart of several grasses being grown near the Wheeler Gin was available for inspection. These grasses are being tested for their winter hardiness and their suitability for use in this county. Following the slide presentation, a question and answer period was held with answers being given by: Verbon Smith, Wheeler Co. Cooperator, Edwin T. Garnett, Area Farm Management Specialist from Amarillo, Dr. Frank Petr, Area Agronomist, Dist I from Amarillo; Dwane Scott, Farm Demonstration Assistant from

Applesauce and apple juice are to be plentiful this month.

Here are some recipes using them.

Apple Cherry Nut Bread
4 cups sifted, all purpose flour

1 tsp. baking soda

1/4 cup sugar

3 eggs

2 tsp. baking powder

1 tsp. salt

2/3 cup shortening
1 cup cut up nuts
1/2 c. drained, chopped Maraschino cherries
2 tbs. grated lemon rind
1 can or jar apple sauce (about 1 lb.)

*Glaze: 1/4 cups powdered sugar, 2 tbs. milk, 1 tsp. vanilla, mixed in small bowl until smooth.

Applesauce Cake

1 3/4 cups sifted all purpose flour

1/2 tsp. salt

1 1/2 tsp. cinnamon

1 cup firmly packed brown sugar

1 egg

1 cup raisins

1 tsp. baking soda

1/2 tsp. nutmeg

1/4 cup cloves

1/2 cup shortening

1 1/4 cups apple sauce

Turn oven to 350°. Sift flour, baking soda, salt and spices onto wax paper. Beat brown sugar, shortening and egg in a 3 qt. bowl until light and fluffy. Mix in dry ingredients alternately with apple sauce. Stir in raisins. Pour into a greased 8 in. square pan. Bake about 45 min. Serve warm or cool. Sift powdered sugar lightly over top before serving. Serves 9

Spiced Apple Juice

4 1/2 oz. can apple juice

3 sticks cinnamon

1/2 tsp. whole cloves

1/4 cup firmly packed brown sugar

1/2 tsp. whole allspice

Pour apple juice into bottom of automatic percolator. Put brown sugar and spices into basket of percolator. Perk, Makes 1 1/2 qts.

Turn oven to 350°. Sift flour, baking powder, baking soda and salt onto wax paper. Beat sugar and shortening in 3 qt. bowl of electric mixer at medium speed until fluffy, scraping sides of bowl often. Add eggs and beat until smooth. Beat in sifted dry ingredients at low speed alternately with apple sauce. Stir in nuts, cherries and lemon rind. Pour into 2 greased 9x5x3 inch loaf pans. Bake 50 to 55 min. Take from pans. While warm, spread each loaf with one half of Vanilla Glaze

Colts Outclass Silverton; Host Claude Thursday

The Wheeler Colts got their second win of the campaign last Thursday night when they posted a 34-0 pasting on the hapless Owls, who were in no way a match for the Colts.

Even though the Colts dominated every phase of the game, their play was erratic and quite sloppy at times, although much of this can be attributed to the opposition.

So ineffective were the Owls against the Colts, they didn't make a first down and ended the contest with a minus 35 yards offensively in comparison to 251 total yards and 14 first downs for the Colts.

Silverton ran only two plays after the opening kickoff and lost the ball on a fumble recovery by Tommy Weaver on the Owl 27. Four plays later, Steve Lamb got the TD from 4 yards out and Jim Verden punched in the first of his three two pointers.

Another fumble recovery, this one by Bill McIlhenny at the Owl 22, put the Colts in good field position late in the first quarter and two plays later Mark Bateman skirted his right end from 19 yards out and with the conversion, it was a matter of just how much the Colts wanted to lay it on.

Bateman got the first of two Colt touchdowns in the second quarter as they built a 28-0 halftime lead. He turned the corner on the right side from 35 yards out to boost the Colts total with 5:24 remaining in the half.

The inept Owls lost their third fumble of the game right after the kickoff at the Owl 4 and with a five yard penalty tacked on for illegal procedure, the Colts set up shop at the 9. Lamb got it in one try to give the Colts the 28-0 margin.

Coach Gaines substituted liberally in the second half and the loosely called game saw numerous penalties help slow down the Colt onslaught.

A 15 yard punt return by Dan Helton to the Owl 10 late in the game set up the last Colt score which Verden got on an 8 yard slant at right tackle.

The win gave the Colts a 1-0 mark in district play and they will be out after their third win in a row Thursday when they entertain the Claude Colts on Nicholson Field at 6:00 p.m.

The Jesus Movement is sweeping the country. It's real. So real you run out of adjectives. It's bright, dizzying, exciting, unnerving, vibrant, puzzling, ecstatic, even frightening simplistic.

It's unorganized, free-wheeling, unstructured dynamite. A nonmovement led by nonleaders. Ask the kids who started it, they reply seriously: "The Holy Spirit." And who leads it? "Jesus Christ", they reply.

For lack of a better word, the "movement" is raging across the nation like a wind-driven brush fire, jumping any obstacle to break out in dozens of forms and dozens of places.

A "Jesus Festival" in Evansville, Indiana, draws thousands. Young people pour into revival meetings in Texas, Oklahoma, New Mexico, Ohio, Kentucky, Florida. Georgia teens organize a high school Youth for Jesus. In Birmingham, Alabama, they picket a pornographic bookstore. Record crowds of teen-agers pack evangelistic meetings in North Carolina, Illinois and Tennessee.

Christian communes spring up in major cities across the country. Thousands are baptized dramatically in the Pacific Ocean. "Jesus freaks" roam the streets "rapping about Jesus with everyone they meet. Students take the ir Bibles to high school and avidly read the Scriptures at every spare moment.

They are intensely evangelistic, highly legalistic. They believe the Bible word for word, literally.

Mr. Meek passed away Saturday, Oct. 2, 1971 after an illness of several months.

Mr. Meek was born Oct. 25, 1884 at Lake County, Tennessee to William Green Meek and Sarah Wilhelm.

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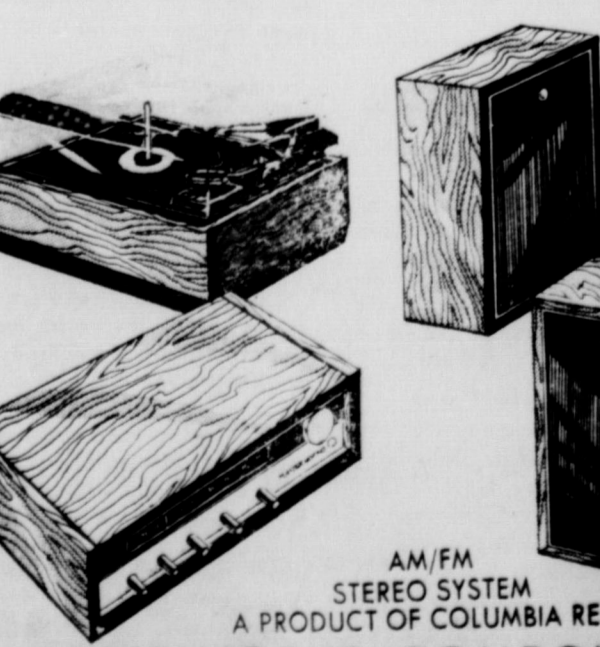


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Wheeler Dealers Meet with Moore

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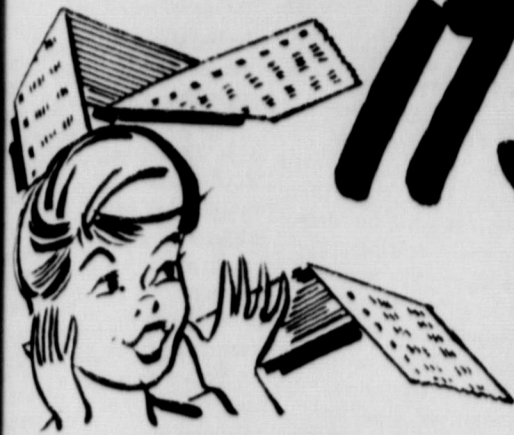

Across the Fence

A lot of wheat's been sowed this week. The Macina family at Paman were sowing their wheat a few days ago and C.B. Brotherton, Jr. was trying to keep his wheat from blowing out while we were out that way. We have a fine milo crop. After visiting in Collingsworth Co. last week, I'm convinced that we're better off than they are. They have a lot more milo burned up than we do.

Qualified voters who are at least 21 years of age and own land in Zone 3 of the Wheeler Co. Soil and Water Conservation Dist. will vote on a Supervisor. The election will be held on Monday night, October 11 at 7:30 p.m. at the Heald Church. The area served by the supervisor includes all land north of I-40 from a few miles west of Lela, to the Gray County line, west, and an north to Kellerville. The hardy chrysanthemum, a member of the large Compositae or daisy family with complex flower structures, can bring spectacular fall color to the yard or garden. There are about 1,000 varieties to choose from.

Every year many new mum varieties are introduced and many old ones are discontinued. This is the "survival of the fittest" for our garden pleasure. Mums can be seen in many sizes including the cushion, medium and tall sizes.

Colors vary from white to yellow, bronze, burnt orange, rust red and dark crimson. Flower sizes vary from half an inch to three inches in diameter. Flower shapes are described as button, pompom, spoon, daisy flowered, decorative, anemone, spider, and so on.

Just for fun, try growing a few of your own new mum varieties from seed. The easiest to grow from seed. One plant can offer a wide variation in color and type.

Chrysanthemums grow in fall sun. Many florists sell chrysanthemums sold as pot mums are unsatisfactory as garden flowers as they bloom too late in the fall. The flowers are usually damaged by frost before they have a chance to open properly.

When ordering mums for your garden, be sure to specify the early flowering varieties. If you have a large area to plant, a few of the mid and late season bloomers will prolong the flowering period if you are willing to take the chance of damage from a heavy frost.

45 DAY EXTENSION FOR DISABLED VETERANS LICENSE APPLICATIONS

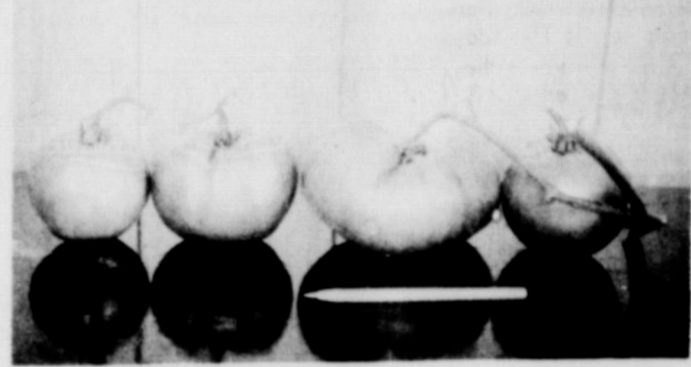
Paul Topper, Veterans County Service Officer, announced that he had received official notification from the Texas Highway Department that they are granting a 45 day extension for disabled veterans to file applications for 1972 "Disabled Vet" license plates. This benefit was enacted by the 62nd Legislature, 1971, HB 615, and provides for free license plates for veterans who have at least a 70% service-connected disability and are in receipt of compensation because of such disability.

The letter received from the Highway Department is quoted below:

"We have received numerous requests to extend the deadline for disabled veterans to file their applications for 1972 "Disabled Vet" license plates.

"It has always been our policy whenever possible to be reasonable in our administration of the registration laws of this State. 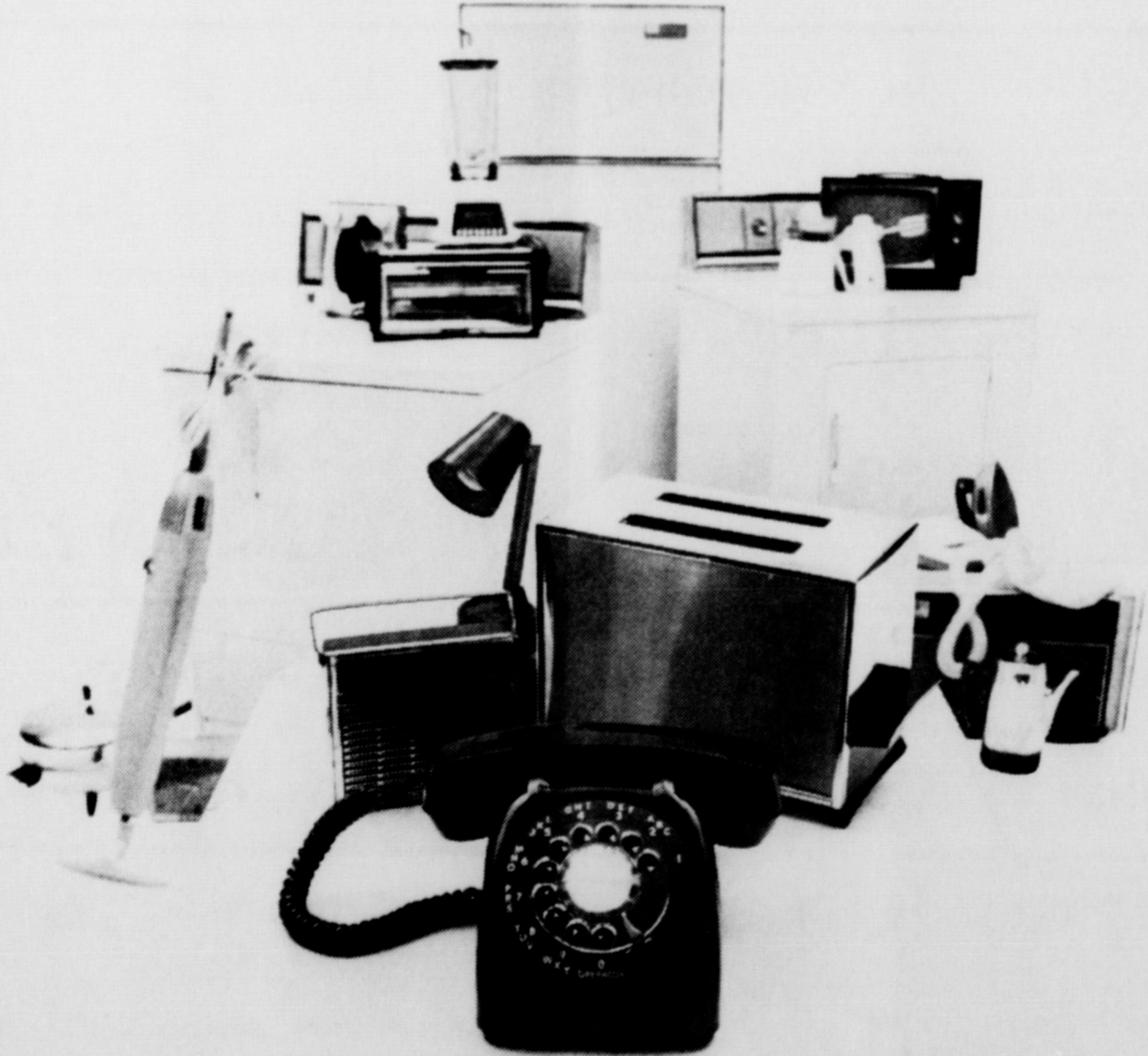

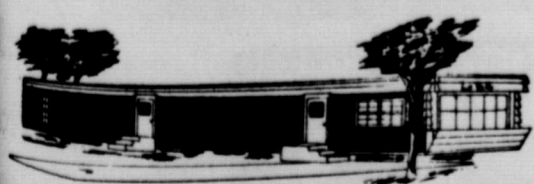
