Fighting back from a touchdown deficit, the Wheeler Mustangs took a one point margin into the final quarter last Friday night against the Clarendon Bronchos only to see it evaporate in two big pass plays from Mac Tomlinson to Mike Leeper and fell to the fired up Bronchos 21-7.

The loss was the second n a row for the Mustanas and once more it seemed as if the Mustangs were going to pull a victory out only to see their chances drift away with the bounce of the ball.

Only two passes were completed by Clarendon in the game but how big they were when the final count was in.

A fumbled punt by Dale Stevens at the Wheeler 45, two plays into the final period, gave Clarendon a big break after the Mustangs had gotten the go ahead touchdown in the third quarter and seemingly had the Bronchos holding on.

A good call on first down found Leeper running free between Fischer and Beaty and the perfect toss from Tomlinson never caused Leeper to break stride and he crossed over to paydirt with 11:21 to play.

The Bronchos pounded out yardage down to the Wheeler 12 for a first down but here the Mustangs came to life and began to stiffen.

Fourth and two faced the Bronchos at the 4 and they called on Shields but as he cut inside his left end, he momentarily slipped and the gold shirts pounded him down for a four yard loss.

This stand seemed to fire up the Mustangs and they ripped and slashed their way into Broncho territory with the yard eating dashes of Jimmye Cole getting most of the ground.

## Colts Entertain McLean Thursday After Losing To Memphis 14-12

Only two points separated the teams after the Colts and Memphis battled last Thursday at Wheeler but it was as good as a hundred as the loss probably meant the championship in the Jr. High chase.

Weakened by injuries, the Colts used a revamped backfield to garner a first quarter lead only to see it lost to two second quarter tallies by Memphis.

The Colts rallied for the potential tying touchdown in the third quarter but the try for the two points failed and the slender margin held up for the Memphis win.

Mike Bradstreet pounced on a loose ball at the Memphis 20 on the second play of the game and in seven plays the Colts had six points with Danny Helton climbing over right guard from a yard out. The try for the extra two points failed and the failure loomed larger as the game progressed.

Even though Memphis **Childress Serving** could muster only four first downs in the game, they came up with the big play. Speedy Charles Bryley dashed 84 yards to paydirt after the visitors had stopped another thrust at their goal by the Colts. Once he got past the line

of scrimmage, it was no contest as far as running Bryley down and he calmly booted the extra point just 53 seconds deep in the second quarter.

Memphis drove for what proved to be the winning marker as time was running out in the first half. Again it was Bryley who did the dirty work as he got 49 yards in a couple of swipes at the

Colt defense. With fourth and five at the Colt 25 and the clock running out, Ricky Douthit found daylight around the Colt left side and behind the blocking of Bryley, toed it down the sideline to the end zone with 31 seconds to play in the half. Bryley booted the extra point and offensively, Memphis was done.

The Colts didn't let Memphis make a first down the last half and fought back within two but the damage had been done.

Using practically all that third quarter in one drive, the Colts were back in business 46 seconds away from the final period when Danny Helton got his second touchdown as he found an opening at right guard from four vards out.

The Colts got all of the 77 yards on the drive on the ground in 15 plays but the big two pointer failed and even though the Colts threatened once more, it was the ball aame.

The McLean Cubs come to Nicholson Field Thursday for a 6 PM game and it will close out the home schedule of the Colts. The Colts close out the season next week at Clarendon.

AFL-CIO State President Roy E. Evans announced the goals were adopted by his organization's executive board and the COPE administrative committee in a recent meeting here. It is "quite possible," Evans said, the AFL-CIO

will make no endorsements in next year's governor's race unless Yarborough is a candidate. He noted a two-thirds majority of delegate strength is necessary for endcrsement in a COPE convention.

L<sup>+</sup>. Gove. Ben Barnes and Dolph Briscoe of Uvalde are announced gubemato-ial candidates.

Evans listed the lieutenant governor's race as the No. 3 priority of labor; the House Speaker's race No. 4 and congressional, state Senate and House contests No. 5.

He unveiled a voter registratio goal of six million by the 1972 general election. In a September poll of

AFL CIO convention delegates, Evans reported 201 felt Yarborough should run for the U.S. Senate, while 20 preferred that he run for governor and 26 for neither office.

M other recent opinions, Martin concluded:

\*Tax due on natural gas production is calculated on the basis of the total proceeds of the sale of all component parts, less allowable transportation and processing costs. Tax is then borne ratably by various interested parties. The formula is spelled out in the opinion.

\* Texas Real Estate Comnission must transmit half real estate broker and salesmen renewal licenses fees to Texas A & M University for a new research center. Half must go to the State Treasury. \*County Commissioners may purchase or lease and maintain two-way radio equipment for the sheriff and his deputies, but not for a Parks and Wildlife Department game management officer. \*Nueces County domestic relations court has concurrent jurisdiction with county courts at law over misdemeanor wife and child desertion cases, while the county court has no jurisdiction over them. \*New law did not change the duty of the Upshur Co. clerk to write warrants in payment of the salaries of county employees and co-unty bills authorized by law and approved by the commissioners court. \*A bill providing that county commissioners courts of each county shall fix the amount of compensation, office expenses, travel expenses and all other allowances for county and precinct officials and employees paid wholly from county funds is valid. FEED LOT SHUT DOWN--Texas Water Quality Board ordered a cattle feeding operation near San Marcos shut down when it found a constant threat of pollution" to underground water in the Edwards Aquifer.

Court of Criminal Appeals held a 1967 U.S. Supreme Court decision guaranteeing defendants the right to subpoend accomplice witnesses to testify for them can be applied retroactively. The finding may provide a new way to freedom for prisoners convicted before 1967 and denied testimony of accomplices to the offense for which they were charged.

**Criminal Appeals Court** upheld a 1,000-year prison sentence for a repeat-offender convicted in Dallas of robbery by assault, but the Court suggested such sentences are "impossible" and should not be assessed. Same Court credited a

prisoner with time he did not serve behind bars when he was earlier released by mistake.

**OYSTERING REOPENED--**A large part of Lavaca Bay which was closed last year to oyster harvesting due to mercury contamination has been reopened.

However, the State Departm nt of Health said blue crab should not be taken for human consumption until further notice.

Excessive mercury densities are still found in some blue crab collected from the bay, the Health Department reported.

There has been a steady reduction in mercury densities found in oysters (which can cleanse themselves as the quality of their environment improves), according to the department. Maps showing approved oystering areas and those still closed are available from the Health Department division of marine resources, 1100 W. 49th St., Austin. SCHOOL FOOD PROGRAM CURBED -- A free breakfast program for school children faces insufficient funding, a Texas Education Agency spokesman reports.

TEA has been unable to add schools to the breakfast program this year due to lack of money. About 115 schools have had to be turned down. Schools participating last year increased from 298 in September to 474 in May. Schools receive 15 cents per







He does indeed. Parallel to the right of self defense is the right to defend the members of one's family, with force if need be. This doctrine goes all the way back to the days of feudalism, when the master of the household was legally entitled to protect his family from attack.

But in such situations, there is always the chance of escalating the violence. Therefore, the law places careful limits on this right of family defense.

1) The force used must not be excessive. For example:

A father found his son in volved in a fracas with the man next door. Rushing to the rescue, he knocked the man unconscious with a mighty blow on the head. Then he followed up with a swift kick in the abdomen.

For the resulting internal innes. juries, the father was duly held liable in court. The right to defend his son, said the court, did not include the right to kick someone who was lying on the ground unconscious.

2) The force must be used only to defend, not to "get even." In another case, a father found out that a certain teacher had slapped his son in class. Days later, meeting the teacher on the sidewalk, he punched him in the nose.

Could the father be held liable? Again, yes. The court said that since the boy was in no danger at the time of the punch, the father's action could not fairly be called defensive.

3) Many courts add that the father's right to use force is no greater than the child's. Thus:

A belligerent teen-ager deliberately picked a fight with another youth. But b/ the time his father came along, he was already getting the worst of it. The father promptly slugged the other boy with a rock.

Sued later for damages, the father claimed he had acted to protect his son. But the court held him liable anyhow. The court said that, in terms of the right to use force, he "stood in his son's shoes"-that is, in the shoes of the aggressor.
