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## CLARENDON BRONCHOS BOMB MUSTANGS

Fighting back from a touchdown deficit, the Wheeler Mustangs took a one point margin into the final quarter last Friday night against the Clarendon Bronchos only to see it evaporate in two big pass plays from Mac Tomlinson to Mike Leeper and fell to the fired up Bronchos 21-7.

The loss was the second in a row for the Mustangs and once more it seemed as if the Mustangs were going to pull a victory out only to see their chances drift away with the bounce of the ball. Only two passes were completed by Clarendon in the game but how big they were when the final count was in.

A fumbled punt by Dale Stevens at the Wheeler 45, two plays into the final period, gave Clarendon a big break after the Mustangs had gotten the go ahead touchdown in the third quarter and seemingly had the Bronchos holding on.

A good call on first down found Leeper running free between Fischer and Beaty and the perfect toss from Tomlinson never caused Leeper to break stride and he crossed over to paydirt with 11:21 to play.

Going for the two points, Tomlinson hit James King with a pass and although it appeared that he never had possession, the officials hands went up and Clarendon had a 7 point lead.

Clarendon started out the game as if they were going to blow the Mustangs off of Nicholson Field. Using devastating blocking that was wiping out the Mustang defenders, the Bronchos moved 56 yards for the first touchdown in only five plays after a short punt.

into the wind took a bad bounce for the Mustangs and netted them only five yards.

Steve Carter got 25 yds as he swept the Mustangs left flank on second down from the Broncho 46 and two plays later, Tommy Shields found a gaping hole at his left guard slot and dashed for 15 on a trap to the Mustang 9.

Carter sped to the flag on the next play and the Bronchos had 6 but couldn't pad it as the snap on the conversion try was bobbled and the Mustangs swarmed the ball carrier.

The Mustangs could nudge out only one first down after the kickoff and Weatherly booted the pigskin to the Broncho 28.

The Bronchos pounded out yardage down to the Wheeler 12 for a first down but here the Mustangs came to life and began to stiffen.

Fourth and two faced the Bronchos at the 4 and they called on Shields but as he cut inside his left end, he momentarily slipped and the gold shirts pounded him down for a four yard loss.

This stand seemed to fire up the Mustangs and they ripped and slashed their way into Broncho territory with the yard eating dashes of Jimmy Cole getting most of the ground.

The Mustangs had a first down at the Clarendon 31 when their old nemesis, the fumble, rose up to haunt them.

A scramble for a bobbled pitch resulted in a Clarendon recovery when Scotty Lindley was the last man off the ball at the Broncho 37.

A field goal try from the Wheeler 24 with a little over three minutes to play in the half was short and to the left to quell the last threat the Bronchos could muster until the bomb hit the Mustangs in the fourth quarter.

Wheeler got a couple of breaks early in the third period and was able to cast in on the second to give the Mustangs the lead.

Pat Hill latched onto a Tomlinson fumble at the Clarendon 42 shortly after the second half kickoff but the Mustangs couldn't go and had to give up the ball with a punt.

Weatherly's kick sailed inside the Broncho 10 and Ronnie Hill and Ricky Watson killed the ball at the 5 to put the Bronchos in the hole.

Two plays later, Cole stepped in front of Tomlinson's second pass of the night at the Clarendon 31 and Wheeler was back in business and not to be denied this time.

Weatherly pounded out 14 yards at right guard on the first play and Cole tackled on 4 more at right tackle. Stevens almost broke for the distance on a good run at left end but was downed at the 4. Cole was jarred loose from the ball on the next play but recovered for a yard gain and then spun into the end zone from three yards out with 6:39 still to go in the third stanza.

Stevens kick sailed through the uprights for the narrow margin of 7-6. Clarendon presented the Mustangs a good opportunity to put the game on ice minutes later when Tomlinson again bobbled the snap and Jerry Beaty recovered at the Broncho 27.

This threat fizzled out at the 20 and set up the punt four plays later that led to

the Mustangs downfall.

Relentlessly the Mustangs came back and were back in the contest as they drove to the Clarendon 37 after the Bronchos had taken the lead.

Facing fourth and ten from the 37, the Mustangs couldn't hold out the hard charging Bronchos and they downed Gary Fischer for a loss of 7 as he attempted to pass.

Wheeler once more shut down the Clarendon offensive efforts and forced a punt. Just as the kicker was getting the ball away, the hard charging Ronnie Hill was blocked into the kicker and the flag floated to earth with a roughing the kicker call.

Instead of having the ball, the Mustangs had their backs to the wall at their own 34.

Playing outstanding defense, as they did all the second half against rushing, the Mustangs held and another field goal try by Lindley was way wide to the left.

The Mustangs took over with 3:47 to go and had 80

big yards to travel. Having to pass, the Mustangs couldn't get the right combination and had to kick the ball away from their 24 as their hopes were quickly vanishing.

The second TD pass of the night to Leeper came from the 32 and with just 53 seconds to play, Lindley's kick was just a formality.

Wheeler's embattled Mustangs will have their backs against the wall this week as they not only will be trying to get back in the win column but also get back into the thick of the district race when they travel to Memphis and take on the rampaging Cyclones.

After two disappointing defeats back to back at home, the Mustangs are hoping that enemy soil will be the incentive needed. The loss to Clarendon last week makes this a must game for Wheeler. No team has been able to absorb two defeats and come out on top in District 2-A since the Mustangs have been a member of the district and it doesn't appear that this year will be an exception.

In the Cyclones, the Mustangs will be facing the most explosive team they have encountered thus far. Halfbacks Davis and Johnson give the Memphis attack blinding speed when they break out and their passing attack is equal to their running game with Browning doing the hurling.

The only loss the Cyclones have suffered has been to White Deer but even in the loss, the Cyclones were able to amass more than four hundred yards total offense against the Bucks. Memphis is tied at the top with Clarendon and McLean after last weeks action and this along with the memory of last years thumping at the hands of the Mustangs will keep the Cyclones sky high for the game.

Only two points separated the teams after the Colts and Memphis battled last Thursday at Wheeler but it was as good as a hundred as the loss probably meant the championship in the Jr. High chase.

Weakened by injuries, the Colts used a revamped backfield to garner a first quarter lead only to see it last to two second quarter tallies by Memphis.

The Colts rallied for the potential tying touchdown in the third quarter but the try for the two points failed and the slender margin held up for the Memphis win.

Mike Bradstreet pounced on a loose ball at the Memphis 20 on the second play of the game and in seven plays the Colts had six points with Danny Helton climbing over right guard from a yard out. The try for the extra two points failed and the failure loomed larger as the game progressed.

Even though Memphis could muster only four first downs in the game, they came up with the big play. Speedy Charles Bryley dashed 84 yards to paydirt after the visitors had stopped another thrust at their goal by the Colts.

Once he got past the line of scrimmage, it was no contest as far as running Bryley down and he calmly booted the extra point just 53 seconds deep in the second quarter.

Memphis drove for what proved to be the winning marker as time was running out in the first half. Again it was Bryley who did the dirty work as he got 49 yards in a couple of swipes at the

Colt defense.

With fourth and five at the Colt 25 and the clock running out, Ricky Douthit found daylight around the Colt left side and behind the blocking of Bryley, toed it down the sideline to the end zone with 31 seconds to play in the half. Bryley booted the extra point and offensively, Memphis was done.

The Colts didn't let Memphis make a first down the last half and fought back within two but the damage had been done.

Using practically all the third quarter in one drive, the Colts were back in business 46 seconds away from the final period when Danny Helton got his second touchdown as he found an opening at right guard from four yards out.

The Colts got all of the 77 yards on the drive on the ground in 15 plays but the big two pointer failed and even though the Colts threatened once more, it was the ball game.

The McLean Cubs come to Nicholson Field Thursday for a 6 PM game and it will close out the home schedule of the Colts. The Colts close out the season next week at Clarendon.

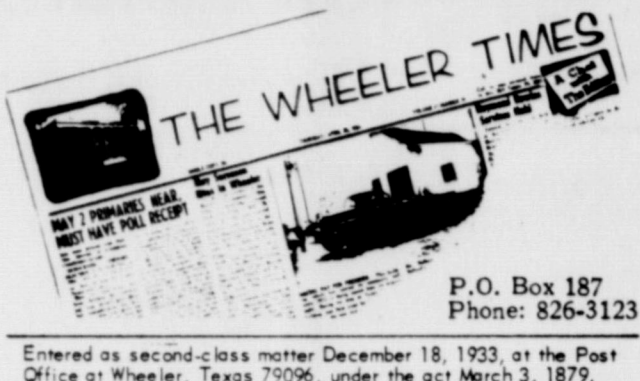

# HIGHLIGHTS & SIDELIGHTS FROM YOUR STATE CAPITAL

**Austin, Texas--Organized**  
 labor leaders of Texas have set as political priorities for 1972 the defeat of President Nixon and support of former U.S. Senator Ralph Yarborough for any office he seeks.

AFL-CIO State President Roy E. Evans announced the goals were adopted by his organization's executive board and the COPE administrative committee in a recent meeting here.

"It is 'quite possible,'" Evans said, the AFL-CIO will make no endorsements in next year's governor's race unless Yarborough is a candidate. He noted a two-thirds majority of delegate strength is necessary for endorsement in a COPE convention.

L. Gove. Ben Barnes and Dolph Briscoe of Uvalde are announced gubernatorial candidates.

Evans listed the lieutenant governor's race as the No. 3 priority of labor; the House Speaker's race No. 4 and congressional, state Senate and House contests No. 5.

He unveiled a voter registration goal of six million by the 1972 general election.

In a September poll of AFL-CIO convention delegates, Evans reported 201 felt Yarborough should run for the U.S. Senate, while 120 preferred that he run for governor and 25 for neither office.

He said 298 labor delegates would prefer Yarborough to 33 for Barnes in a governor's race between the two, while 294 would pick Yarborough to 47 for Briscoe.

The labor delegates liked Sen. Hubert Humphrey or president, giving him 313 straw votes to two for Alabama Gov. George Wallace and none for President

Richard Nixon. A random poll of rank and file union members showed 87 for Humphrey in 51 for Wallace and 38 for Nixon.

AFL-CIO convention delegates gave Yarborough 350 votes for senator to three for Sen. John Tower, and the former senator 216 to 13 over Democratic senatorial hopeful Harold (Ruffalo) Sanders of Dallas in the poll.

**NEWSPAPER BOY HONORED**  
 State newspapers honored the 1971 "Carrier of the Year" at the state capital Friday. Joseph Gamble, 15, Bridge City, who delivers the Orange Leader, was named the first annual "Carrier of the Year" by the Texas Circulation Managers Association.

Gamble was taken on an official tour of the state capital, visited Gov Preston Smith, Secretary of State Bob Bullock and other state officials.

Friday noon he was guest at a picnic given at the LBJ Park by Lady Bird Johnson for the outstanding highway beautification winners of the year.

The young newspaper boy was given an autographed book, "A White House Diary" by Mrs. Johnson.

He was a guest of the Texas Press Association for the day.

**AG OPINIONS--Texas'**  
 hepatitis laws are applicable to regional planning commission's and their employees, Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin has held.

Other recent opinions, Martin concluded:

\*Tax due on natural gas production is calculated on the basis of the total proceeds of the sale of all component parts, less allowable transportation and processing costs. Tax is then borne ratably by various interested parties. The formula is spelled out in the opinion.

\*Texas Real Estate Commission must transmit half real estate broker and salesmen renewal licenses fees to Texas A & M University for a new research center. Half must go to the State Treasury.

\*County Commissioners may purchase or lease and maintain two-way radio equipment for the sheriff and his deputies, but not for a Parks and Wildlife Department game management officer.

\*Nueces County domestic relations court has concurrent jurisdiction with county courts at law over misdemeanor wife and child desertion cases, while the county court has no jurisdiction over them.

\*New law did not change the duty of the Upshur Co. clerk to write warrants in payment of the salaries of county employees and county bills authorized by law and approved by the commissioners court.

\*A bill providing that county commissioners courts of each county shall fix the amount of compensation, office expenses, travel expenses and all other allowances for county and precinct officials and employees paid wholly from county funds is valid.

**FEED LOT SHUT DOWN--**  
 Texas Water Quality Board ordered a cattle feeding operation near San Marcos shut down when it found a "constant threat of pollution" to underground water in the Edwards Aquifer.

The Edwards Aquifer is a major source of water for a large area of South Central Texas.

Attorneys for the feedlot, Hill County Feeders, said the decision will be appealed to state district court.

**COURTS SPEAK--**  
 The widow and mother of a Mexico air crash victim are entitled to collect \$36,579 on his life insurance policy though he had requested it be discontinued five days before his death, the State Supreme Court held.

**Court of Criminal Appeals** held a 1967 U.S. Supreme Court decision guaranteeing defendants the right to subpoena accomplice witnesses to testify for them can be applied retroactively. The finding may provide a new way to freedom for prisoners convicted before 1967 and denied testimony of accomplices to the offense for which they were charged.

Criminal Appeals Court upheld a 1,000-year prison sentence for a repeat-offender convicted in Dallas of robbery by assault, but the Court suggested such sentences are "impossible" and should not be assessed.

Same Court credited a prisoner with time he did not serve behind bars when he was earlier released by mistake.

**OYSTERING REOPENED--**  
 A large part of Lavaca Bay which was closed last year to oyster harvesting due to mercury contamination has been reopened.

However, the State Department of Health said blue crab should not be taken for human consumption until further notice.

Excessive mercury densities are still found in some blue crab collected from the bay, the Health Department reported.

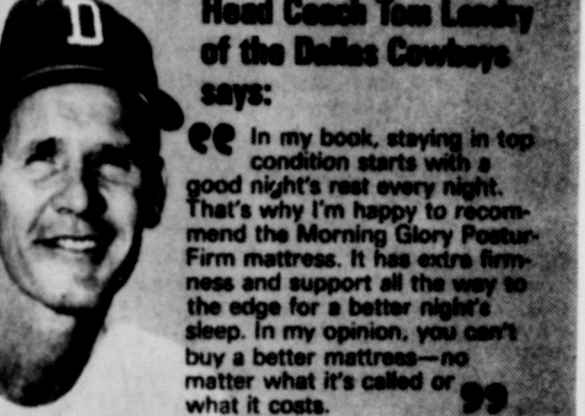
There has been a steady reduction in mercury densities found in oysters (which can cleanse themselves as the quality of their environment improves), according to the department. Maps showing approved oyster areas and those still closed are available from the Health Department division of marine resources, 1100 W. 49th St., Austin.

**SCHOOL FOOD PROGRAM**  
 CURBED--A free breakfast program for school children faces insufficient funding, a Texas Education Agency spokesman reports.

TEA has been unable to add schools to the breakfast program this year due to lack of money. About 115 schools have had to be turned down. Schools participating last year increased from 298 in September to 474 in May. Schools receive 15 cents per breakfast or the cost of each meal, whichever is less, through U.S. Department of Agriculture allocations.

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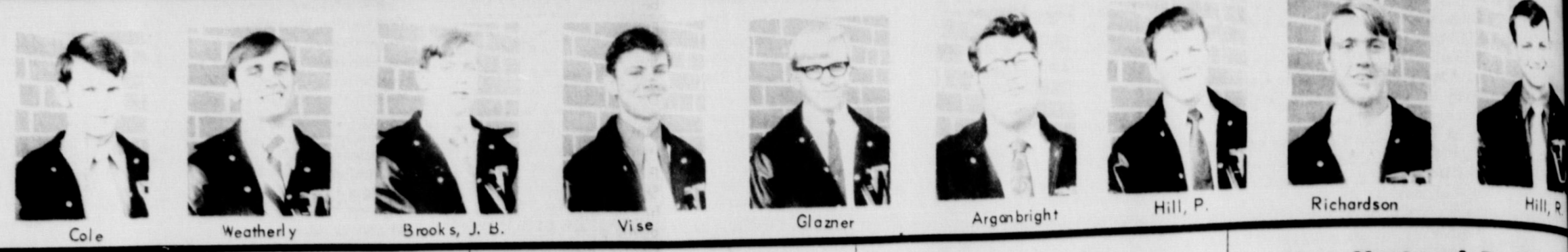

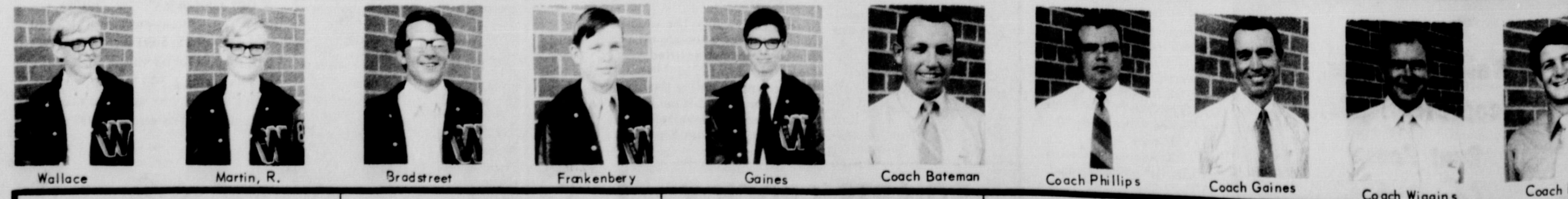

## Father to the Rescue

Suppose a man sees his son being beaten up by the neighborhood bully. Does he have a legal right to use force in his son's defense?



He does indeed. Parallel to the right of self defense is the right to defend the members of one's family, with force if need be. This doctrine goes all the way back to the days of feudalism, when the master of the household was legally entitled to protect his family from attack.

But in such situations, there is always the chance of escalating the violence. Therefore, the law places careful limits on this right of family defense.

1) The force used must not be excessive. For example: A father found his son involved in a fracas with the man next door. Rushing to the rescue, he knocked the man unconscious with a mighty blow on the head. Then he followed up with a swift kick in the abdomen.

For the resulting internal injuries, the father was duly held liable in court. The right to defend his son, said the court, did not include the right to kick someone who was lying on the ground unconscious.

2) The force must be used only to defend, not to "get even." In another case, a father found out that a certain teacher had slapped his son in class. Days later, meeting the teacher on the sidewalk, he punched him in the nose.

Could the father be held liable? Again, yes. The court said that since the boy was in no danger at the time of the punch, the father's action could not fairly be called defensive.

3) Many courts add that the father's right to use force is no greater than the child's. Thus: A belligerent teen-ager deliberately picked a fight with another youth. But by the time his father came along, he was already getting the worst of it. The father promptly slugged the other boy with a rock.

Sued later for damages, the father claimed he had acted to protect his son. But the court held him liable anyhow. The court said that, in terms of the right to use force, he "stood in his son's shoes"—that is, in the shoes of the aggressor.

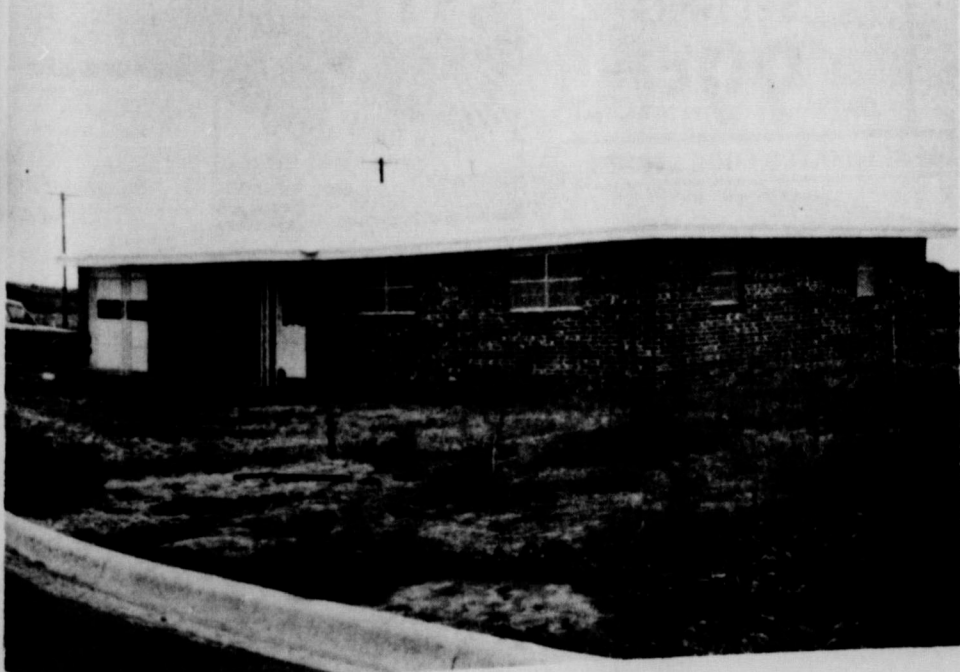

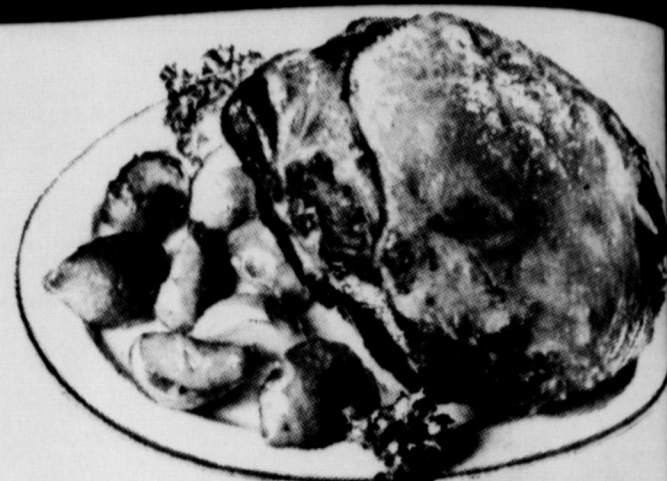
