The Wheeler Mustangs had their most productive night offensively last Friday on cold, wind swept Nicholson field and laid it to the Silverton Owls 40-6.

Trailing 6-0 late in the first quarter, the Mustangs finally got their machine in motion and when they did it was all over for the Owls as Jimmye Cole led the ground eating offense that racked up 343 yards via the infantry route.

The Mustanas had the brisk breeze to the backs to start the game but this didn't deter the Owls as they marched 66 yards for time they had the ball.

Third and long faced the Owls from the Silverton 45 when Dana Martin connected with Terry Culwell at the Mustang 35 and Culwell pulled out of the grasp of Dale Stevens to race to the end zone and complete the 55 yard scoring play. The attempted kick sailed wide to the left and the Owls had the lead with 4:40 to play in the first quarter.

Whether it was the Owls scoring or the cold wind that caused it, the Mustangs came to life and punched across two touchdowns in the second period for a
