





All School Districts in Wheeler County will participate in an immunization clinic to be held on Dec. 15 in both Wheeler and Sham-

rock Schools. Texas immunization laws require all children who are enrolled in school meet the following requirements; The minimum immunization requirements are:

Oral Polio, all students, 3 doses of Vaccine; DPT, all students, 3 doses; Measles, from 1-11 years, 1 dose and Rubella, 1-11

years, 1 dose. All immunization should be completed by the time of enrollment. However, if this is not possible, children will be allowed to enter provided their immuni-

personal records are in current use any document listing each immunization received by year will be acceptable until June 1972. after which signature or rubber-stamp validation of personal records by physicians or public health Clinics is required.

In order to help carry out the requirements, the schools of the County are holding a Health Clinic in cooperation with the State Health

Dept. and the County Health officer. We are doing this to give every parent the opportunity to have their immunization records for their children complete. The vaccine is provided by the state free of charge and will be administered free of charge to any or all children.

All parents in the various schools will be receiving forms to complete and return to the School. If there are any questions please contact your school official or doctor.







that Christmas began as a beloved religious festival originating with the birth of Christ and the angels' Song on Bethlehem's dains, "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth, peace, good will toward men' Perhaps you did not know, as I didn't, that only as late as 350 A.D. a specific date was set for this observance of the birthday of Christ, namely Dec. 25. This date was set by Julius I, Bishop of Rome. Tradition says though, that an elesphorus, the Bishop of Rome, ordered Christmas to be ob-

served as a solemn feast day in the year 137 a.d. This season coincided with pagan festivals of the Romans, and Persians, So attempts to combine pagan and Christian events led to

par with pagan carnivals. Others warned to celebrate Christmas "after a heavenly, and not an earthly manner. When the church found it was going to be imposs-

ible to abolish all the pagan customs, it changed some of their worst features, and finally included them into the Christian observance of Christmas.

This explains the use of greenery and candles, lights for decorating homes and is the background of the bringing in and burning of the yull log, singing of carols, exchanging of presents and feasting happily together with rejoicing. So, our Christmas draws on all mankind for parts of its observance, but at the same time it is in danger of becoming just a set of rites. In England, Christams

is said to have been observed first as a holiday in 521 A.D. by King Arthur. Alfred the Great annually set aside twelve days of yule festivities in the 19th dentury. After 1066 A.D. Christmas became gayer than ever, with reveling, sumptous pagents, and masks added.

This Christmas observance was attacked as the Puritans came into power under Oliver Cromwell. **Consequently Parliament** passed an act forbidding the celebration of Christ's Nativity and other religious festivals including Easter. The old yuletide customs

never became as extravagant again. A Christmas Carol by Charles Dickens reflected the customs in later years, around the 1660's-1670's, and did much to establish them more firmly and wholesomely.

In the American settlements celebration of Christmas was very different. In Jamestown they brought from England such holiday customs as the ringing of bells, burning a yule log, dining elaborately, dancing, playing games, and singing carols. Evergreens decorated their homes and churches and candles were used freely.

Similar celebrations were held in the jolly Dutch settle ment in New Amsterdam, later New York. They loved yultide feasting and merriment, and to their St. Nicloes

When we think of holiday foods and delicious dishes, most of us think of cranberries and di shes made from them. I've been told that the Nov. issue of Better Homes and Gardens has a section on cranberries. Here's another recipe that is good! Christmas Cranberry Nut Bread Yields one 9x5x3 in. loaf pan 11/2 cups fresh cranberries 2 cup sugar

2 cups sifted regular flour 4 cup sugar 4 cup shortening 2 cup chopped nuts 1/4 tsp. baking powder 1/2 tsp. salt tsp. baking soda 1 fresh orangd 2 eggs

Cream cheese, if desired

Combine cranberries and 1/2 cup sugar. Cook over medium heat until sauce bubbles (about 8 to 10 min) and drain.

Sift flour, 3/4 cup sugar, baking powder, salt and baking soda into bowl. Grate orange peel, squeeze juice of the orange in a 1 cup measuring cup. Add the grated peel and enough water to the juice to make 3/4 cup liquid.

Add orange juice mixture, shortening and egg to flour mixture; mix well.Fold in nuts and drained, cooked cranberries. Pour into a greased 9x5x3 loaf pan. Bake at 350° for 45-50 min.

To serve, cut bread in thin slices and spread with softened cream cheese. Place a second slide on top to make a sandwich if
