

A new plan, under study treasury experts, would avoid a direct attack on the community property law. Stanley Surrey, legislative counsel for the treasury, has been discussing it some. It would simply apply the community property law benefits to all states. 





A report by the Associated Press worse than some sections because few cities have facilities for repairing or rebuilding dead batteries

Big Spring dealers contacted reported that several concerns here are equipped to replace dead cells in batteries.

As for new batteries, the local dealers believe the shortage will remain acute throughout the winter. However, some new batteries were delivered here as recently as two weeks ago. But shipments have been curtailed for several weeks, and dealers who formerly received from 50 to 100 batteries on a single delivery report that they are "lucky" to get four or five

As the Associated Press repor ointed out, the cold seldom e fects the battery itself, but the low temperatures thicken motor lubricants, causing increased work and shorter life for the battery.
