ELECTION CALLED APRIL 1 FOR TWO SCHOOL TRUSTEES

The Wheeler School Board met in a special session Monday evening, January 31, 1972. The purpose of the meeting was: 1. To discuss the changes in the education code according to House Bill No. 126 passed by the 62nd Legislature. According to HB No. 126 the School districts with 150 or more scholastics, school trustees must be elected by positions. 2. To call a school board election for 1972. The following position numbers were assigned to the present school board members: W.A. Goad, Jr. (Position 1); Arnold Jones (Position 2); Harold Loyd Lee (Position 3); James Verden (Position 4); W.D. Mitchell (Position 5); Joe Weatherly (Position 6); and Jim Wright (Position 7). The terms of Mr. W.A. Goad, Jr. (Position 1), Mr. Arnold Jones (Position 2) and Mr. Harold Loyd Lee (Position 3) will expire on the first Saturday in April 1972. The School Board called the election for Saturday, April 1, 1972, for the purpose of electing three members to the board of trustees for the Wheeler Independent School District. All requests by candidates to have their names placed on the ballot for this election should be filed with Mr. James Verden, secretary of the board, not later than 12:00 p.m. on March 1, 1972. The said election to be held at the Gymnasium in Wheeler, Texas with Mr. Archie Hibler as presiding judge. For the convenience of the voters the election will be held in conjunction with the city election. The absentee voting will begin on March 12, 1972 and ends on March 28, 1972 in the school business office with Mrs. Clara Marshall as deputy clerk.

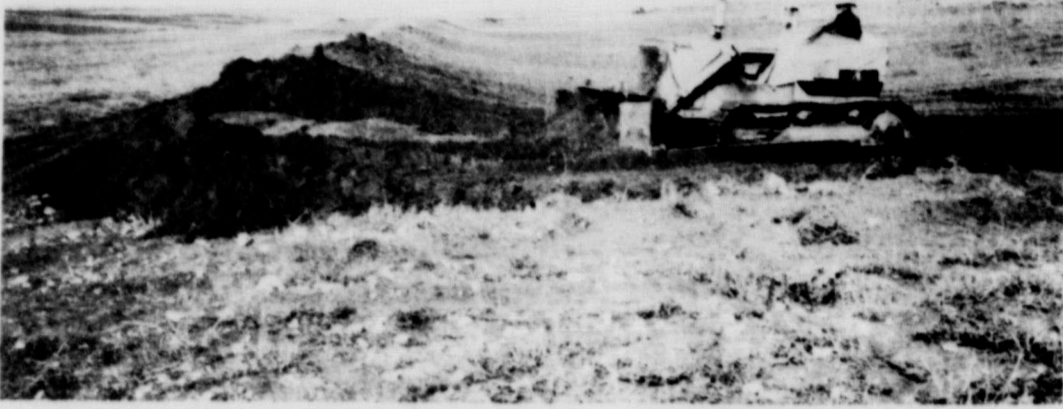

MOVIE CHATTER

In this year of the non-hero, debunking legends may become a regular ingredient of films with historical backgrounds. "Doc" showing at the Rogue theatre this week is one of these. It attempts to show that Wyatt Earp, Doc Holliday and Katie Elder were less than admirable people. Only Earp's reputation is tarnished, since Holliday and Katie Elder emerge as flawed but altogether human and likeable. Since Doc was a gunman and Katie a prostitute they obviously had less to lose. As played by Harris Yulin, Earp is a tight-lipped peace officer who is both an opportunist and a defender of the law. Stacy Keach's Doc is more complex, a former dentist with a fetish for cleanliness, he admits his own weaknesses without excuses. Faye Dunaway as Katie is more of a stereotype, but she handles it well.

Set in Tombstone, Ariz., the movie takes in such things as gambling, prostitution, Election of Earp as Sheriff and the battle of the O.K. Corral. This movie is rated R.

"Let's Scare Jessica to Death" begins at the Prevue and then again Sunday.

In this movie, Jessica (Zohra Lampert), a young woman recently released from a rest home journeys to Connecticut with her husband Duncan (Barton Heyman) and his friend Woody (Kevin O'Connor).

The trio is traveling by hearse to an old farm house Duncan has recently purchased. On the way, they stop at a graveyard so that Jessica can make a pencil rubbing of an old gravestone.

In the graveyard Jessica hears voices calling her name but she tries to ignore them. They continue on to the farm house.

It is well past dusk when they arrive and discover a strange girl living in the house. Emily seems harmless enough and they decide to let her spend the night since she has nowhere else to go.

In the ensuing days, the mental turbulence which has haunted Jessica worsens and she and Duncan experience increasing difficulty with their marriage. Duncan finds a strong attraction to Emily.

One day, while going through the old bric-a-brac in the attic, Jessica discovers an old photograph of the family that lived in the house over 100 years ago. She is struck by the marked resemblance between the young daughter in the picture and Emily.

In order to make some money they decide to sell the antiques found in the attic, so Duncan and Jessica drive the hearse into town where they are met with a strange, cold hostility. The couple end up at an antique barn where the dealer indicates that there is something supernatural about their farm house.

The next day Jessica is walking in the orchard when she sees a girl with flowing blonde hair matining to her from a hill. She runs after the girl and finally catches up to her but the girl cannot speak and breaks away. As Jessica starts back again she sees the antique dealer lying dead in her path.

Screaming, she rushes for the house where Duncan comes to her aid. They return to the spot but there is no body. Duncan is now convinced that his wife is going over the brink.

Emily eventually attacks Jessica, showing every sign of being a vampire. She runs to her room where she barricades the door. She decides to go warn Woody who is out in the field but she finds him dead.

Horrified, she runs from the field deep into the woods until she drops from exhaustion.

When Jessica awakens, Duncan is beside her and takes her back to the house. They enter the darkened bedroom and as they are kissing Jessica sees a fresh scar on Duncan's neck. Suddenly, the room is full of vampires. Jessica breaks away and manages to get to a boat and away from the shore. She looks back at the shostly silhouettes on the shore and contemplates what has happened.

Across the Fence

 Winter returned this week. The small amount of snow added little to moisture we need now to aid growth of wheat and rye. A lot of folks have intentions to plant acreages of lovegrass this spring. Looks like the price of seed will be a lot higher from some of the price we've been receiving. On the subject of lovegrass-the bred cow winter cost study in Wheeler is progressing nicely. The cows were weighed on standing dormant lovegrass pasture in November and received no additional hay and about a pound of protein each day. The cows are due to calve sometime after February 1 and are in excellent condition. Wintering cost will be about a nickle a day. Looks like this data will be invaluable

for folks wintering mother cows. Think of the labor involved in baling hay, stacking, reloading on trucks and then feeding it to the cows. The Amarillo Stockshow is now history. Greg Estes of Mobeetie showed a lamb and a barrow. Competition was keen. We'll begin work in earnest during February helping boys and girls get some 100 pigs and 26 steers and heifers ready for the County Show at Mobeetie and Wheeler and the Top 'O Texas Show at Pampa. Vernon Davenport and I.A. Brooks at Shamrock have built a calf strimming chute for clipping steers and heifers. This should be of real help to youngsters in their area preparing calves for shows. Five club calves from the Shamrock area will be coming to the County Show. This is more representation than in several years. Leaders parents and 4-H and FFA members are to be commended for their effort and encouragement.

Pecan trees should be fertilized this month. In our highly alkaline (sweet) soils, better results from zinc sulfate for control of pecan rosette can be had by applying to pecan trees as a foliar spray as soon as new growth starts in the spring. A few weeks ago we sent a sample of mineral material to A&M for analysis for J. Evert Smith. The soil, collected at Smith's farm at Twitty, was x-ray analyzed and found to be gypsum and quartz with calcium carbonate concretions. Perhaps there is a commercial use for this deposit of mineral?

My own humble opinion is that, with the exception of a few favored localities, the whole Great Plains region is already a desert that cannot be reclaimed through the plans and labors of men. A young Meade, Kansas farmer wrote this statement in his book, An Empire of Dust, in 1929 after 9 years of hardship in the dust bowl. In less than fifty years, this young man's statement has been proven false through wise conservation efforts and grassland farming and range management.
