Christian, long an advocate of reform in Texas government, said, "I will continue to push for changes in House rules and procedures, including limitation of powers of the Speaker of the House.

Christian added, "1 believe that we must also work with the Texas Board of Education and our local school boards to develop a plan for maintaining local control of our childrens'

We must strive to increase vocational education opportunities and work for welfare reform that will alleviate the great burden that is being placed on our taxpaying citizens."

'In my campaign I will continue to stress the needs of agriculture with emphasis on research that will help us to prevent the problems with quarantines that we now face."

Christian added, "It is imperative that we get our water plan off the drawing board and in operation. combined with research in the area of brush control that will conserve that water supply that is now available to us.

As a member of the Legislature, Christian has served as a member of the Committees on Juvenile Crime and Delinquency, Criminal Jurisprudence, Public Education, Livestock, and Public Lands and Buildings.

He is currently a member of the Committees on Revenue and Taxation. Parks and Wildlife, Elections, Penitentiaries, and Business and Marketing Affairs.

A graduate of West Texas State University, Christian is a former teacher and coach. He served in the United States Navy and a member of the Ceremonial Guard in Washington, D.C.

He is a director of the Armstrong County Medical Center, a director of the Panhandle Livestock Assoc., a director of the Panhandle-Plains Historical Society, and a past chairman of the Board of Stewards of the First United Methodist



MOVIE CHATTER

In this year of the nonhero, debunking legends may become a regular ingredient of films with historical backgrounds. "Doc" showing at the Rogue theatre this week is one of these. It attempts to show that Wyatt Earp, Doc Holliday and Kate Elder were less than admirable people. Only Earp's reputation is tarnished, since Holliday and Katie Elder emerge as flawed but altogether human and likeable. Since Doc was a gunman and Katie a prostitute they obviously had less to lose. As played by Harris Yulin, Earp is a tight-lipped peace officer who is both an opportunist and a defender of the law. Stacy Keach's Doc is more complex; a former dentist with a fetish for cleanlinees, he admits his own weaknesses without excuses. Faye Dunaway as Kate is more of a stereotype, but she handles it well.

Set in Toombstone, Ariz., the movie takes in such things over the weekend with her as gambling, prostitution, Election of Earp as Sheriff and the battle of the O.K. Corral. This movie is rated

"Let's Scare Jessica to Death" begins at the Prevue and then again Sunday. In this movie, Jessica (Zohra Lampert), a young woman recently released from a rest home journies to Connecticut with her husband Duncan (Barton Heyman) and his friend Woody (Kevin

O'Connor). The trio is traveling by hearse to an old farm house Duncan has recently purchased. On the way, they stop at a graveyard so that Jessica can make a pencil rubbing of an old gravestone. In the graveyard Jessica Hears voices calling her name but she tries to ignore them. They continue on to

the farm house. It is well past dusk when they arrive and discover a strange girl living in the house. Emily seems harmless enough and they decide to let her spend the night since

she has nowhere else to go. In the ensuing days, the mental turbulence which has haunted Jessica worsens and she and Duncan experience increasing difficulty with their marriage. Duncan finds a strong attraction to Emily.

One day, while going through the old bric-a-brac in the attic, Jessica discovers an old photograph of the family that lived in the house over 100 years ago. She is struck by the marked resemblance between the young daughter in the picture and Emily.

In order to make some money they decide to sell the antiques found in the attic, so Duncan and Jessica drive the hearse into town where they are met with a strange, cold hostility. The couple end up at an antique barn where the dealer indicates that there is something super natural about their farm house

The next day Jessica is walking in the orchard when she sees a girl with flowing blonde hair motioning to her from a hill. She runs after the girl and finally catches up to her but the girl cannot speak and breaks away. As Jessica starts back again she sees the anti que dealer lying dead in her path. Screaming, she rushes for the house where Duncan comes to her aid. They return to the spot but there is no body. Duncan is now convinced that his wife is going

over the brink. Emily eventually attacks Jessica, showing every sign of being a vampire. She runs to her room where she barricades the door. She decides to go warn Woody who is out in the field but she finds him dead.

Horrified, she runs from the field deep into the woods until she drops from exhaustion.

When Jessica awakens. Duncan is beside her and takes her back to the house They enter the darkened bedroom and as they are kissing Jessica sees a fresh scar on Duncan's neck. Suddenly, the room is full of vam pires. Jessica breaks away and manages to get to a boat e and away from the shore. 




