Burning the Log

From a miraculous Star to a tiny candle, gleaming lights have cast a glow over holiday festivities for centuries.

Pagan sun-worshippers lit candles and kindled fires at winter festivals to help the returning sun gain strength.

Traditional for both light and warmth is the blazing Yule log. Like all "Christmas lights," it has both a religious and a festive significance in holiday lore.

Because legend says that the Christ Child was washed and dressed beside an ash wood fire, the people of early England always had Yule logs of ash wood. Ash had a practical aspect, too, because it was the only green wood which would burn

The Yule log of England and continental Europe was often believed to have mystical powers to protect the home. To give this protection, the Yule log had to be kept burning all through the 12 days of Christ-

Later, the "blazing Yule" was primarily associated with the feasting and festivity of the winter holidays.

proaches, farmers should be thinking of their potentail income tax liability for 1971. To minimize the tax burden overtime, sales and expenditures should be managed to balance taxable income from year to year. The primary objective of income tax management is to re-

move the sizeable annual fluctuations in taxable income characteristics of

Some of the tools that can be utioized to shift income and expenses between accounting periods by farmers accounting on the cash-basis are: (1) postponement of sales past January 1, (2) deferred payment sales, (3) installment sales, (4) prepayment of interest up to one year in advance, (5) advance purchases of inputs and supplies, and (6) postpone-

ment of deductions by allow-

ing current liabilities to carryover into next year. If an individual is not well versed in the income law and the interpretations of the various regulations, expert advice from someone closely associated with these complicated factors is warranted. The area offices of the Internal Revenue Service is a prime source to obtain explanations and interpretations of particularly complicated situations. Income tax evasion is a felony, but avoiding unnecessary income taxes is good business. Livestock destroyed by disease--Persons having animals destroyed by disease and collecting insurance April 1. or indemnities can choose to have any gain postponed for income tax purposes. The regulation stated "Livestock destroyed by disease or on account of disease (including ordinary death from disease) or livestock sold or exchanged because of disease are treated as if they were involuntarily con-

verted. Insurance proceeds, sale proceeds, or amounts received from the government for condemnation of diseased livestock may be reinvested in like animals, and the taxpayer may elect to have the recognition of the gain postponed. The replacement privilege applies to all livestock whether held for use in the business or held for sale, if the animals would not otherwise have been sold at that time.' 



You must have an inspection certificate signed by a state or federal livestock inspector if you take cattle to a sale in Oklahoma. You may take cattle to sales in Amarillo and they will be inspected at the sale. There will be

man's most valuable assets – we think it is prime another on-the-farm inspection by federal animal health people before the quarantine order is relaxed. They will be looking for cattle scratching themselves and for the characteristic scabs on the cattle.

If you have an animal that you suspect of having scabies, follow this technique to find out. Scrape the affected scab with a bluntedged knife until the blood oozes from the tissue. Place the scrapings on a dark background in the warm sunshine. You can use artificial heat. The mites, if they are present, will be visible to the naked eye. We'll keep a list of peo-

ple who want to have their cattle checked for scabies. When the inspector comes, they will receive the list. After the inspection, a permit will be issued that will enable you to move your cattle to another farm or pasture. If you need to have a slip to move your cattle leave your name at our office. We'll see that they get it.

If scabies mites are found you will be required to dip your cattle twice. When the inspectors are satisfied that no scabies ases are in the county, the quarantine order will be lifted and we can go on about our business. Sayre and Elk City

4 or 5 days when we visited his pasture. Higher nitrate conditions are more common in plants

during such weather conditions. At the same time, grazing animals tend to lose more energy during cooler weather and are therefore more susceptible to nitrate poisoning.

We're not sure that cattle shouldn't be removed from wheat pastures entirely during blizzard conditions and fed in the lot. There are certain steps you can take to minimize the risk of nitrate poisoning in your livestock:

1. Feed a high energy ration before placing cattle on small grain pastures. This will provide the anin als with energy as well as inhibit a rapid intake of plant material over a short period of time. A mixture of grain and molasses should provide the needed energy. 2. Observe closely all cattle on small grain pastures. A veterinarian should be called at the first signs of illness. Early treatment is necessary to keep affec-


