JUDGE GEO. HEFLEY DECLARES "3.76 in '76" WEEK FOR COUNTY

PROCLAMATION
"3.76 in '76 Week"
WHEREAS, the Texas agricultural industry, in all of its phases, continues to be the most important industry, and
WHEREAS, agriculture continues to have great growth potential in our county and the rewards from such growth accruing to the benefit of all citizens, and
WHEREAS, there is an urgent need for an active crusade to increase the public's knowledge, acceptance, and appreciation for the highly significant contribution which agriculture makes to the economy of our county and to the level of living enjoyed by its citizens, and
WHEREAS, it is recognized that all citizens of this county have a vital stake and a legitimate self-interest in the general well-being of the farmers and ranchers who provide the great abundance and variety of food and fiber of highest quality which we all enjoy, and
WHEREAS, "3.76 in '76" is a well-conceived program designed by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, with the endorsement and active support of agricultural agencies, organizations, and individual leaders, to help the agricultural industry achieve its full potential through an intensification of efforts by producers, agribusinesses, and professional agriculturists to bring about an increase in the income to Texas farmers and ranchers of \$1 billion by the end of crop year 1976, and
WHEREAS, \$610 million of the \$1 billion goal has been achieved through the 71 agricultural season, and
WHEREAS, the achievement of an increase of \$9 million agricultural income by the end of crop year 1976 will improve the net profit position of Wheeler County farmers and ranchers and make highly significant contributions to the future economy of the county,
THEREFORE, I,

Livest'k Inspectors Complete Training

J. M. Liles, Danny Dorman of Wheeler and Douglas Corse of Mobeetie have completed training courses in cattle scabies identification. Mr. Dorman and Mr. Corse will be working in Wheeler County while Mr. Liles will be in Hemphill County to help cattlemen move their livestock to market during the current cattle scabies quarantine.
The quarantine is aimed at halting the worst cattle scabies outbreak to hit the nation since 1959. The eradication effort needs specially trained men like these because the mites that cause cattle scab are hard to spot. The mites are often masked by pesticides used to kill ticks and lice.
These three new inspectors and the other inspectors in the quarantine area are helping cattlemen identify infected animals and clean them of mites. If every head of infected and exposed cattle in the quarantine area is inspected and the affected animal is properly dipped for scabies the quarantine can be lifted.

All cattle in our area, except fat cattle for slaughter, have to be dipped within 10 days prior to entry into Oklahoma. Cattle ready for slaughter may enter the state under a special permit and approval of the state veterinarian. Texas also requires that all cattle from Oklahoma coming into Texas from the quarantined Oklahoma counties be dipped before crossing the state line. The following personnel from the Texas Animal Health Commission are available to inspect cattle for movement of cattle within the county and to cattle sales. W. O. Jones; West Motel, Wheeler - Doug Course, Mobeetie and Danny Dorman of Wheeler.

PAT'S PARAGRAPHS

Sure seems nice to get over the holiday "mix-ups" and back into a normal pace!

This is for those of you that are "look-ahead" and

"Plan-ahead" gardeners. We received a new seed catalog for flowers, shrubs, fruits, and vegetables today. You're welcome to come look through it!

I must really be in the dark! After reading an article sent to me about baking soda, I realized that my knowledge of its uses was limited. It has many varied uses.

It can be used in solution or dry. A solution of soda, about 3 tbsp. per qt. of water, makes a good cleaner for large surfaces such as woodwork, tile, porcelain, enamel or plastic. You just sponge it on and rinse. It's also the traditional cleaning solution for the refrigerator, and all its trappings, the coffeepot, and teapot, and cut glass and crystal.

I knew that it was good as a scourer for everything from sinks, countertops and chopping boards to small appliances, such as the toaster, that need a good shine.

For speedy sprinkling, transfer some baking soda from package to a plastic refrigerator container. Punch holes in the screw-on lid and station your scouring shaker sink-side.

Using baking soda for much of your cleaning offers one more sizeable advantage, odorless itself, baking soda ousts unwanted smells by absorbing and neutralizing them rather than masking them with a synthetic fragrance. This article suggested storing an open package of baking soda in the refrigerator. It catches those escaping food smells like a magnet. You should shake up the package occasionally to expose a fresh layer of soda; and when a whiff of it turns up your nose, it's time for a new package.

Here's a recipe from the "Do-It-All Cookbook". This is a little pamphlet of recipes using tomato soup. I have them in my office if you would like to have one. This recipe is one that I tried, just for fun, and liked.

Steak Sauce
1 small clove garlic, minced
1 tbsp. butter
1 tbsp. bottled meat sauce
1 can (10 1/2 oz.) tomato soup
1/2 cup water
dash hot pepper sauce
Cook garlic in butter in a saucepan. Add remaining ingredients. Cook over low heat for 5 min. Stir now and then. Makes about 1 1/4 cups sauce. Serve over steak.

With him at Ontario are his wife, Linda and his major-domo, Pete who looks after his motorcycles, ramps and other equipment. A visitor is Doc Kincaid the surgeon who sews him together following his bone-shattering falls.

Prior to the actual jump, a series of flashbacks reveal the road that Evel has traveled, and some of the incidents in his life which have brought him to this moment at Ontario. He is shown as a boy growing up in Butte, Montana, as a teenager courting his wife in good-natured ruckuses with the law, in the person of the Butte sheriff.

Depicted are his encounters with the promoter who gave him his first opportunity to perform his stunts as a professional and a veteran rodeo performer who died with his boots on.

Early and recent footage of Evel doing his incredible stunts is shown. Included are performances at the San Francisco Cow Palace, Houston Astrodome and Caesar's Palace in Las Vegas, where he fell and broke his back.

Apparent is the fact that one thread runs constant throughout his life - an overwhelming desire to earn fame and fortune as the world's greatest motorcyclist.
