### Voter Registration Certificates Must Be Obtained

The time for voter registration is getting close to the end for persons desiring to vote in the upcoming elections to be held in the earlier part of the year. A person must be registered at least thirty days before an election to be eligible to vote in that election.

The voters applications were mailed to all persons that were registered to vote last year about October 1, 1971. These applications must be signed and returned to the County Tax Office before a Voter Certificate can be mailed back to you. If you have received an application and have not returned it to the tax office, then you are not a registered voter and are not eligible to vote in any election. We must have the APPLICATION first.

Some have been under the impression that they are already registered after receiving the application, but they are not unless the APPLICATION has been returned along with their signature and returned for the CERTIFICATE. Please check your card and see if it reads APPLICATION or CERTIFICATE. If it reads APPLICATION, then you are not registered.

If you did not register last year then you can make application this year and receive your voter registration certificate for the coming elections. You must vote in the primaries or general elections to retain your certificate in force. Each year that you vote in those two elections or either one of them your certificate will be automatically extended for voting privileges for another year.

this Friday and Saturday. Will Tenneray (Kirk Douglas) lives in the town with his wife, (Jane Alexander) and nine-year-old son (Eric Douglas). Abe Cross (Johnny Cash) comes to the town after an unsuccessful mining expedition in Mexico.

Despite their celebrated past, both men have been struggling to make a living for the past few years, taking odd and sometimes demeaning jobs. Now, their mere presence in the same town together makes the townspeople speculate on what would be the result of a gunfight between them. ### OUT OF THE PAST . . .

From the January 9, 1947 edition of the Times (25 years ago) we find an article about low teacher pay. Wheeler teachers were receiving \$144 a month starting pay and a raise of \$1.50 per month for every year teaching experience to a maximum of \$159.00

Rooms were needed for about 45 out-of-town high school students for Wheeler High School Invitational basketball tournament.

The worst snow storm blizzard in years with snow ranging from 8" to 2 ft was in progress.

College Station reported Electricity, running water and modern bathrooms were at the top of the list of improvements that farmers were making as materials became available.

Department stores were advertising men's hats at \$1.98 and ladies hats at 98¢. Lee Hart wore had two piece studio suites at \$109.00 while a 5 piece maple breakfast suit was \$42.50. Coffee tables were \$8.50 to \$14.50. and platform rockers were \$27.50 to \$37.50.

Grocery stores had T-bone steak at 85¢ a pound, chuck roast at 33¢ a lb. and flour at \$1.59 for a 25 lb. sack. U.S. No. 2 potatoes were \$1.35 for 50 lbs. and 1 dozen eggs were 35¢.

Jan. 10, 1957 - 15 years Wheeler County Produce had moved to Howard's Roller Rink. Dresses were advertised

for \$8.95 and \$4.00. Cotton piece goods were 44¢ a yard. At the grocery stores a can of tuna was 29¢, a Qt. of Bleach 15¢, 2 lbs. bacon 89¢ and a pound of coffee 85¢.

Jan. 11, 1962, 10 years ago The weather was 10 below zero as a cold spell swept through.

The Methodists held an open house of the new parsonage.

Department stores had white double fitted sheets for \$1.88.

### CAMPAIGN CONTRIBUTIONS AND EXPENDITURES MUST BE RECORDED

Secretary of State Bob Bullock announced Friday that, as the State's chief election officer, he has issued to all persons involved in the election process a directive governing the maintaining and reporting of campaign contributions and expenditures.

"The Texas Election Code clearly specifies," Bullock said, "that the people have a legal right to know who contributes money, how much money is contributed and how the money is expended in every campaign for elective public office in Texas.

"Likewise, contributors themselves have the right to know that their contributions are expended for campaign purposes and not diverted to fulfill a candidate's personal financial obligations.

"Unfortunately, however, it has become common practice for candidates to list names and addresses which are insufficient to identify the contributors. In addition, records have frequently not been maintained or made available to the public concerning the sources, amounts and expenditures of contributions to local campaign committees and candidate clubs.

"The failure to keep complete, accurate, and up-to-date records during campaigns has led to reports

that do not sufficiently inform the electorate or conform to the spirit of the law.

"An absence of any guidelines and the lack of interpretation of the reporting section of the statute have led to confusion of the part of candidates who wish to fully comply with the law but are unsure of what is required of them.

"I have the duty and the responsibility, as the State's chief election officer, to help eliminate confusion and possible evasion in the reporting of campaign contributions and expenditures and to standardize the reporting procedure.

"Therefore, I am today issuing the attached directive to all persons in Texas involved in the election process. The full compliance with this directive that we expect will provide us for the first time with complete public disclosure of all campaign financing in this state.

## Across the Fence

The replays of the superbowl were high points of interest as you watched your favorite team last weekend. The starter's whistle has blown for the 1972 game on your farming and ranching business. You have received the kickoff. Let's call time out and replay your 1971 experience there in the comfort of your living room. From the same chair that you watched the bowl game replays, let's "size-up" the opposition that stands between you and 1972 touchdowns.  
The fastest way to gain yardage is, let us say, the pass. In beef production, the greatest gains are made by high percentage calf crops. Was your pass complete or was it intercepted by disease or loss of the calf. If you run stocker calves or southern steers, did you lose yardage when some of 'em died? Perhaps you had a safety man that prevented disease from getting over the goal line. Dead calves don't raise the score with your banker.  
The referee in the cowboy game is always the weather. Right now the weather's on our side and the drought we had on the last play (Year) has been penalized.  
We predict a 20% increase in beef production here in our county in 1972. Established improved pastures, wheat grazing and the weather all figure in. While you're in the huddle making plans for this year, figure on fertilizing your grass for the most yardage. The old 30-40-0 play on lovegrass applied in last March, early June and August will keep your herd ahead all year.  
Don't forget the old triple option play where you crossfence your pastures so you can rest one side while grazing the other. During time outs, pass out the high phosphorus blocks.  
Treat your players for lice, grubs, and mange this time of year. Heavy infestations of these pests weaken animals, make them more susceptible to other diseases and interfere with growth.  
Rabbits and gophers injure a lot of young peach trees during the winter. Rabbits will stay away from trees treated with a repellent made by mixing powdered rosin, 8 pounds, and denatured ethyl alcohol, 1 gal. Lump rosin is pulverized with a wooden mallet and dissolved in the alcohol by stirring without heating. The repellent should be applied with a small brush to any part of the tree which rabbits can reach, but should be applied only when the bark is absolutely dry.  
Southern steers gained 2/3 of a pound a day while grazing mismanaged aftermath of common weeping lovegrass from Nov. 12 to Jan. 12 in our winter grazing trials at Wheeler. The steers consumed nearly a pound of protein blocks and cotton meal a day at a cost of 7 1/2¢ a day. The steers ate the dormant aftermath readily and had access to a small amount of ryegrass pasture. We'll have more on this study by spring.
