## ROGERS TO HEAD EASTER SEAL CAMPAIGN

Joe Rogers will head the 1972 Easter Seal Appeal in Wheeler County, it was announced by Rodney D. Hix, Dallas, President of the Easter Seal Society Applied Children and Adults of Texas.

Residents of Wheeler County will receive the Easter Seal Appeal in the mail beginning February 28. The Easter Seal Appeal, conducted to provide disabled children and their families with needed treatment and services, will be through Easter Seal, April 2.

This is one of 223 men and women serving in this capacity throughout Texas. The cost of the state-wide Easter Seal program is one million dollars, and is paid mainly by the Easter Seal Appeal.

Almost 90 percent of all funds raised by the Easter Seal Appeal remain in Texas to support the growing needs of the disabled in the State.

Special emphasis is being given in the 1972 Easter Seal Appeal to the disabled citizen or his family in Wheeler County who may need assistance and not know where to obtain it. Any disabled person can contact Mr. Rogers at the First National Bank, Wheeler, who will refer the request for services to the Easter Seal Society.

A determination of the extent and type of assistance needed and the most efficient means of obtaining that assistance will be made. Arrangements for needed treatment or service will be made by the Easter Seal Society.

## What The Bible Says About Christ

The Bible teaches that Christ is God's son. In this article we will learn many wonderful things about Christ. It is wonderful to know that one such as Jesus was willing to leave heaven and come to provide salvation for you and me.

The first thing we want to notice is that Christ is God's son. On one occasion Jesus had just asked His disciples if they were going to leave him as some had done. Peter said: "Lord, to whom shall we go? thou hast the words of eternal life. And we believe and are sure that thou art the Christ, the Son of the living God." (John 6:69)

When Jesus came to the disciples on the coast of Caesarea and Phillippi, he asked them who they said he was. Peter answered: "Thou art the Christ, the Son of the living God." (Matt 16:13-17)

On the mount when Jesus was transfigured before Peter, James and John, the voice of God broke the silence of heaven once again, and said: "This is my beloved Son, in whom I am well pleased hear ye Him" (Matt 17:5) In this example we see that Jesus was not only the Son of God, but was to be heard rather than any other person.

The Bible teaches that God loved the world and sent Christ to save us. One of the greatest, no doubt the very greatest love story of the Bible, is the story of how God made it possible for us to be saved. "For God so loved the world, that he gave His only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in Him should not perish, but have everlasting life." (John 3:16). This is called by some, the golden text of the Bible. It is a golden statement, for it shows us that God loved us so much that he was willing to send His own Son that we might be saved and not be lost in Hell.

The Bible teaches that Christ was in the beginning with God. This is pointed out when we read John 1:1,14

In the very first verse we read: "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. The same was in the beginning with God." This verse teaches that the Word was with God. Verse 14 states: "And the Word was made flesh and dwelt among us, (and we beheld His glory the glory as of the only begotten of the Father) full of grace and truth." Hence,

we see that the Word was in the beginning with God, was God, and then became flesh and dwelt among us. Therefore, we know that this speaks of Christ and we see that he was in the beginning with God, His Father.

The Bible teaches that Christ has been given all power in heaven and earth. One of the important events which took place after the resurrection of Christ was his appearance to his disciples and the giving of what is commonly known as the great commission. The time which is mentioned is Matthew 28:18-20. In this passage Christ said: "All power is given to me in heaven and earth, go ye therefore and teach all nations, baptizing them into the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you. Lo, I am with you always, even unto the end of the world."

Since Christ has been given all power, then we certainly should remember that we must study the Bible, find out what Jesus has told us to do, and do it with all our might.

The Bible teaches that Christ is the Saviour of the world. An angel of the Lord appeared to Joseph (Mary's husband) and said to him regarding Mary: "And she shall bring forth a son, and thou shalt call his name Jesus: for he shall save His people from their sins." (Matt. 1:21)

John the Baptist called Christ: "the Lamb of God, which taketh away the sins of the world." (John 1:29)

The Bible teaches that Christ died, was buried, and rose again the third day. The salvation of all sinners is dependent upon the death, burial, and resurrection of Christ. Through the death, burial and resurrection of Christ, redemption has been brought to the world.

It was the will of God that sent Christ to earth. Christ said that he came to do the Father's will and not His own. (Jh 5:30) Without any murmuring or complaining, Christ humbled himself unto obedience unto His Father and to the death on the cross, that salvation might be provided for you and me. (Phil 2:5-8)

God's plan was for Christ to die, be buried, and raised again. This plan was carried out in exactness, and after much abuse Jesus was crucified and buried in a borrowed tomb. On the third day he came forth and wrote an eternal "yes" to the age-old question asked by Job: "If a man die will he live again?" We rejoice today because Jesus Christ lives

and has provided a way by which we might be saved from our own sins.

The Bible teaches that by Christ's death, burial, and resurrection we can be saved. The apostle Paul, writing to the church in Rome, pointed out that we must obey the form of the death, burial and resurrection of Christ to walk in newness of life. In Romans 6:17, Paul teaches that the Romans had obeyed that form of teaching. And in Romans 6:3-5 Paul says: "are ye ignorant that all we who were baptized into Christ

Jesus were baptized into death: that like as Christ was raised from the dead through the glory of the Father, so we also might walk in newness of life. Peaches may be native to China, but they are "all-American" in popularity.

Canned peaches are right at home in the American kitchen. They're easily stored and may be used in any part of the meal. They can be served hot or cold.

If you're wondering about how to heat and use peaches, there are several methods. Broiled peach halves add to any meal. Just sprinkle

the peaches with brown sugar or bread crumbs for quick browning. Place on an empty broiler pan or with other foods for the last five minutes of broiler time.

For oven heating, you can add them to an oven meal - such as a roast, meat loaf, or casserole - during the last 15 minutes of baking time. From cupboard to saucenpan is simple. They're ready-prepared and quick to heat. Bring them to a boil in their own syrup.

Canned peach halves are wonderful heated on the outdoor barbecue. Place in foil right on the broiler rack about five minutes, when the hamburgers or chicken are just about ready to serve.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's consumer and

Marketing Service says canned peaches are plentiful. Try these Quick Peach Muffins.

1 can (1 lb) cling peach slices  
2 cups biscuit mix  
1 tbs. sugar  
1 egg  
2 tbs. melted butter  
2/3 cup peach syrup

Drain peaches, saving syrup. Combine biscuit mix with sugar, egg, melted butter, and peach syrup. Mix quickly and fill greased or paper-lined muffin cups 1/2 to 2/3 full. Arrange one or two peach slices on each muffin. Bake in 400° oven for 20 min. Makes 12 muffins.

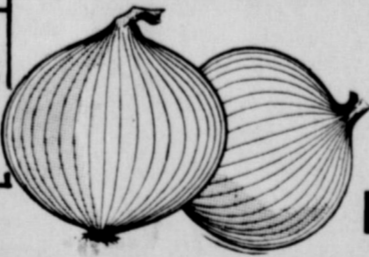

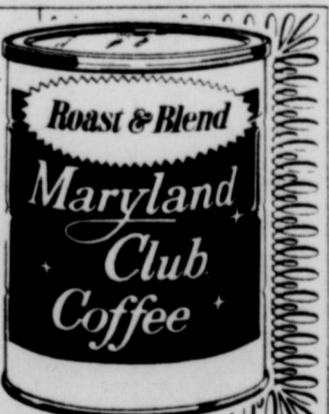

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# Across the Fence

by: Max Hatter, CAA

The January issue of the Southern Beef Producers says that if the average commercial beef producer with above average cows decide to disperse his herd, these cows bred to drop calves this spring would bring somewhere around \$300 head each. If he had 100 cows he would receive about \$30,000. This is a lot of money on today's money market. He could realize from most banks \$1,800 in interest. They go on to say that from 100 cows, on the average, we could expect to wean about 82 calves. These calves at 465 pounds at weaning and selling for 35¢ would gross \$162.75 or \$13,833.75 for the year's work. Annual cow cost must be somewhere in the neighborhood of \$95 for each cow. This means before

we have anything, this figure of \$9,500 must be subtracted. We get a net figure of \$4,833.75. Not too bad, but can a family exist for 12 months on this amount! Most of us are in the cattle business because we love the business, but we can never lose sight of the fact that our primary interest is to make a good living and put aside a nest egg for a rainy day.

Another comment he

made was on an inventory of our assets. He commented that so many of us measure assets by the amount of money we have in our savings account, the amount of bank stock we own or the amount of life insurance we have. The greatest asset that a family has are its sons and daughters - the greatest crop in the world. He challenged the beef cattle producers to do everything possible to make men and women out of our boys and girls. He suggests that we get them involved in wholesome youth

adventures, livestock events, because they will be the cattlemen of tomorrow.

4-H leaders, parents and vo-agri. teachers have been encouraging Wheeler County youth to prepare steer and heifer calves for the Wheeler County Show on Friday afternoon, March 3 at Mobeetie. We hope that you will come out and see their projects at this time and show them your support.

There's money in hogs now! Prices look very favorable. Demand for feeder pigs is up. A grinder-mixer, some good doing pigs and self feeders make this project a good "farm mortgage lifter" for many families.

Wheat poisoning is bad news for stocker calf growers. With warmer weather returning in a few weeks, the lush wheat we hope to have can bring us some problems. Dr. Gene Cope, our new area veterinarian was by our office last week and left us a wheat pasture mineral mix formula by Farr Better Feeds. The mixture contains 19% magnesium oxide. The calves need to eat about 4 oz. daily of this mixture. A person can increase the cottonseed meal and decrease the poly-phos to make the mixture more

palatable. A ton of the mix can be prepared in a grinder-mixer as follows:  
cotton seed meal - 275 lb.  
Calcium - 70  
Poly-phos - 600  
Trace minerals - 50  
Salt - 300  
Mineral Oil - 20  
Cattle lure - 4  
Iron oxide - 680  
Molasses - 100  
This mix will not control bloat. Since Epsom salts is a laxative, the use of it as a magnesium source

when wheat is lush may present problems. Another thing to keep in mind that my Dad told me is that magnesium oxide if 54% available magnesium while Epsom salt is about 3%.  
These are all preventive measures for wheat poisoning. They are not cures. Nitrate poisoning, protein poisoning when levels of protein on wheat are too high could also cause losses.
