Patricia Palmer, CHDA anybody does it - and economists study it. The consumer buying. As how some of us can consumers spent money in 1970.

As for housing, almost 4% of non-farm families purchased a house in 1970, while 1% bought a trailer. It was also a banner year for folks making repairs and additions to their housing. Some 43% of

all non-farm families did something about improving their homes.

As for household durables, such as furniture, refrigerators, washing machines, clothes dryers, television sets, and air conditioners - about 47% of all families bought at least one of these appliances in 1970. The most popular purchase in household durables among families was furniture - bought by 18%.

Who were the major purchasers of furniture and household appliances? As might be expected, most frequently, they were young people beginning married lives and starting families.

I think it's interesting to compare my own buying to that of the "average" consumer. (Found out I'm not an "average" consumer.)

The Food and Drug Administration has made a study and reported that enzyme containing laundering products are safe for human health. This was reported in November 1971. They found that enzyme detergents have not produced more irritation of the skin than have similar products containing no enzymes.

A new fabric that feels like suede and washes with ease is the darling of the sports-wear world. Now being shown in jeans and jackets, "vellux" feels so soft and suede-y it is fast becoming the most popular "skin" in town. The fabric is made of silky rayon flocked to durable dacron and cotton poplin; comes in a variety of brown shades.

The USDA says potatoes are plentiful this month. Here is a recipe for using any (if you have any) leftover potatoes.

POTATO SOUFFLE
2 cups seasoned mashed potatoes
1 tbsp. minced parsley
1 tbsp. green onion
1-3 cup grated cheese
4 egg yolks, well beaten
4 egg whites, stiffly beaten
Add parsley, onion and cheese to mashed potatoes. Beat in egg yolks and then fold in egg whites. Pour in 1 1/2 qt. casserole and bake at 350° for 30 to 35 min. Serve piping hot as a delicious accompaniment to seafood and broiled fish platters.

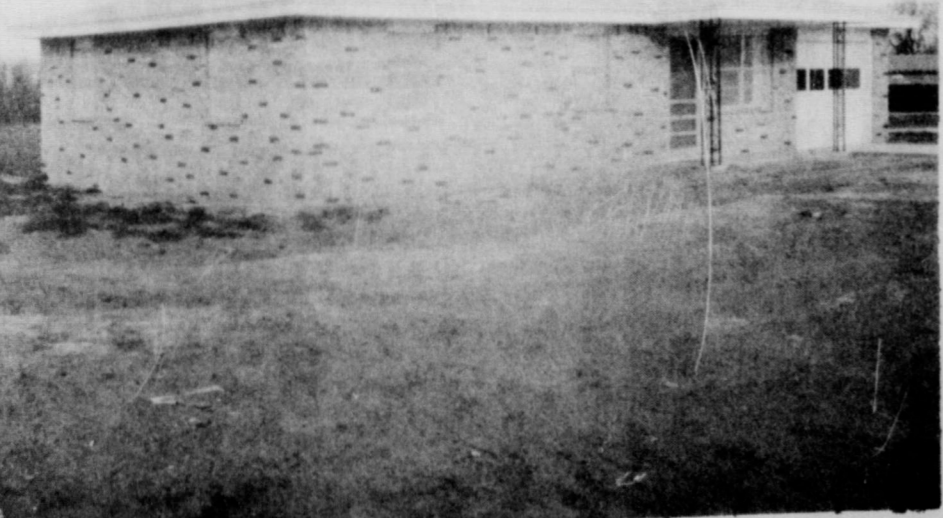

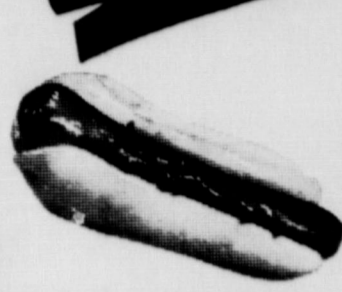
