Be sure your pet is on a leash or otherwise restrained before entering the Vaccination Clinic

Because a rabid skunk (confirmed by State Health Department Laboratory) was found last week in Wheeler, your City Government urges 100% participation in this Public Health Project and promises to impound all unvaccinated cats and dogs and other mammal pets following the clinic with the intent of epidemic prevention. City and County Health Officers caution everyone to avoid contact with wild wildlife mammals.

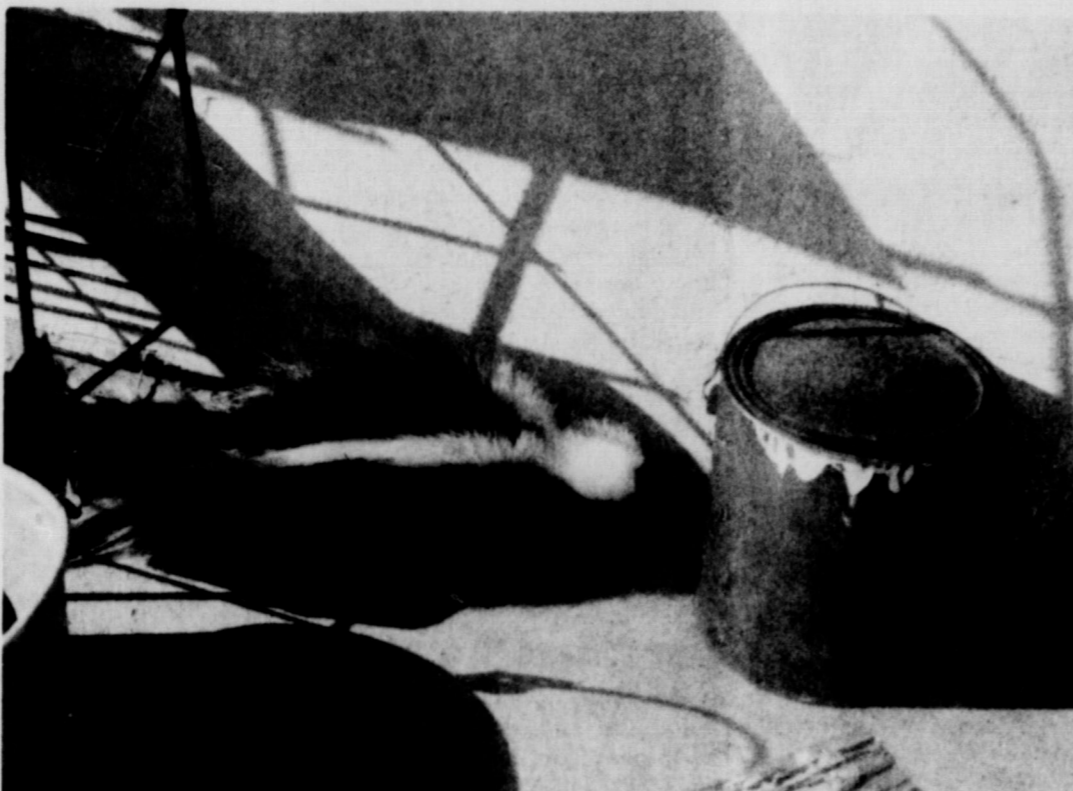

VOTER REGISTRATION CERTIFICATES MUST BE OBTAINED SOON

The time for voter registration is getting close to end for persons desiring to vote in the upcoming elections to be held in the latter part of the year. A person must be registered at least thirty days before election to be eligible to vote in that election. The voters applications are mailed to all persons who were registered to vote last year about October 1, 1971. These applications must be signed and returned to the County Tax Office before a Voter Certificate can be mailed back to you. If you have received an application and have not returned it to the tax office, then you are not a registered voter and are not eligible to vote in any election. We must have the APPLICATION first.

Some have been under the impression that they are already registered after receiving the application, but they are not unless the

APPLICATION has been returned along with their signature and returned for the CERTIFICATE. Please check your card and see if it reads APPLICATION or CERTIFICATE. If it reads APPLICATION, then you are not registered. If you did not register last year then you can make application this year and receive your voter registration certificate for the coming elections. You must vote in the primaries or general elections to retain your certificate in force. Each year that you vote in those two elections or either one of them your certificate will be automatically extended for voting privileges for another year.

City Council Meets, Election Called April 1

The City Council of Wheeler met Monday evening, Jan. 24, in the City Office.

A letter of resignation was received by the Council from Robert Denson. The resignation was accepted by the group. Denson's term of office would have expired in April. Denson has moved to Oklahoma City following the sale of Clay Food Store in which he held an interest.

Mayor Pete Burton ordered an election. The date of Saturday, April 1 was chosen for the election. This date coincides with the school election and the two will be held in conjunction with each other.

Mayor Burton's term of office expires along with that of Councilman Louis Stas and former councilman Denson.

Neil Rogers, County Civil Defense Director, met with the council to report on the activities of the Wheeler Volunteer Fire Department.

Dr. Range from Shamrock met with the group to express his views on the best way to handle the situation arising from the rabid skunk found in the city limits. It was agreed to hold a Rabies Clinic Saturday afternoon, Jan. 29 from 1:00 until 7:00 in the City garage behind the City Office.

It is hoped that everyone will bring in their dogs and cats for vaccination.

All untagged animals will be picked up Monday and held for five days. After this time if still unclaimed, they will be destroyed.

Anyone having an animal needing a rabie's shot but unable to bring the animal to the clinic is asked to phone 826-5215.

The most recent clinic for Wheeler was held May of last year. Dr. Breeding of Miami held the clinic. If you had your animal vaccinated at this time and have a tag showing the vaccination to still be good, this is fine.

The city usually sponsors one such clinic each year. Current bills were approved for payment.

Please plan to attend this informative program which concerns every community.

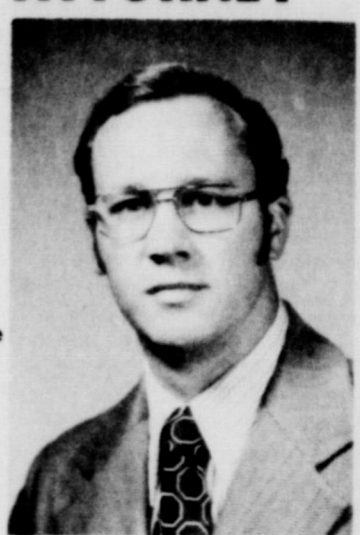
KENT SIMS SEEKS OFFICE OF COUNTY ATTORNEY

Kent Sims, a lifelong resident of Wheeler County and senior law student at the Texas Tech School of Law, has filed his candidacy for the office of Wheeler County Attorney subject to the Democratic primary in May.

Sims, son of Mr. and Mrs. Lyndon H. Sims of Wheeler, received a bachelor of science degree in civil engineering from Texas Tech University in 1969 and is currently completing requirements for his law degree at the Tech School of Law. He is the present business manager for the Texas Tech Law Review, a legal journal published by students who are ranked at the top of their respective classes.

In addition to previous service as note editor for the Law Review, Sims has been employed during his law school career as a legal clerk for one of Lubbock's largest law firms. While active in student government activities, he has served as an officer in Phi Alpha Delta professional law fraternity and has been named to the Dean's Honor Roll on several occasions.

While in undergraduate school, Sims was elected president of the Tech chapter of American Society of

Civil Engineers and was named to the Dean's List for academic achievement.

He plans to open a new law practice in Wheeler in July in association with a law school classmate, Joe Hayes, formerly of Phillips. Sims and Hayes have formed a partnership for the general practice of law.

In his announcement, Sims emphasized that his new law office will be located in Wheeler and therefore as County Attorney he would be immediately available to persons wishing to transact county business in the county seat.

CANADIAN PRODUCTION CREDIT

Farmers and ranchers from a six-county area borrowed more than \$77.7 million from Canadian Production Credit Assoc. in 1971, according to Larry E. Albin, the association's president.

This amount represents loans to 588 stockholders.

Loan volume is up more than \$5.8 million or 8 percent over the same period a year ago, Albin reported.

Cynthia Manning On Dean's List

Cynthia Manning, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Manning is listed on the Dean's Honor Roll of the College of Home Economics at Texas Tech University for the first semester this year.

A total of 410 students in the College qualified for the list, according to Interim Dean Donald S. Longworth.

To qualify for the honor list a student must be enrolled in 12 semester hours of courses, excluding pass-fail courses, and have at least a 3.0 grade average. Texas Tech uses a 4.0 point grading system.

The College of Home Economics is one of six colleges and two schools at Texas Tech University, with a total fall enrollment of more than 21,000 students. The others are the colleges of Arts and Sciences, Business Administration, Education, Engineering and Agricultural Sciences, and the Graduate School and the School of Law.

A. Hefley To Begin Teaching

Anita Lynn Hefley, Briscoe, and a student at Hardin-Simmons University, will be student teaching in local and area schools during the 1972 spring semester.

Seventy-four senior students will be entering in this activity. Approximately 60% of graduates from each year's graduating class at Hardin-Simmons enter the teaching profession.

Miss Hefley will be doing her student teaching at Cooper High School.

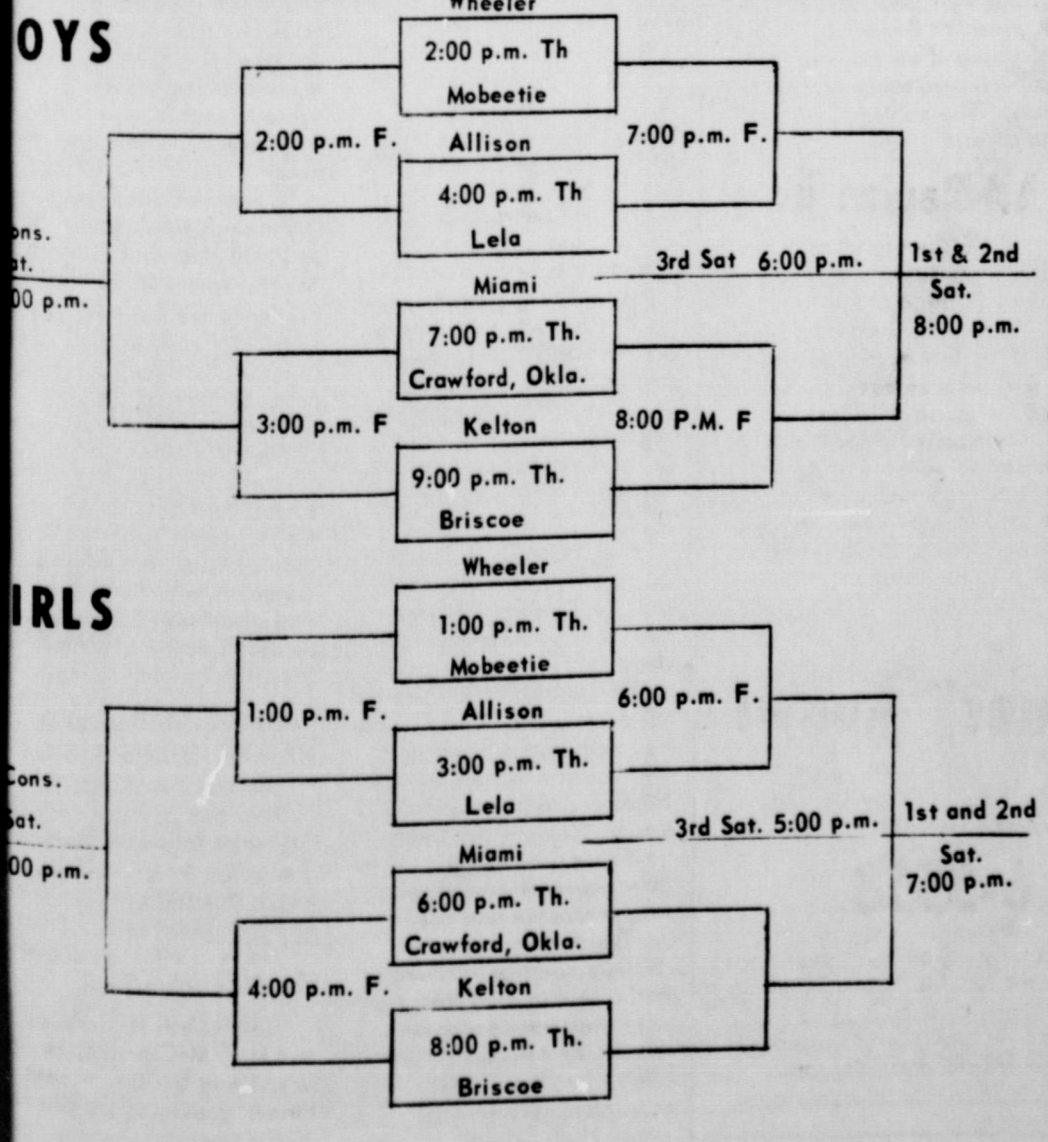

WHAT DOES THE BIBLE TEACH ABOUT . . . GOD

 "From everlasting to Everlasting, thou art God".
 (Ps 90:2)

I. The Bible teaches that God is eternal. In Psalms 90:1-2, we read the forceful words: "Lord, thou hast been our dwelling place in all generations. Before the mountains were brought forth, or ever thou hadst formed the earth and the world, even from everlasting to everlasting, thou art God."
 In Deuteronomy 32:40, we read "For I lift up my hand to heaven, and say, I live forever." In the same book chapter 33:27, we read: "The eternal God is thy refuge, and underneath are the everlasting arms. and he shall thrust out the enemy from before thee and shall say, destroy them."

Thus we see in the very first part of this lesson, that we have a God who is everlasting, and who continues to exist into the ages to come. It is no wonder that we should be concerned with what the Bible teaches about Him.

II. The Bible teaches that God is everywhere. One of the things of which the world is very much unconcerned is that God is everywhere. David writes in Psalms 139:7-8, "Whither shall I go from thy spirit? or whither shall I flee from thy presence? If I ascend up into heaven, thou art there: if I make my bed in Sheol, behold, thou art there."

Jeremiah 23:24 tells us, "Can any hide himself in secret places that I shall not see him? saith the Lord. Do not I fill heaven and earth? saith the Lord."

The wise man Solomon says, "The eyes of the Lord are in every place, beholding the evil and the good." (Prov. 15:3)

In the New Testament, the apostle Paul preaching on Mars Hill, said that God is not far from any of us. (Acts 17:27)

III. The Bible teaches that God Knows Everything. One of the greatest reasons why we should not be atheistic is because of the fact that no man knows everything. This should cause us to bow our heads in reverence and humility and deep respect for a being so great. David said in Psalms 139:4, "Thou compasses my path and my lying down, and art acquainted with all my ways."
 Job tells us that, "Hell is naked before him, and destruction hath no covering." (Job 26:6) Job also says, "Doth not he see my ways and count all my steps? (Job 31:4)

The Psalmist tells us, "Great is our Lord, and of great power, his understanding is infinite." (Psa. 147:5)
 "Not only does the Old Testament bear out the wisdom of God, but also does the New. Hebrews 4:13, "Neither is there any creature that is not manifest in his sight: but all things are naked and opened unto the eyes of him with whom we have to do."

Let us always remember that God knows everything. I siah tells us that as the heavens are higher than the earth, so are God's thoughts than our thoughts and God's ways than our ways.

IV. The Bible teaches that God is all Powerful. God has created all things. Certainly if he was able to create all things, then he is able to control them.

In Psalms 93:4, we read: "The Lord on high is mightier than the noise of many waves, yea, than the mighty waves of the sea." We read in Nahum 1:3, "The Lord is slow to anger, and great in power, and will not at all acquit the wicked: the Lord hath his way in the whirlwind and in the storm, and the clouds and the dust of his feet."

Examples of God's power are shown through the entire Bible. Seeing examples where God caused water to stand aside and let the Israelites pass through the Red Sea, how he rained fire from heaven on wicked cities, and how that he raised the dead and in many ways showed his power, then we can conclude, without any reasonable doubt, that God is all powerful.

V. The Bible teaches that God created all things. Genesis 1:1, "In the beginning God created the heaven and the earth." Beginning with the first verse of the Bible, we have the story told of the creation of all things. Following is the order of things created. First day - light. Second day - firmament. Third day - dry land and water, grass, herbs, yielding seed, and fruit trees. Fourth day - sun, moon, and stars. Fifth day - fish of the sea, fowl of the air. Sixth day - cattle, everything that creepeth upon the earth, and man.

Thus we have the story of how all things were created. God in all his power and wisdom has created all things and set in motion certain laws that sustain them. Next we want to notice that:

VI. The Bible teaches that God sustains all things. In Hebrews 1:3, we are told that God made the world by his Son, and upholds all things by the word of his power.

In Acts 17:28, Paul says: "In Him, we live and move and have our being." So we see that it is by the goodness of God that we exist and are sustained. If God would withhold his blessings from us even for a moment of time, we would all perish, for he has given unto us, all, life and breath and all things.

VII. The Bible teaches that God has provided us Salvation. One of the central themes of the Bible is salvation. We should be made happy to know that God has provided us with salvation. For in John 3:16, we read where Christ said, "For God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting life."

2 Peter 3:9, teaches: "The Lord is not slack concerning his promise, as some men count slackness; but is long-suffering to us; not wishing that any should perish, but that all should come to repentance."

In Romans 1:16, Paul writes, "For I am not ashamed of the gospel of Christ: for it is the power of God unto salvation to everyone that believeth; to the Jew first and also to the Greek."

We should exalt God above all else. He who has vision, power and wisdom above all. Our Creator and Sustainer. The one who provides us all material blessings and who will give us all spiritual blessings in Christ Jesus.

If you are not in Christ, then you should be studying the Bible and learning what you need to do to get into Christ, that you might have the salvation that God has provided. May God bless you in studying his word and coming to a knowledge of the truth, is our prayer, in Jesus' name.

A lot of folks seem to be having some trouble with grass tetany. When a grown cow in apparently fine condition lays down and dies, there is a cause for concern. Some cowmen have been able to revive cattle with calcium glutamate injections, but it doesn't always do the trick.

If you've noticed beef cows in your herd acting rather nervous, irritable and belligerent, there's a good chance they are suffering from grass tetany.

The condition results from a mineral imbalance and especially occurs during cold, cloudy wet weather. If it is prolonged, muscular spasms, convulsions and death will occur.

Grass tetany often affects cows in late pregnancy or those nursing calves. During that time cows give up a great deal of their nutritional intake and reserves to support their calves. Unfavorable weather conditions put additional strain on the cows.

calcium in the animal's diet is the main cause of grass tetany. A low energy diet also contributed to the condition.

To overcome conditions that may lead to grass tetany, we recommend the use of mineral blocks containing magnesium oxide and supplemental feeding that will provide cows with additional energy.

Livestock owners should reduce the animals' exposure to inclement weather as

much as possible and maintain some legume pastures. Legumes contain up to three times as much magnesium as most grasses. Alfalfa hay is a legume.

If animals are acting in an unusual manner or appear to be under stress, it's always a good idea to call a veterinarian at once.

He'll ride herd on cattle diseases. The Texas Agricultural Extension Service has appointed an area feedlot veterinarian to serve the

Panhandle region. He is Dr. Gene E. Cope who formerly was in private practice in Hereford.

Cope is filling a new position which was created to serve the area's rapidly growing feedlot industry," noted Dr. John E. Hutchison, director of the Extension Service, in announcing the appointment.

The Panhandle is now feeding about 2.4 million head of cattle a year, and animal health is a critical aspect of the industry. Statewide, 3.7 million head of cattle were fed in 1971.

The veterinarian will provide specialized assistance to feedlots to combat costly disease problems, said Hutchison. The estimated cost of diseases to the Texas Feedlot industry is more than \$8 million a year. Cope will also be devoting some time to swine disease control.

Cope is a native of Sterling City where he was reared on a ranch. He received his doctor of veterinary medicine degree from Texas A & M University in 1959. He served as a student assistant in San

Angelo during the summer of 1958 and as an assistant veterinarian in Clarendon in 1959. He has been in private practice in Hereford for the past 12 years and has served as a consultant to feedlots on animal health problems.

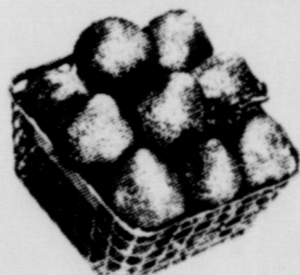
