The continuing dry weather The blossom, buds, leaves and shortage of forage has resulted in some rather serious poisonous plant problems for some ranchers and poses as a threat to livestock in the near future.

In many areas the shin oaks are starting to bud and in a few areas they have already leafed. The danger period will last approximately 30 days or until the leaves change from a light green to a dark green color. A late frost will cause the young leaves to become more to xic and may also result in a later leafing oot which would extend the oak poisoning season.

The problem is greatest when there is a shortage of other plants and oak makes up a major part of the diet.



Needs agressive distributor in Wheeler area for is not possible, supplemental feeding of three pounds of alfalfa hay per day for cattle will reduce losses, but will not always prevent all symptoms such as into xication.

An antidotal feed containing 10 percent calcium hydroxide has been used by ranchers to prevent death loss. The ration is composed of 600 pounds of ground alfalfa; 1,080 pounds of 40 percent cotton seed meal; 120 pounds of vegetable oil and 200 pounds of calcium hydroxide. This combination of materials furnishes an adequate level of calcium hydroxide while maintaining palatability. Cows should be fed four pounds of this feed daily.

I am running for the Sheriff's office because I believe I can do a much needed service for this county. I am not running because I just wanted a job. If I had just been looking for a job, I would have stayed with what I have been doing and what I already know. I am a welder by trade and a stockman by choice. I know most of the people in this county and how they think and how they will react in most circumstances. I believe any problem brought to the sheriff should be handled with the same respect, no matter how small it may seem. It may be real important to the person involved. I believe a sheriff is supposed to be a peace officer and know what is going on, where and be able to head it off before someone gets into trouble, rather than just be there after it is too late to help. It takes the backing of the people and the ability to work with them to accomplish this. I believe when a crime is committed, don't let up till justice is done. When an arrest has to be made, be sure you have enough evidence to make it stick. I believe common sense and a sense of fair play is more important than all the experience one could have. Experience is for the protection of the officer, more than for the people he represents. I believe all the experience and training in the world, without common sense is worthless. I have six generations, past and present, that have spent most of their lives in this county. Everyone of them have been friendly, lawbiding and hard working people. I want the next generations to be able to say the same. I am more concerned about our young people than anything else. Most people, like myself, can handly nearly any problem that might come up, but our young people need our full attention. They have problems not that we didn't have in our day. We stayed close to home and were kept busier than they are today. We have got to find things of interest for each of them to help them pass through their restlessness. The young people of today aren't any different than we were at that age. When we were growing up, the boys were ones that got into most of the trouble, but now it has changed. The girls need our help as much as the boys. In our days of growing up, the majority of us went along with the crowd and tried temptations we know better than to do. It isn't any different today, just more dangerous. Everyone can't get along with young people no matter how hard they try. Any youngster respects fair discipline. They need someone with unquestionable morals and honesty that enjoys working with them. They need to know they have someone that will demand discipline when it is needed. Respect can not be accomplished by force and stiff necked punishment. Respect is accomplished by a firm hand dealt with fairness and understanding.
