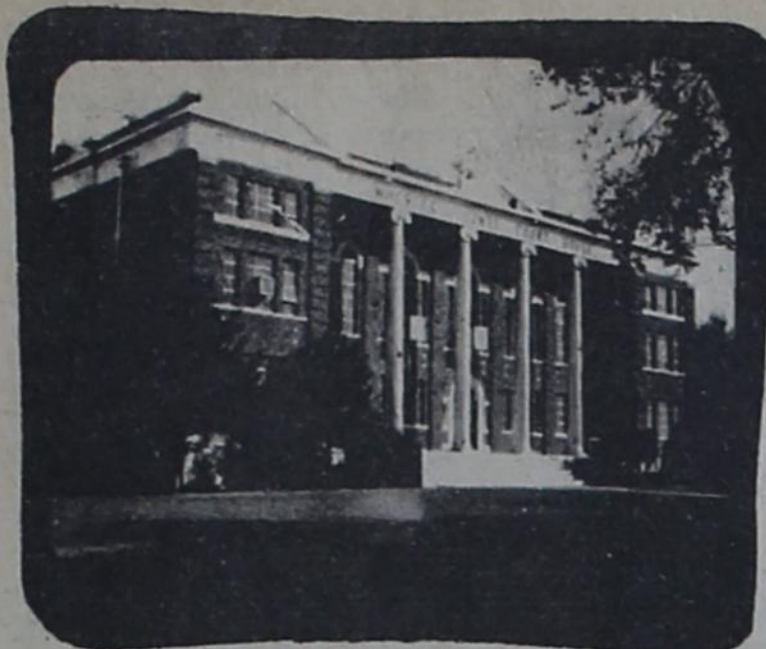

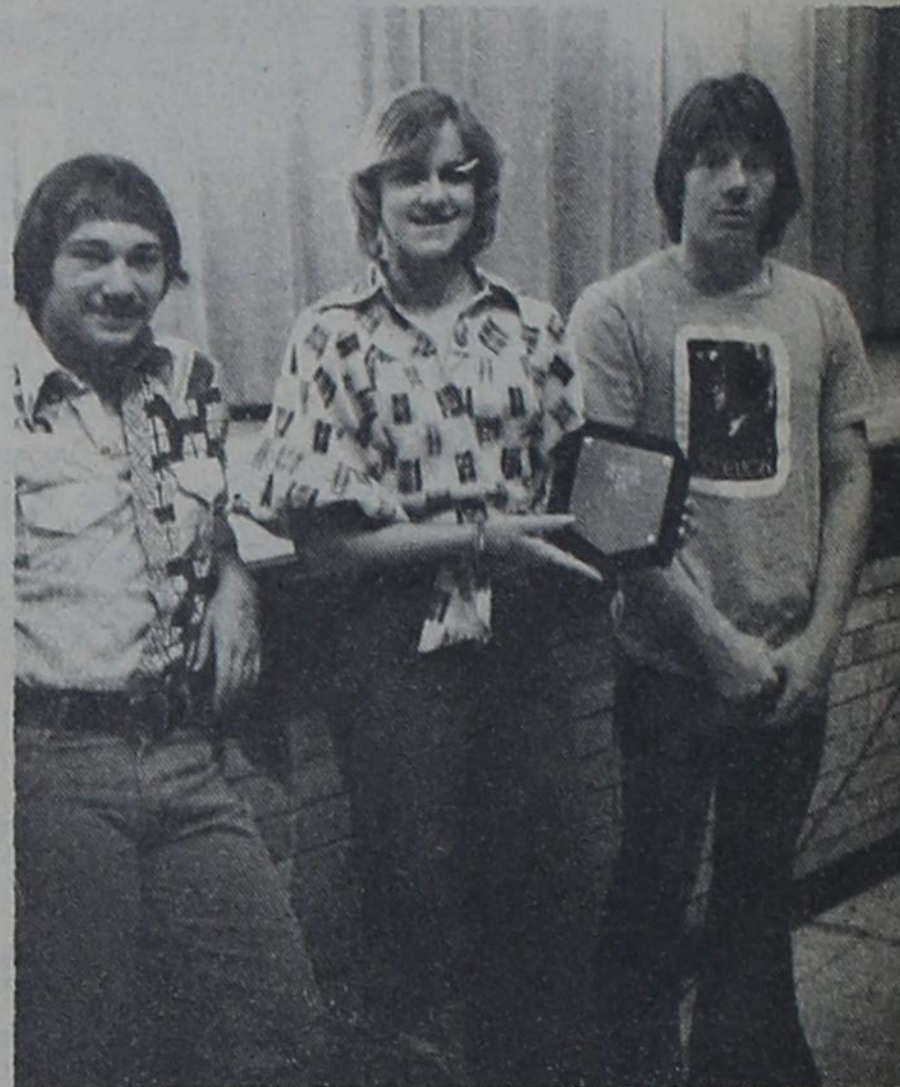

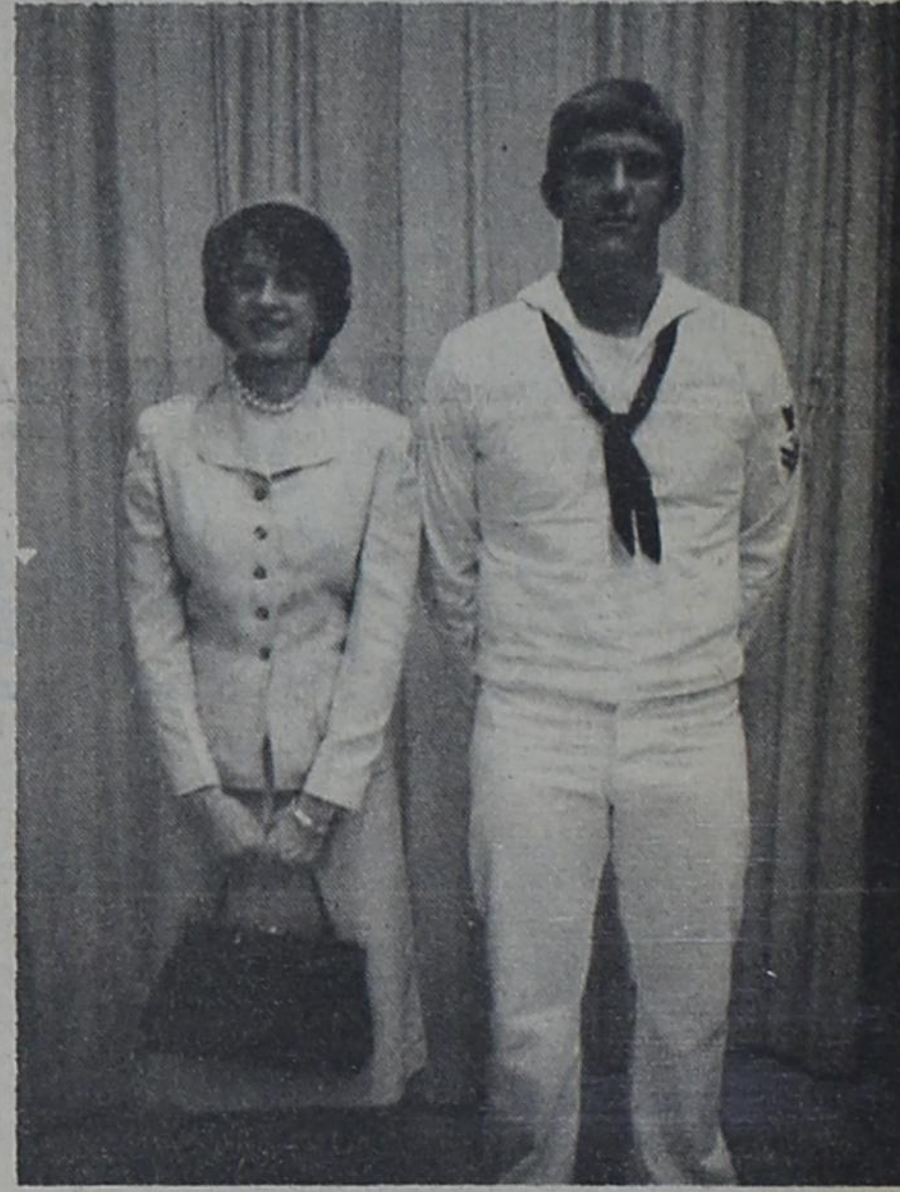

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## CHRISTIANITY TODAY

The life of the apostle Paul was bound up so with Jesus that he could announce "For to me, to live is Christ and to die is gain." (Philippians 1:21). This actually became his theme for living, as well as for dying.

Since living was Christ for Paul, Christ was the beginning of life for him. He could recall the experience on the Damascus road as the time of great change.

Christ spoke directly to him, challenging him to be a witness of what he had seen and a missionary of light to the Gentiles (Acts 26:14-18). Paul had surrendered completely.

Christ was the continuance of that life. There had not been a day that he had not lived in the presence of his Lord "It is not longer I that live, but Christ lives in me." (Galatians 2:20). The dynamic, motivating force in his life was the Saviour. If Christ were taken out of his life, there would have been nothing left.

Christ was also the end of life. In the Roman prison as he was writing the letter to the Phillipian Christians, he faced realistically the prospect of death. He felt

that he was moving toward the goal that Christ had set for him. Yet in life or in death he was ready for whatever the Lord willed.

Paul explains his dilemma as he faced life and death (Philippians 1:23-24). He is caught between two desires. For his death would be gain but his work of teaching was still needed. His greatest desire was to depart and to be with the Lord. This word "depart" can mean that as a tablet dropped into the water is dissolved, so in death life disappears but is not destroyed. The form of life changes. It can also mean the striking of a tent, loosening the pins and ropes in order to break camp. When our pilgrimage is over here, we will leave behind our earthly tents and move on to our heavenly home (II Corinthians 5:1).

With this kind of thought, the child of God does not fear death, but can even look forward to it. Do you have that attitude toward death? If not, call me. 826-5542 or 826-3054.

## Davidson Is Club Hostess April 12

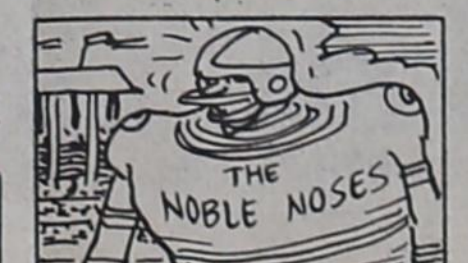
The 54 Study Club met Monday night April 12, 1976 with Mrs. Lloyd Davidson.

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## KING'S KOMMENTS

Joe Don King - CEA

The continuing dry weather and shortage of forage has resulted in some rather serious poisonous plant problems for some ranchers and poses as a threat to livestock in the near future.

In many areas the shin oaks are starting to bud and in a few areas they have already leafed. The danger period will last approximately 30 days or until the leaves change from a light green to a dark green color. A late frost will cause the young leaves to become more toxic and may also result in a later leafing out which would extend the oak poisoning season.

The problem is greatest when there is a shortage of other plants and oak makes up a major part of the diet.

The blossom, buds, leaves and stems contain deadly tannic acid during this early growth stage. Dr. John Reager of the Veterinary Diagnostic Laboratory at Texas A&M University reports that oak poisoning is the most common toxic plant that they diagnose.

Animals should be removed from the oak areas. If this is not possible, supplemental feeding of three pounds of alfalfa hay per day for cattle will reduce losses, but will not always prevent all symptoms such as intoxication.

An antidotal feed containing 10 percent calcium hydroxide has been used by ranchers to prevent death loss. The ration is composed of 600 pounds of ground alfalfa; 1,080 pounds of 40 percent cottonseed meal; 120 pounds of vegetable oil and 200 pounds of calcium hydroxide. This combination of materials furnishes an adequate level of calcium hydroxide while maintaining palatability. Cows should be fed four pounds of this feed daily.

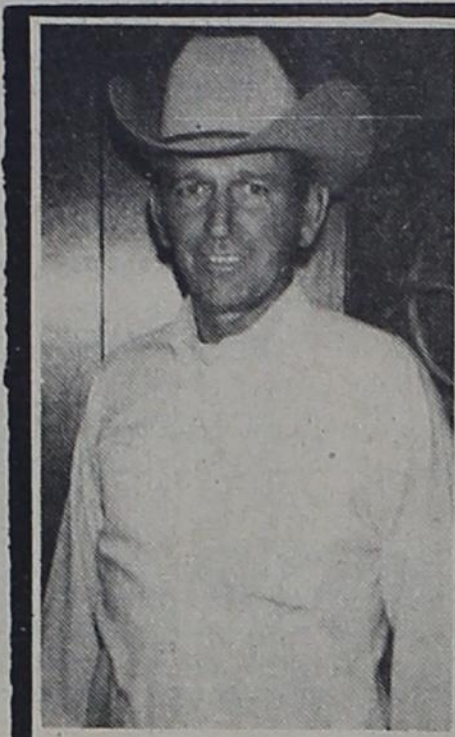

Electric crockery-pot slow cookers can free housewives from hours spend cooking--just put the evening meal to cook in the morning, and supper is ready when the family gets home at night.

This method of cookery is especially valuable to working wives, bachelors and others who are away during the daytime. A roast, stew, chicken or soup can be started in the morning, and the meal will be ready--without all day cooking care--when the family's ready to eat.

These cookers have a low wattage wrap-around heating element which cooks all day without burning the food. Or cook a sausage casserole all night and have it for breakfast. Most dishes cook from eight to ten hours on low setting.

Slow-cooker cooking is economical in terms of food itself because it uses the moist-heat method in which moisture builds up slowly--which is recommended method for cooking less tender inexpensive cuts of meat.

And from the standpoint of energy, the slow cooker is also economical to operate. Cooking a ster in the slow cooker takes only half the energy as cooking the same stew on top of an electric range.

The cook's understanding of the appliance's capabilities and willingness to adapt cooking practices are major considerations in choosing a slow cooker. For example, cooks need to learn not to lift the lid during cooking, because each time the lid is removed, steam escapes losing 15-30 minutes' cooking time.

Some consumers may worry about leaving an appliance operating while they are away all day, and this might be a drawback in using a slow cooker.

One favorite Texas recipe prepared successfully in the slow cooker is Texas Beef and Beans. Try this recipe and see how the family likes the quality of food prepared this way.

**Texas Beef and Beans**  
1 lb. dried pinto beans  
6 c. cold water
