Wheeler voters went to the polls Saturday, April 3, to elect a mayor, three councilmen, two members to the Wheeler School Board and a member to the Parkview Hospital Board. One hundred fifty-seven voters cast their ballots in the city election; about 200 cast their ballots in the school election and 221 votes were counted in the hospital election. In the city election, the mayorand three councilmen ran unopposed, 'Iarrison Hall was elected to a second term as mayor with 119 votes. 


