# LINES FROM LINDA

February with its 'Birth-day sales' is the best time to shop and save on carpets and rugs.

Although often a major furnishings investment, carpets and rugs when chosen carefully are worth the initial expense. In a functional role, they deaden noise, give warmth, provide comfort and reduce floor care. And decoratively, they give individuality and richness to a room, alter the apparent dimensions and relate the floor to other furnishings.

As a guide to help consumers interested in buying a rug or carpet these points

should be considered before making the final decision.

### Room Size

Wall to Wall carpeting can make a small room appear larger, unify adjoining areas, or conceal disfigured flooring. But there is extra cost for installation, it's impossible to shift carpet to distribute wear, professional on-location cleaning is necessary and to use it in another room usually requires recutting.

Room fit rugs permit visual effect of wall-to-wall because they're cut to the exact room dimensions. Usually they are economical if the room is large or has architectural breaks and jogs.

Room size rugs permit a border of flooring around the room, but don't provide the spaciousness and unity of the two above. They can help to define living areas in a large room. To prevent a skimpy appearance, plan so the rug reaches within one foot of the wall in a large room and six to eight inches in a smaller room.

Area rugs are used primarily to define or accent furniture groupings and to add color and design to a room. More than one can be used in a room but take care to avoid a "patchwork" look.

### Traffic Flow

For an area receiving much wear (entrance, stairs, hall, family room), it is important to choose a good grade of carpet and backing.

For areas of little use and traffic (bedrooms, and dining rooms and living rooms only in use when company comes), a lesser

quality of carpet will usually do the job.

### Furnishings

Casual contemporary rooms are enhanced by tweeds, rough and nubby textures, stripes, solids and abstract designs. Multi-color shags are also good.

Country furnishings are pleasing against a background of Early American block designs, leaf patterns, or small scale florals. Braided rugs and other area rugs can be used successfully because they're typical of that time period there was no wall-to-wall carpeting then.

Period styles, more formal in tone are complemented by using carpets and rugs in sculptured designs, tone on tone coloring, and adaptations of patterns from the past.

Wall-to-wall carpeting is also good.

### Color and Design

Color is usually a primary consideration. Select one good for all seasons. Light cool neutrals (off white, beige, tan, brown, and gray) can visually enlarge space, calm a bright busy room and provide a restful atmosphere. Furniture in darker wood tone and colors will stand out more.

Deep warm colors in carpeting help unify. Dark colors and light colors more often show soil and stains. Medium color blends, tweeds and patterned styles simplify maintenance and preserve appearance.

Good carpets will feel substantial. Check density-closeness or compactness of the pile. If when you bend the carpet, it "smiles" at you, the pile is sparse allowing backing to show through. Short dense piles wear best in heavy traffic areas.

Pile height-high piles are luxurious but may mat down. Test for resilience.

by pressing your fingers firmly into the pile for a moment and observing how quickly the pile springs to its original position.

Yarn Twist-loosely twisted carpet plys may soon look fuzzy and matted. High twists are more durable but will cost more. Backing Construction--this holds surface yarns in place. It should be tightly woven for strength and free from excess sizing. Common backings are cotton, jute, polypropylene, rayon and paper yarns. Latex backing may be used to seal the tufts.

### Care

Dirty rugs and carpets can look clean, but unseen embedded dirt can cut the pile and increase wear and tear. Every time an adult walks on a carpet, a pressure of up to several hundred pounds per square inch is exerted on fibers which may be surrounded by sharp dirt.

Daily cleaning helps keep dirt from working its way down into rugs and causing wear.

Deep and close pile car-

pets require more strokes of the vacuum cleaner to remove dirt.

Vacuuming the back of rugs helps get deep dirt, but is impossible with wall-to-wall carpeting.

Turn rugs so they will wear evenly.

## CHRISTIANITY TODAY

**Lee Henry**  
"Human nature is about the only thing in the world which hasn't changed substantially during the past twenty centuries. Whether the people involved are a group of disciples at Christ's feet on a mountain in Palestine or an office full of patients in a modern American medical clinic, they seem to have one thing in common: WORRY."  
In the sixth chapter of Matthew, Jesus admonishes us "Do not be anxious about your life, what you shall eat or what you shall drink, nor about your body, what you shall put on" (Matt. 6: 1). He then gives us five rules concerning how we can free ourselves from worry about the things of this life.  
1. Freedom from worry comes from remembering the power of God. "Is not life more than food and the body more than clothing?" (Matt. 6: 25)  
In other words, which is harder: to give life or to provide food; to bring into existence a human body or furnish clothing for that body? If God gives life and bodies, he can certainly be trusted to provide the necessities to sustain what he has created. To be free from worry, remember that the same power with which God has served you in the past is still available.

2. Freedom from worry comes by remembering that God cares.  
In two beautiful figures of speech, Jesus declares that God is concerned for our needs. If he takes care of the birds of the air and the wild flowers which are so temporary, he will surely take care of us who are "of more value than they" (Matt. 6: 26-30)  
3. Remembering the foolishness of worry can keep us free from it.  
Jesus asks, "Which of you by being anxious can add a single cubit to his span of life?" (Matt. 6: 27). All of us have done plenty of useless things, but we have never done anything more useless than worry. Worry never lifted a single burden or solved a single problem. Doctors tell us that no man dies of overwork, but many die from worry about the work they're doing. They are saying actually what Jesus said long ago: that worry is foolish and futile.

4. Freedom from worry comes when we learn to live one day at a time.  
"Do not be anxious about tomorrow, for tomorrow will be anxious for itself. Let the day's own trouble be sufficient for the day" (Matt. 6: 34). Nearly anyone can carry the problems of a single day without breaking under the load, but far too many try to carry the burdens of the future along with the burdens of today. One writer estimates that between 75 and 90 percent of all the things we worry about never happen. The master's principle works: Live just one day at a time.

5. Freedom from worry comes to those who put their concern for God's kingdom first.  
"Seek first his kingdom and his righteousness, and all these things (that you worry about) shall be yours as well" (Matt. 6: 33). The idea is simple: we cannot be concerned about the affairs of the kingdom and our own affairs at the same time. Furthermore, if we put God first in our lives we can have the confident assurance that He can and will take care of our physical needs.  
Ultimately, real freedom from worry comes through faith. When reprimanding his disciples for an anxiety, Jesus addressed them as "Men of little faith."  
Worry is something we learn. If you are a worrier now, it is because you have practiced worrying through the years. Since worry is learned, it can be unlearned. To gain freedom from worry, start re-directing your thinking.  
Commit yourself totally to Jesus as an obedient disciple and then sincerely trust God to "supply every need of yours according to his riches in glory in Christ Jesus" (Phil. 4: 19). "He will. And you will be free from Worry."

**Cook Books Started by Farm Wives**  
American housewives, today accustomed to obtaining most of their cooking needs from a well-stocked supermarket, would have been dire straits in the Revolutionary period. Today's foods are pre-cooked, convenience packed and almost ready to serve. A far cry from what the colonial housewife faced when mealtime rolled around.  
Her menu was seriously limited to what was available locally and this fact is one that has led to the variety of localized specialties placed on the table in various parts of the nation. Sausage and scrapple were Pennsylvania specialties; seafood along the Chesapeake Bay; ham in Virginia and lobster stew in New England.  
To prepare food was usually an experience in innovation. There were few cookbooks in the colonies. Women who came up with a good recipe carefully kept it recorded and exchanged with other women those which brought them the most compliments from family and friends.  
When collections of recipes began to appear in books there were also tips on preserving and salvaging food. Modern housewives, with abundant supplies of low cost food over the years, would find it easier to dispose of food than do what some colonial wives did to save food. A tip in one old cookbook listed this method of saving tainted venison:  
"Bury it in the ground in a clean cloth for a whole night and it will take away the corruption, savour and stink."  
Those who found sugar an expensive item on the shopping list recently were at least able to find it. It was a scarce item in colonial America. Molasses, too, was expensive and the honey business had not yet developed here. As a result, early Americans were not used to sweet foods as we know them today.  
Chopped apples, berries, pulp from near the seeds in squash and pumpkin provided sweetness and a special taste to colonial cakes.

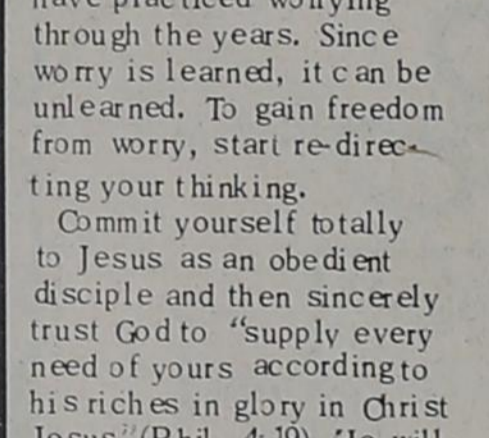





**THURSDAY REVIEW URGES VOTER PARTICIPATION**

The Thursday Review Club of Wheeler is one of the hundreds of federated women's clubs throughout the state of Texas that is actively working to try to get more voters to exercise their rights in the upcoming 1976 elections.

General apathy among the voters of Texas has been the case in recent years and Wheeler County is no exception. With more than 3500 registered voters in the county, less than 50% of this number have taken the trouble to go to the polls and help decide who will govern our cities, counties, schools, state, and nation.

Due to the possible confusion created by the federal Voting Rights Law and the current Voter Registration Drive, the Poll Power Committee of the Thursday Review Club asked Thurman Rives, Tax-Assessor-Collector, to write an article to clear up any questions the voters of the county might have.

Texas is now under the Federal Voting Rights Law and under this law all Tax Assessor-Collector throughout the State are required to hold a voter registration drive. The cards you have received in the mail are a part of this drive to update our voter lists to a more current status.

The following are points which I feel will be of interest to you as the Voters of Wheeler County:

**1. Voter Registration**

If you have not registered in Wheeler County since October 1, 1971, then you must register to vote. If you have registered since October 1, 1971, then your name will be on the registration list whether you have sent in your registration application or not, but we urge you to return your Registration Application to assist us in updating our voter lists. If you have moved from one voting precinct to another then you should notify us here at the tax office of this change so that we can get you in the right voting box. Any change of name should



## Lunchroom Cost Assistance

(Note: A copy of the scale referred to in this letter is available at the school.)

Dear Parent or Guardian: The Wheeler Public School serves nutritious meals every school day. Students in Kindergarten through grade four may buy lunch for 55 cents. Students in grades five through twelve may buy lunch for 65 cents per meal.

Children from families whose income is at or below levels shown on the attached scale are eligible for free or reduced price meals. The reduced price for lunch is 20 cents. If your income is greater than those shown, but you have unusually high medical bills, shelter costs in excess of 30 percent of your income, special education expenses due to the mental or physical condition of a child, or disaster or casualty losses, your children may still be eligible.

The school children of parents or guardians who become unemployed are eligible for free or reduced price meals during the period of unemployment provided that the loss of income causes the family income during the period of unemployment to be at or below the levels shown on the scale.

To apply at any time during the year for free meals or reduced price meals for your children complete the attached application, the school application and return it to the school.

Within ten days of receiving your application, the school will let you know whether or not your children are eligible. If you do not agree with the school's decision you have a right to a fair hearing. This can be done by calling or writing Mr. Bynum Smith, superintendent, phone number 826-5241.

In certain cases foster children are also eligible for these benefits. If you have foster children living with you and wish to apply for such meals for them, please notify us or indicate it on the application.

All children are treated the same regardless of ability to pay. In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, or national origin.

If we can be of any further assistance or if your family size or income changes during the year, please contact us.

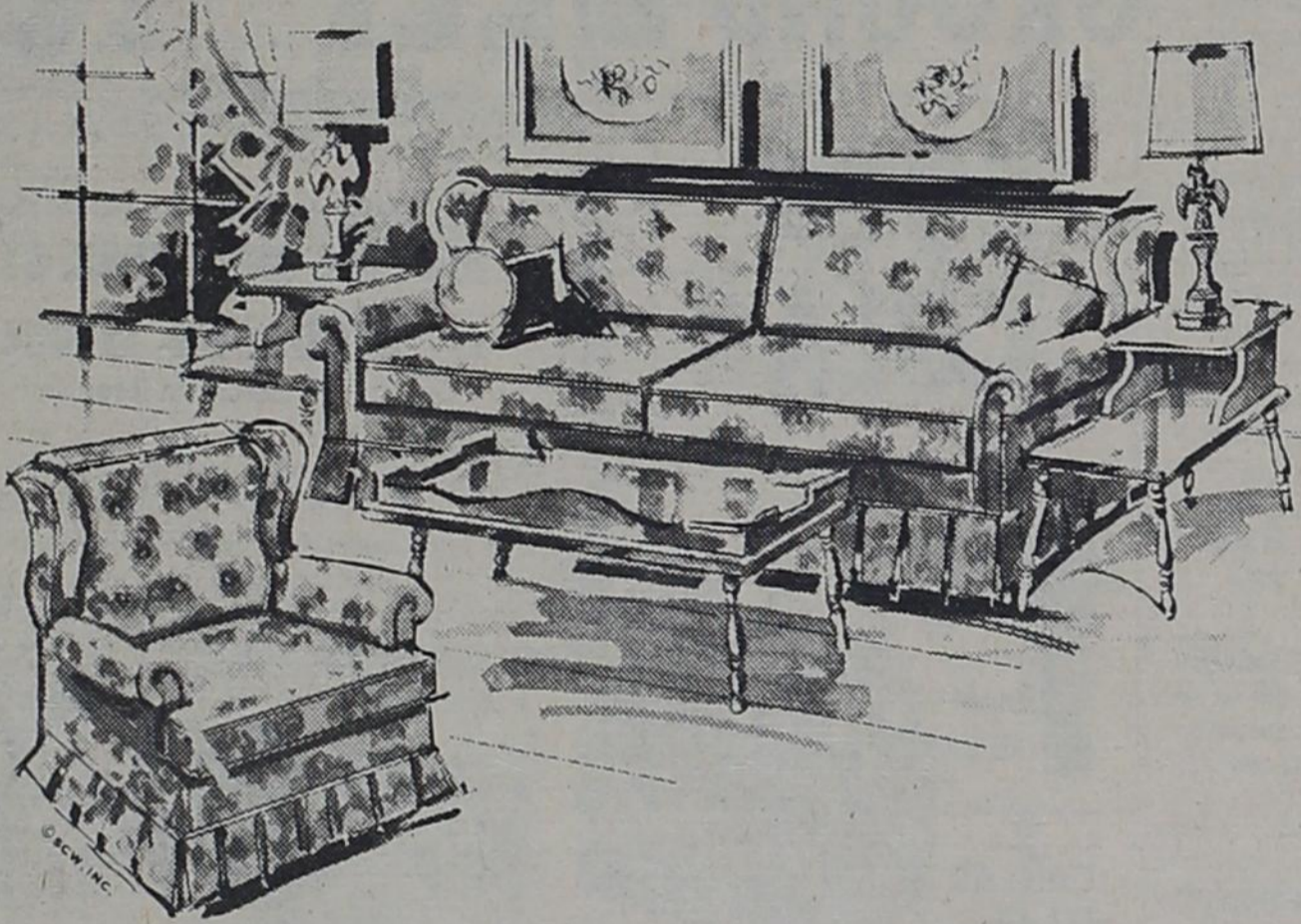

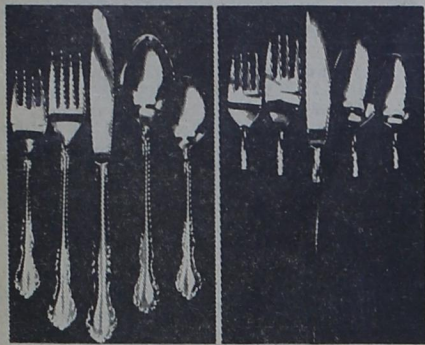

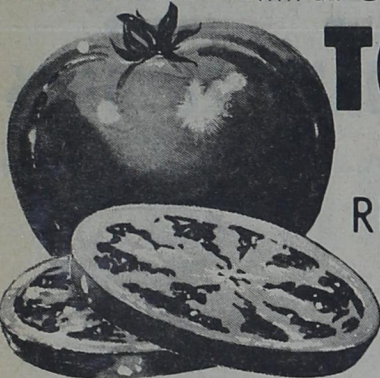
