



WIND EROSION

What does wind erosion do to the land . Everyone realizes that it is bad but alot of the damage is not readily seen.

One of the main damages from wind emsion is the removal of the finer parts of the soil and these are the most import ant. These finer parts hold most of the plant nutients needed for good growth. Wind en sion can be seen best on cropl and but it can be a problem on rangeland.

Vegetation is the single most important factor in determining the amount of soil loss from blowing. It influences organic matter, soil moisture and wind speed.

On rangel and to get go od ve getati ve cover proper use of the grasses is most important Don't take all of the years growth. Leave about half of the current years growth by weight standing. This will reduce wind speed close to the ground. Also it will allow litter to cover the

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

ALL TO TAKE A RIVER'S PULSE

In Texas there are more than 3,500 rivers and streams with a combined length of about 80,000 miles. So think how busy the TWQB field people were back in 1967 when there were only 20 people to gather samples from those miles of water in order to determine whether a stream was sickly or in good health. That's the way it was for a while after the TWQB be-

came a bona fide state agency. But things improved as time went by. From the 65 sampling stations throughout the state in 1967, the number has grown to 650 and samples are taken on a regular basis to "feel the pulse" of the rivers which, incidently, are in better health now than they were nine years ago. tests can be per-

in the field, such as rate of flow, dissolved oxygen, pH (for acidity or alkalinity), temperature, turbidity (signifying clarity of the water), chlorides and conductivity.

But there are some tests which require laboratory equipment in order to make the picture complete. So additional samples are taken and sent to authorized labs to provide still more scientific information regarding the health of Texas streams.

Water sampling is done on all 15 of the state's rivers and their tributaries every three months, except for the densely populated areas such as Houston, Dallas and San Antonio where sampling is done more frequently.

.Then there are the 92 reservoirs in Texas whose health also must be guarded and where sampling is done by TWQB field personnel on a quarterly basis. The quality of the water in Texas reservoirs (nearly all of which are man-made) is considered very good.

In addition to the scientific factors (pH, oxygen, etc.), the biologists, chemists and other scientific types who do the water sampling, take note of the fish species in the streams, as well as plant and animal life growing along the river beds, to provide still another indication of the health of the water in which they're found.

Then, added to regular sampling activities, Intensive Monitoring Surveys are being conducted throughout the state, taking the rivers and streams, segment by segment, for really detailed studies of the state's waters. Reports on the surveys are printed as they are completed and become a permanent record of the improving condition of our rivers and streams.

So, if you see two or three people in hip boots wading in a stream, check to see if they're driving a TWQB vehicle. If so, they're not after a fish for supper. They're feeling the river's pulse.
