## SCHOOL, CITY, HOSPITAL ELECTIONS SAT.

The Wheeler School Cafeteria will be the location of the ballot boxes for the School, City and Hospital elections. Polls will open Saturday, April 3 at 8 a.m. and remain open until 7 p.m.

### CITY ELECTION:

Voters in the city will elect a mayor and three councilmen. The races are not contested; Harrison will be seeking a second term as Mayor and incumbents David Cross and Louis Stas are asking reelection to their respective places 2 and 4 on the council.

Charles Wagner has placed his name on the ballot for an unexpired term (Place 1) on the council.

### SCHOOL ELECTION

Two positions are to be filled on the Wheeler Board of Trustees. Incumbent Larry Jennings drew an opponent for position 5 on the board; Betty Hennard placed her name on the ballot.

Doyle Watson is running unopposed in the race for position 4 on the Board. The seat is presently held by Bob Patterson who did not seek reelection.

### HOSPITAL BOARD

Three names appear on the ballot for election to the Hospital Board to re-

present Wheeler. Seeking election to the Hospital Board are Dr. Tommie Leonard, Jr., Don Denton and Dub Goad. The position is presently held by Barry Altman.

Mrs. David Britt has placed her name on the ballot for an additional term as representative of the Kelton Community on the Parkview Hospital Board. Kelton citizens will cast their ballots at the office of the Kelton Gin from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m.

### MOBEETIE SCHOOL

Mobeetie school patrons will select three men from a list of seven on the ballot to serve on the Board of Trustees for their school. Named on the ballot are Douglas Corse, Gordon Estes, Calvin E. Stuart, Paul Hathaway, Ted R. McCurley, Dale Dyson and Gene L. Harrison.

### BRISCOE SCHOOL

Four men are running for the three positions on the Briscoe Board of Trustees. Richard Meadows, Thuman Thom, Eddie George and J. P. Meek have placed their names before the voters.

### KELTON SCHOOL

Billy Buckingham and George R. Davis are the only two men named on the ballot for election to the two places on the

Kelton School Board of Trustees.

### ALLISON SCHOOL

Three places are to be filled on the Allison School Board and three men are willing to serve in that capacity. Named on the ballot are Homer Miller, Larry Elmore and Hiram Begert.

Wheeler Christian Academy will have a Fun Night and Spaghetti and Salad Supper Friday evening, April 2.

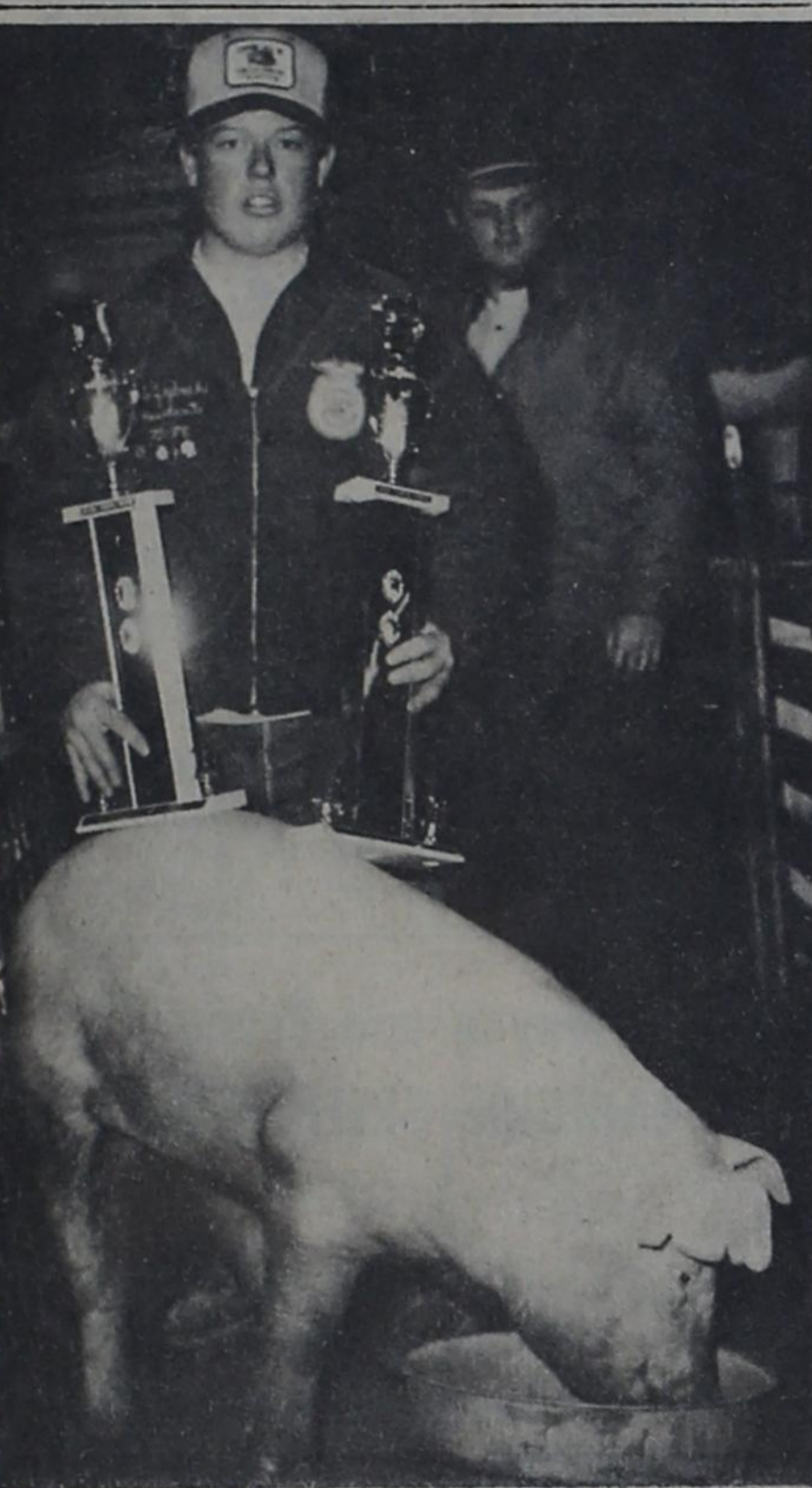

## Wheeler Native Is Named Dean

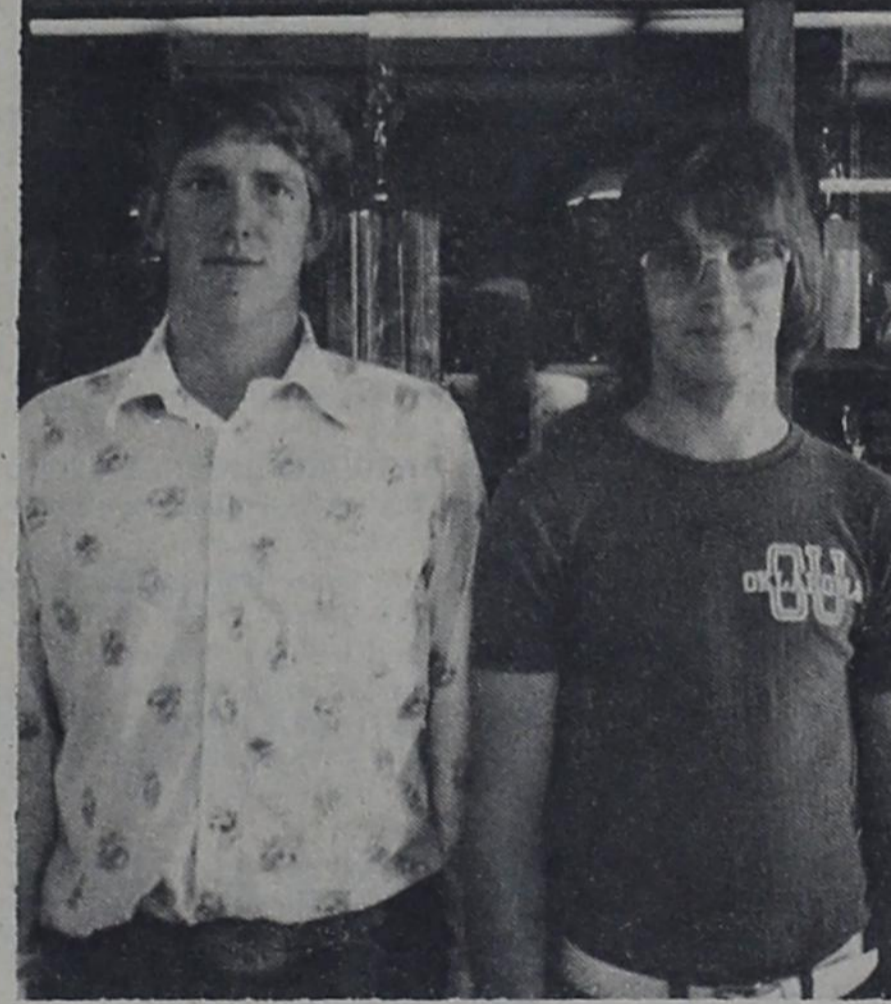
Dr. James Edmund Kirby, Jr., director of the school of humanistic studies at Oklahoma State University, has been named dean of the Drew Theological School, effective July 1.

Kirby, 42, received his Ph. D. degree from the graduate school at Drew in 1963. A native of Wheeler, Tex., he is a cum laude graduate of McMurry College, Abilene, Tex., and holds theological degrees with honors from the Perkins School of Theology, Southern Methodist University, Dallas.

He is a professor of religion and humanities at Oklahoma and will be a professor of church history at Drew.

He succeeds Pieter de Jong, who is returning to full-time teaching at Drew as professor of systematic theology.

His father, James Edmund Kirby, was the Methodist preacher here in the 1930's.

## Federal Land Bank Meeting Held

Tom Cunningham of Shamrock and Woodrow Wood of Wellington, have just returned from Houston where they represented the Federal Land Bank Association of Shamrock at the annual stockholders meeting of The Federal Land Bank of Houston. The meeting held at the Houston Oaks Hotel, was attended by members of 66 Federal Land Bank Associations in Texas. There were about 550 persons in attendance.

George W. Cunningham, President in his annual report to stockholders, reported that the demand for new loans declined from the previous two years; however, 1975 was still the third largest year in the bank's history and also the third consecutive year that loan closings had exceeded \$20 million. Dr. Phil Gram, Economist on leave of absence from Texas A&M University and B. K. Johnson, a prominent South Texas rancher and director of the King Ranch Corporation, also

addressed stockholders and guests during the meeting.

The Federal Land Bank of Houston makes long-term loans on farms and ranches throughout Texas and currently has 35,000 loans for more than \$1,145,000 outstanding.

Others attending the meeting from this area were Mrs. Tom Cunningham, Mrs. Woodrow Wood and Bill H. Bratton, Mgr. of Assoc.

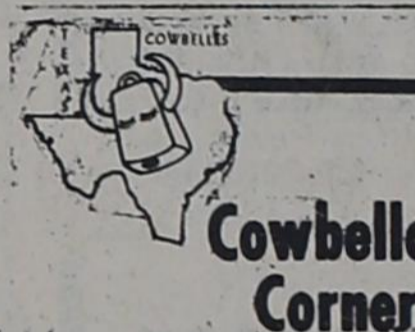

Society has four main program areas: Professional Education, Public Education, Service/Rehabilitation and Research.

Professional Education provides up-to-date information on cancer diagnosis and treatment to the medical and allied health professions. The past fiscal year, these programs reached over 81,965 physicians, dentists and nurses. Also, 16 clinics and 13 conferences were supported by the American Cancer Society in Texas.

Public Education helps save lives by increasing public awareness and knowledge about cancer, promoting early diagnosis and treatment of the disease. This year over 44,000 programs were presented to an audience of 1,724,337 people. Programs included ACS educational films, physicians and lay speakers, also thousands of exhibits and millions of educational pamphlets. Over 300,000

Texas participated in one or more of the Society's new "Action" Education Programs. The programs offer the public an opportunity to take direct action against cancer through cancer screening such as the pap test, proctoscopic, oral and breast exams. Other Action Programs include Stop Smoking Programs, and Breast Self-Examination demonstrations. Betty Tennard is the education chairman for North Wheeler Co.

The Service/Rehabilitation program seeks to save lives, to ease the pain and lighten the many burdens the disease places on its victims and their families. This year, the total number receiving ACS Service in Texas was 26,687 Texans. Research is a crucial phase of the ASC activity which enhances the possibility of finding those answers that will be useful to humanity for control of cancer.

Helton concluded, "I feel that fighting cancer is a local responsibility and challenge every concerned individual should meet. Every man, woman and child in our community has a stake in the outcome and each has a responsibility to participate in it. The American Cancer Society provides the opportunity." The week of April 4th has been proclaimed National Cancer week. The

annual Cancer Crusade will be made in each community sometime during April. Leading the drive in Wheeler will be Thomas Helton; In Basco, Bobbie Horn; Allison, Billie Dollar; Mobeetie, Maurita Stabling. When a volunteer calls at your door, give as generously as possible. 

## Production Credit Houston Meeting

Officers and directors of Canadian Production Credit Association join other agricultural credit specialists from across the state April 1-3 for the Federal Intermediate Credit Bank's annual meeting of stockholders in Houston's Hyatt Regency.

Canadian PCA participants include board members Wallace N. Hamker, Booker, chairman; James D. Skaggs, Pampa, vice chairman; Lloyd R. Buzzard, Spearman, L. F. Etheredge, Canadian; and C. B. Henderson, Wheeler. Etheredge is the association's president and secretary, and Bruce Bacus, vice president, will accompany the group.

Approximately 500 are expected for the meeting. Albin said, which is designed to bring together representatives of 32 Production Credit Associations and 7 agricultural credit corporations.

The Federal Intermediate Credit Bank of Houston, source of most funds for PCAs and agricultural credit corporations, last year loaned more than \$1.2 billion to Texas farmers and ranchers through these credit sources.

## AUTO TAG Deadline Thurs.

The left side is the right side for the 1976 license plate registration stickers. But Department of Public Safety officers say it doesn't matter.

Midnight Thursday is the deadline for having the small blue 1976 registration sticker affixed to Texas license plates, highway patrolmen said. After that, the vehicle will not be currently registered and the driver will be liable for a traffic citation.

A spokesman for the Department of Public Safety's motor vehicle division in Austin said although the small blue sticker is supposed to be placed in the upper left hand corner of the rear license plate, no citations would be issued if the sticker were mistakenly placed in the upper right hand corner.

"next year," the spokesman said, "they can just cover it up with the new sticker."

The department does not recommend trying to move the sticker if it is placed in the wrong corner, the spokesman said, because of the danger the sticker would come off in pieces.

The metal license plates currently on Texas cars were issued in 1975.

This year, registration stickers with adhesive backing are to be placed in the upper left hand corner of the plate. The following year, another sticker is to be placed in the upper right hand corner. Succeeding years will alternate corners until the metal plate has been used for five years.

## Mrs. Wiley Attends Seminar

Mrs. Ruth Wiley, Teacher-Coordinator of useful Homemaking and Home Economics Cooperative Education, attended the Parent Education Seminar held in Amarillo on Saturday, March 27. The Seminar was co-sponsored by the Texas Home Economics Association District J and the Golden Spread Chapter of the National Foundation March of Dimes.

Mentioned as contributors in this area among others were rubella, and the alcohol syndrome. Dr. Aase said "The alcohol syndrome is currently the third most common known cause of mental deficiency. It has probably been around since persons began using distilled alcohol but the important thing is that it is totally preventable."

Other speakers included Dr. William Furst, Odessa, chairman of the subcommittee for parenting in the American Academy of Pediatrics; Christy Cutler of the University of Colorado Medical Center in Denver; and Helene Botsonis, volunteer state advisor for the March of Dimes.

## SOIL CONSERVATION WIND EROSION AND THE LAND

What does wind erosion do to the land? Everyone realizes that it is bad but a lot of the damage is not readily seen.

One of the main damages from wind erosion is the removal of the finer parts of the soil and these are the most important. These finer parts hold most of the plant nutrients needed for good growth. Wind erosion can be seen best on cropland but it can be a problem on rangeland.

Vegetation is the single most important factor in determining the amount of soil loss from blowing. It influences organic matter, soil moisture and wind speed.

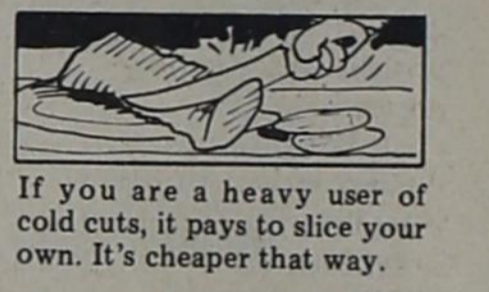
On rangeland to get good vegetative cover proper use of the grasses is most important. Don't take all of the years growth. Leave about half of the current years growth by weight standing. This will reduce wind speed close to the ground. Also it will allow litter to cover the

ground to protect any bare spots.

The Soil Conservation Service working through the Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation District will be glad to assist in any way possible to help control wind erosion problems. Feel free to call or come by the office in Wheeler.

**ALL TO TAKE A RIVER'S PULSE**

In Texas there are more than 3,500 rivers and streams with a combined length of about 80,000 miles. So think how busy the TWQB field people were back in 1967 when there were only 20 people to gather samples from those miles of water in order to determine whether a stream was sickly or in good health. That's the way it was for a while after the TWQB became a bona fide state agency.

But things improved as time went by. From the 65 sampling stations throughout the state in 1967, the number has grown to 650 and samples are taken on a regular basis to "feel the pulse" of the rivers which, incidentally, are in better health now than they were nine years ago.

Tests can be performed in the field, such as rate of flow, dissolved oxygen, pH (for acidity or alkalinity), temperature, turbidity (signifying clarity of the water), chlorides and conductivity.

But there are some tests which require laboratory equipment in order to make the picture complete. So additional samples are taken and sent to authorized labs to provide still more scientific information regarding the health of Texas streams.

Water sampling is done on all 15 of the state's rivers and their tributaries every three months, except for the densely populated areas such as Houston, Dallas and San Antonio where sampling is done more frequently.

Then there are the 92 reservoirs in Texas whose health also must be guarded and where sampling is done by TWQB field personnel on a quarterly basis. The quality of the water in Texas reservoirs (nearly all of which are man-made) is considered very good.

In addition to the scientific factors (pH, oxygen, etc.), the biologists, chemists and other scientific types who do the water sampling, take note of the fish species in the streams, as well as plant and animal life growing along the river beds, to provide still another indication of the health of the water in which they're found.

Then, added to regular sampling activities, Intensive Monitoring Surveys are being conducted throughout the state, taking the rivers and streams, segment by segment, for really detailed studies of the state's waters. Reports on the surveys are printed as they are completed and become a permanent record of the improving condition of our rivers and streams.

So, if you see two or three people in hip boots wading in a stream, check to see if they're driving a TWQB vehicle. If so, they're not after a fish for supper. They're feeling the river's pulse.

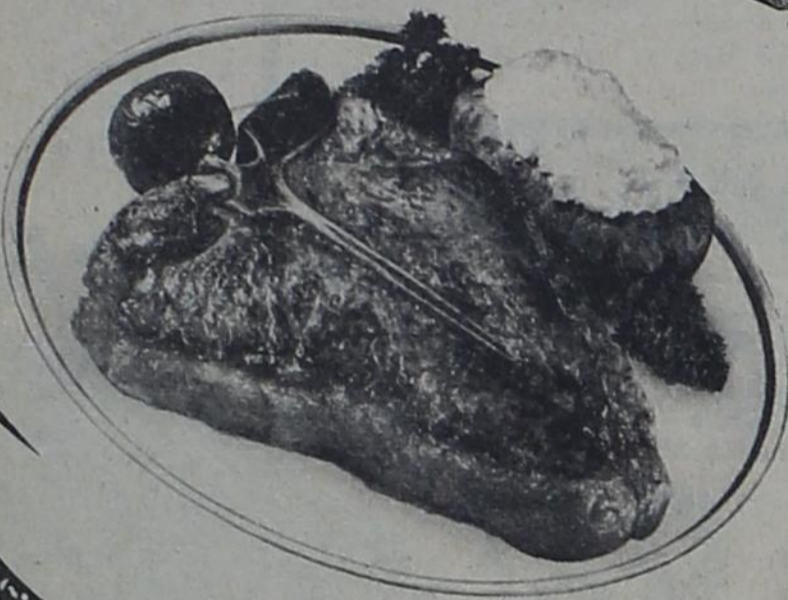
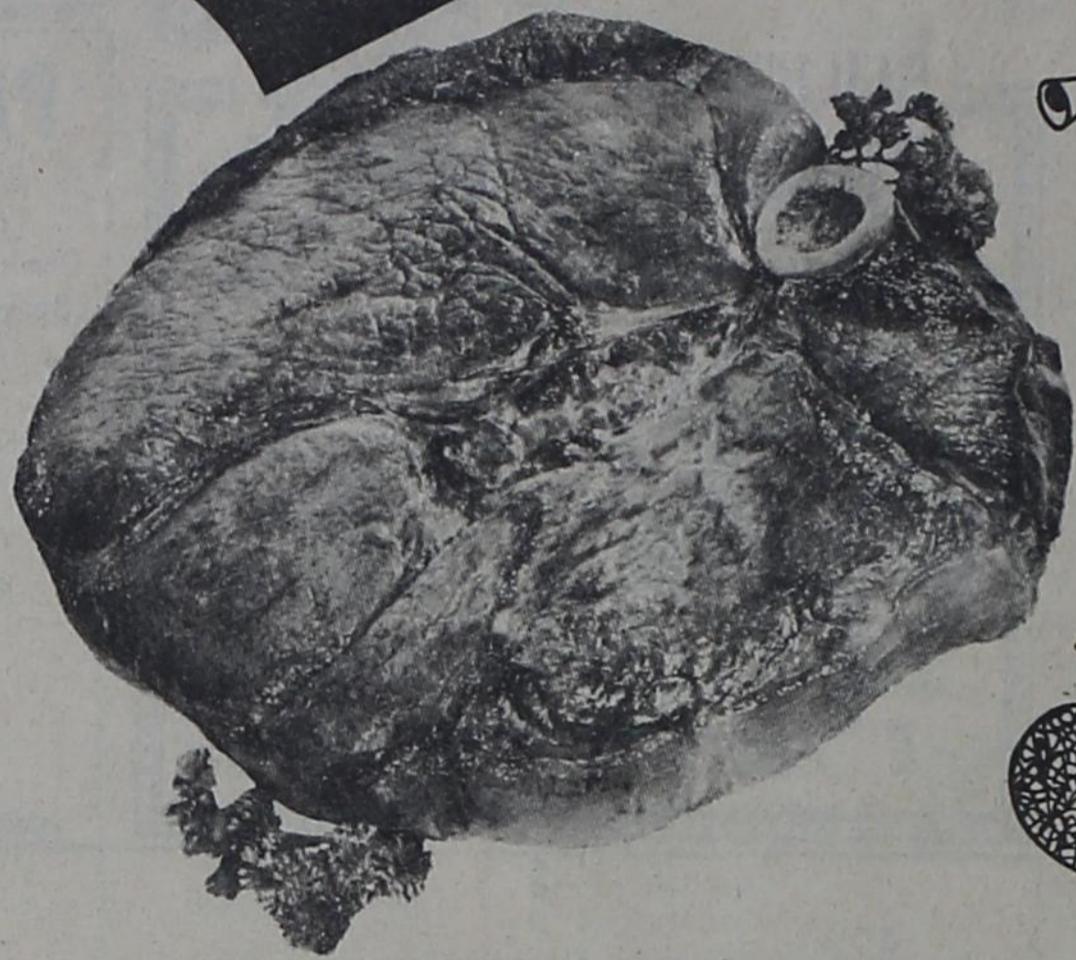
