





A new instrument has recently been added to the growing list of city improvements. Workers have completed the installation of a new Telemetering Control which July 25, 1960 automatically maintains the level of water in the big storage tank. The new instrument was install-Low-cost, lighted in the Fire Station, which is directly under the overhead storage tank. 
