The State ASC Committee announced that the annual marketing quota referendum for wheat growers will be held July 21 as the first step in the wheat program for 1961 required by present law. The purpose of the referendum is to determine whether or not wheat growers wish to market their 1961-crop wheat under a marketing quota system.

Growers who have more than 15 acres of wheat for harvest as grain in 1961 in any of the 39 commercial wheat states come under the regulation of quotas and will be eligible to vote in the referendum. At least two thirds of the producers voting in the referendum on July 21 must approve quotas for the 1961 crop if they are to be in

1961 Wheat Crop Marketing Quotas

on their entire production. Growers who exceed their acreage allotments will be subject to marketing quota penalties if they have more than 15 acres of wheat for harvest.

The penalty rate on "excess" wheat under the present law is 45 percent of the parity price of wheat as of May 1 of the year of harvest.

Marketing quotas are disapproved, there will be no restrictions on wheat marketings. Acreage allotments will remain in effect as a condition of eligibility for price support at the 50 percent of parity, as of July 1, 1961, rate required by law if quotas are disapproved.

John united with the Methodist Church at an early age and was active in all church and community affairs as long as his health would permit. He took a great interest in the Masonic Lodge and the Order of the Eastern Star.

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
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HI THERE

HIGH LIGHTS AND SIDE LIGHTS FROM YOUR STATE CAPITOL

ANSTIN, Tex.—Although budget balancing is the most discussed of the problems facing the next Legislature, many lawmakers expect redistricting wrangles may raise more blood pressure.

Legislation to re-define legislative districts after each federal census, it used to put off this troublesome task, but a 1948 law provides that if it fails to act in the first session after census, a Legislature Redistricting Board shall take over.

This insurs, as it did in 1951, that the Legislature will redistrict somehow, some way.

Battle will be between the big city delegations who will demand more representation in line with swelling population and rural members who will try to hold onto as much as they can.

In their election campaigns, many representatives promised their constituents they'd be in there pitching for the home area. Members from growth areas said they'd go after extra representation, state senators and congressmen.

A rural legislator told his people, "At least twelve rural districts will disappear in the next redistricting. I certainly do not want this district included in that twelve."

Incumbents cited their experience as an asset. Personal feelings entered into redistricting, and lawmakers are notably reluctant to "squeeze out" a popular and respected senior colleague by erasing his district.

HOME INSURANCE CUT—Beginning August 1, premium rates on certain types of homeowner's insurance policies will be cut 10 percent.

State Insurance Board announced the new lower rates would apply to the "homeowners package" policies which account for about 80 percent of the home coverage sold in Texas.

Reductions were made possible because insurance companies have had a relatively low loss ratio on the package policies, first introduced about three years ago.

CREDIT RATE EYED—Board of Insurance also is considering a further lowering of credit insurance rates.

Many loan companies require borrowers to take out insurance payable to the loan company in case something happens to the borrower before he repays.

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Texas who have been motoring cross-country during their summer vacation will not find this hard to believe. So noticeably superior are Texas roads to those of surrounding states that returning Texans usually give a sigh of relief when they cross the state line.

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"If the amount is granted, Texas prisoners will cost the state \$1.89 per day per man," said State Prison Director O. B. Ellis. "This is just a little more than half the national average."

Ellis and Corrections Board members regard prison needs as critical. Board Chairman H. H. Coffield of Rockdale reported that "the prison population trends indicate it will keep on multiplying."

WILSON HONORED—Atty. Gen. Will Wilson has been named by the National Association of Attorneys General as the recipient of that association's award for outstanding service in 1959. He was cited as being the most outstanding Attorney General and the nation when he received the Wyman Award at the Annual Meeting of the National Association of Attorneys General recently in San Francisco.

Award is given to the Attorney General who "has done the most to advance the objectives of the association to help make the United States a better place in which to live for all." Wilson won the honor on the basis of his contribution in strengthening state anti-trust programs and in his field of through his service on the habeas corpus committee of the association. He also was chairman of the association's Antitrust Committee during 1960.

HIGH LIGHTS AND SIDE LIGHTS FROM YOUR STATE CAPITOL

ANSTIN, Tex.—Although budget balancing is the most discussed of the problems facing the next Legislature, many lawmakers expect redistricting wrangles may raise more blood pressure.

Legislature is required by the Constitution to re-define legislative districts after each federal census. It used to put off this troublesome task, but a 1948 law provides that if it fails to act in the first session after census, a Legislative Redistricting Board shall take over.

This insures, as it did in 1951, that the Legislature will redistrict somehow, some way.

Battle will be between the big city delegations who will demand more representation in line with swelling population and rural members who will try to hold onto as much as they can.

In their election campaigns, many representatives promised their constituents they'd be in there pitching for the home area. Members from growth areas as it they'd go after extra representatives, state senators and congressmen.

A rural legislator told his people, "At least twelve rural districts will disappear in the next redistricting. I certainly do not want this district included in that twelve."

Incumbents cited their experience as an asset. Personal feelings entered into redistricting, and lawmakers are notably reluctant to "squeeze out" a popular and respected senior colleague by erasing his district.

HOME INSURANCE CUT—Beginning August 1, premium rates on certain types of home-owners' insurance policies will be cut 10 percent.

State Insurance Board announced the new lower rates would apply to the "home-owners package" policies which account for about 80 percent of the home coverage sold in Texas.

Reductions were made possible because insurance companies have had a relatively low loss ratio on the package policies, first introduced about three years ago.

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Ellis and Corrections Board members regard prison needs as critical. Board Chairman H. H. Coffield of Rockdale reported that "the prison population trends indicate it will keep on multiplying."

WILSON HONORED—Atty. Gen. Will Wilson has been named by the National Association of Attorneys General as the recipient of that association's award for outstanding service in 1959. He was cited as being the most outstanding Attorney General and the nation when he received the Wyman Award at the Annual Meeting of the National Association of Attorneys General recently in San Francisco.

Award is given to the Attorney General who has done the most to advance the objectives of the association to help make the United States a better place in which to live for all." Wilson won the honor on the basis of his contribution in strengthening state anti-trust programs and in his field of through his service on the habeas corpus committee of the association. He also was chairman of the association's Antitrust Committee during 1960.

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
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4-H Dress Review Held Tuesday Night

Property damage wrecks accounted for 2 of the total, personal injury for 3 and 1 were fatal accidents. These wrecks caused a total property damage of \$4,075.00 with 5 persons injured and 1 life lost.

Sergeant Aibers pointed out that this brings the total for the year in this county to 1 killed, 24 injured, and property damage in excess of \$14,060.00. This compares with 0 killed, 37 injured, and property damage of \$20,515.00 during the first six months of 1959.

"Prior to July 1 there had been a total of 784 fatal accidents in Texas," Sergeant Aibers said. "From these accidents, 962 persons have died needlessly."





City Installs New Telemetering Instrument

A new instrument has recently been added to the growing list of city improvements. Workers have completed the installation of a new Telemetering Control which automatically maintains the level of water in the big storage tank. The new instrument was installed in the City Station, which is directly under the overhead storage tank. The old pressure control system was abandoned because line friction and taps located between the storage tank and the wells caused the pressure to vary, making it impossible to maintain the water level in the tank. The new system works directly from the tank and when the water level varies as much as 2 feet the pumps are automatically activated.

Farmer, You Must Keep Accurate Records

"If good weather continues the wheat farmers in the Panhandle may enjoy a very profitable year in 1960," Hal Geldon said today. Geldon is the Manager of the Amarillo Social Security Office. Keeping a watchful eye on trends is one of his many duties. One trend he observed is that farmers in this area are hiring more extra hands this season than they have in the past several years. "It is important," Hal Geldon stated, "that these farm workers show their social security cards to their employer and it is equally important that the farmer keep accurate records of the wages that he pays each worker and the number of days these people work." This is important because the farmer must report each individual to whom he pays cash wages of at least \$150.00 a year, or cash wages of any amount if the worker performed some work on at least 20 days in the year on a time basis (i.e. by the hour, day, week, etc.). Geldon remarked on the need for good record keeping on the part of farmers and their employees all during the year, but especially at this time when attention is centered on getting the crops in. People forget things when they are busy, but good records will always tell an accurate story. Anyone who thinks the customer isn't important should try doing without him for 90 days.




