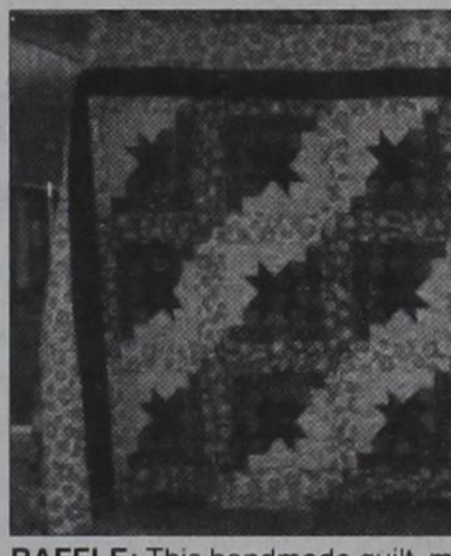
Parkview Board Conducts Business






