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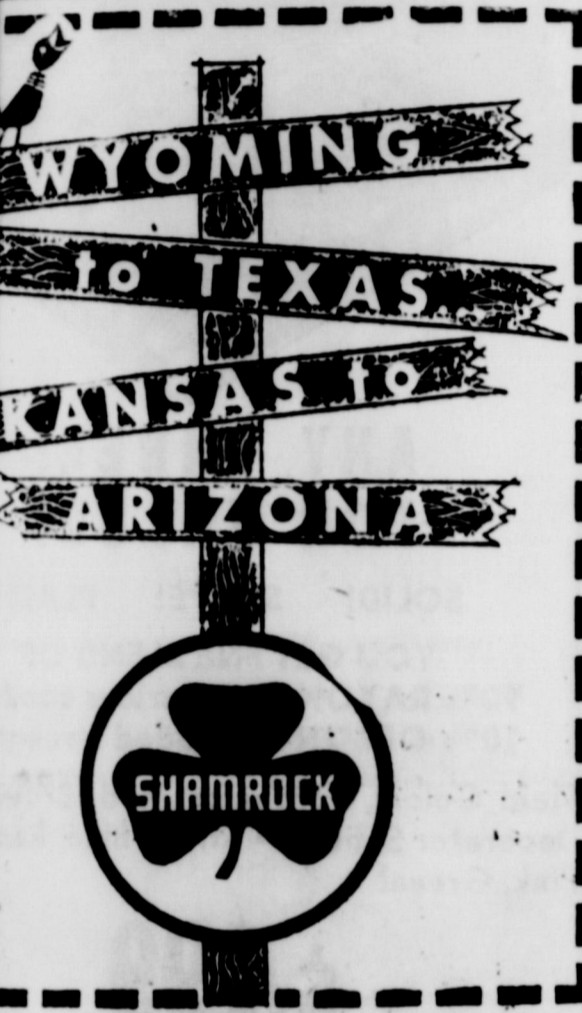

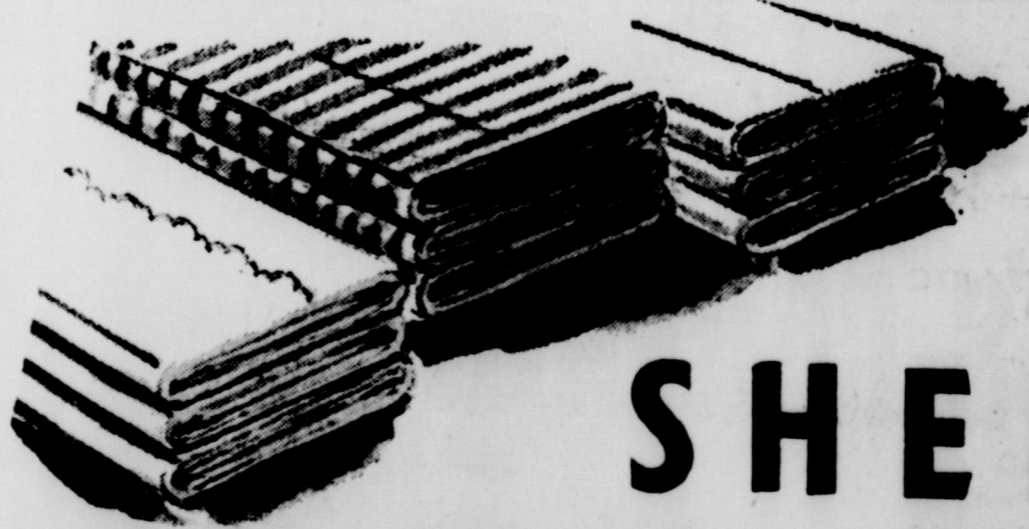

ervation Districts and the County Commissioners Courts have entered into a watershed protection operation and maintenance agreement with the SCS to assume responsibility of maintenance of the dams.

The watershed project is expected to accomplish major savings in flood losses. Estimated annual damage directly attributed to flood water, is \$109,581, according to SCS figures. Of this amount, more than \$65,000 is damage to crop land, about \$14,000 to other agricultural acreage, and nearly \$30,000 to roads, bridges, and other public utilities.

The project when completed is expected to return \$1.39 per year in savings for each dollar invested.

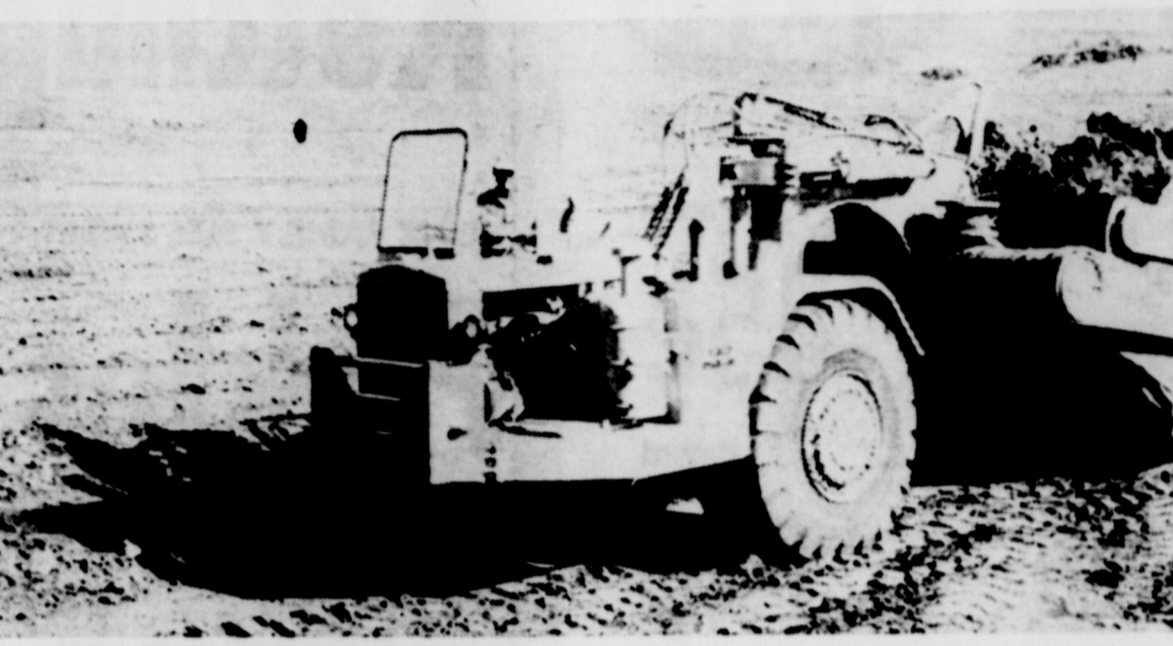

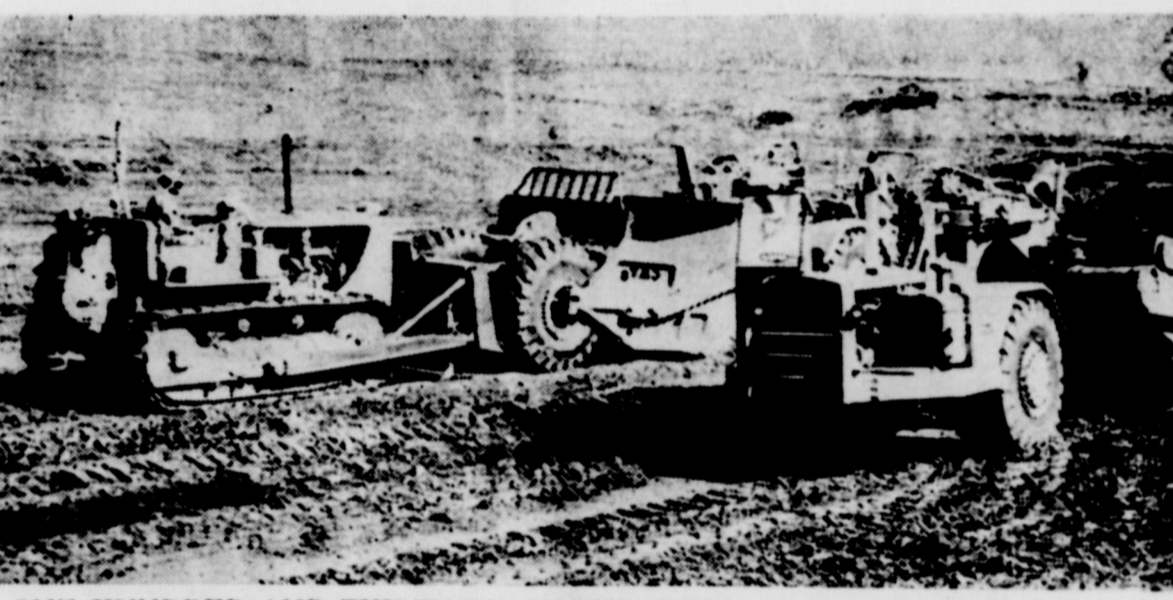
