That Section 24 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

Members of the Legis-lature shall receive from the Public Trensury an annual salary of not ex-ceeding Four Thousand, Eight Hundred Dollars (\$4,800) per year and a per diem of not exceeding Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day for the first one hundred and twenty (120) days only of each Regular Session and for thirty (30) days of each Special Session of the Legislature. No Regular Session shall be of longer duration than one hundred and forty (140) days. "In addition to the per diem the one hundred and forty (140) days."
