Preaching Is A 'Full Time Job' For Church Of Christ Speaker, Don Willingham

Willingham Speaks To Local Club On The "Battle Ahead"

Don Willingham, evangelist for the Church of Christ revival, was the guest speaker at the regular Kiwanis meeting held Monday in the fellowship hall of the Methodist Church.

Brother Willingham spoke to the group on the "Battle Ahead." Local Kiwanians and businessmen attended the meeting and heard a rousing speech by Willingham, minister of the Second and Deahl Church of Christ in Borger.

Willingham warned the group of what he termed a liberal and leftist trend in government.

"Two dark clouds on our horizon," Willingham said, "are communism and socialism—and they are both different sides of the same coin."

The young minister urged the local Kiwanians to fight leftist trends in government and to attempt to relegate government back to its proper role.

"Our government was founded on the belief that it should act as a referee to guarantee and protect inalienable rights given to men by God," Willingham said. "Government was never meant to take away those rights or to compete with its citizens."

Willingham traced the giant strides communism has made in recent years and outlined communist coups in Europe and Asia.

"One of these days," he said, "we'll be next in line."

Evangelist Tells Story In Newspapers, TV, Radio and Pulpit

Probably one of the most active Church of Christ ministers in the Texas Panhandle, or anywhere else, is Brother Don Willingham, minister of the Second and Deahl Church of Christ in Borger, Tex.

Willingham is conducting a very successful and fruitful revival in the local Church of Christ this week. Services are held each evening at 8:00 p.m. and will continue through Sunday, August 21. Many of the old-timers and church members feel that Willingham is the best speaker ever to preach in the local church.

Sermons you will want to hear include: "What is God's Part And What is Man's Part In Salvation?" Friday night, Saturday night Brother Willingham will speak on "Will The Good People Of All Churches Be Saved?" and on Sunday night he will speak on "Where Are The Dead?"

Willingham, in addition to his duties as pastor of the Borger Church, has a 30 minute television program every Sunday afternoon over channel 7 in Amarillo. He has a 15 minute radio program over station KHUZ in Borger every Sunday. He teaches the Adult's class each Sunday and delivers messages at both morning and evening services not to mention the midweek meetings.

Brother Willingham is 26-years-old and has been preaching since he was 11 years old. He received his education at Harding College, Searcy, Ark., Freed-Hardeman University at Henderson, Tenn., Southeastern State at Durant, Okla., and has done some special work at Butler University in Indiana.

His church in Borger has over 400 members and in addition to his messages in the pulpit, on television and over radio, he writes a sermon each week for the Borger Newspaper.

Brother E. M. Borden, minister of the local Church of Christ is well pleased with results of the revival and he is urging everyone to attend the meetings.



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PHILOSOPHER ADVISES THE CITY PEOPLE NOT TO TAKE EXPERT'S ADVICE TO MOVE TO THE COUNTRY

Editor's note: The Sweetwater Philosopher on his Shinyery grass farm on Sweetwater creek disagrees with an advice columnist this week, his letter reveals.

Dear Editor:
I was sitting under my favorite shade tree out here on my shinyery grass farm the other day, the one that's lined up with two other trees spaced so accurately that as the afternoon wears on and the sun moves along, I can stay under the first tree and still be in the shade all the time without changing positions, as one tree picks up the shade from the other — its a great piece of mind for a man to know he can take a nap and not wake up to find his shade has gone and the sun's in his face, although this isn't to say he can't wake up even in the shade and find a hydrogen bomb has gone off somewhere in the world — at any rate, to get on with this sentence which is getting to be as long as a two-minute nominating speech that runs for an hour and a half, I did wake from a nap and I was still in the shade as I pulled out a newspaper. I'd been saving and fell to reading an article on advice to people thinking about changing jobs. As it explained, a man and his wife were thinking about giving up their job and home in town and moving to a farm, and the advice columnist was tackling the problem inside his air-conditioned office.

"My opinion," he said, "is that only a fool and his brother could expect to move from the city and operate a farm at a profit."

If my brother, who also lives on a farm, hears about this, I'll let him figure out which category he belongs in, but what bothered me over was that the columnist didn't stop there, he went on and said that despite this, "more city couples ought to try farming. This spirit is what has made the country great."

It is my opinion that this columnist has been reading too many farm-plank promises by too many political parties.

Advising a city man to move out into the country and operate a farm is about like advising a farmer to move into town and open up a supermarket. It's a fine spirit, but it's not what has made this country great. It's not what has made farming boom or super-boom — flourish.

Anybody in the city figuring on moving to the country to farm is making this country great again, to revise his standards of greatness. By leaving, he might improve the city, but he won't improve himself or farming either. What he'll do is go broke.

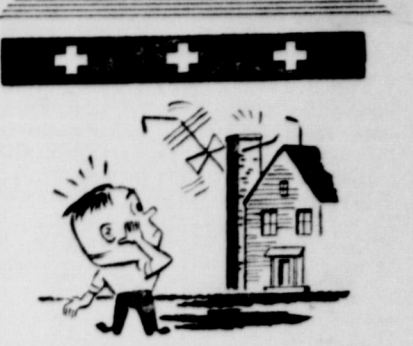

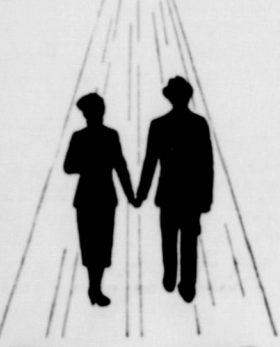
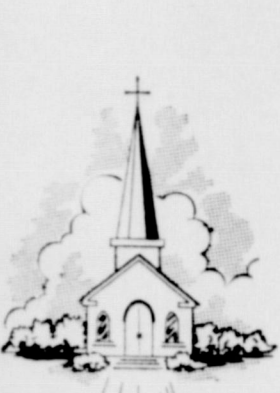


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The Golden Time

Letter From Lyndon

By LYNDON B. JOHNSON

Hello Fellow Americans:

Lady Bird and I have just come back to the ranch from three of the most exciting days of our lives and we want to share some of our experiences with you.

Aboard the plane that carried us almost 5,000 miles were thirty-eight of our friends from Texas newspapers, radio stations and television stations. Twelve of these people represented weekly newspapers. You would have been proud of the way they spread Texas as good will everywhere we traveled.

The big turbo-prop Viscount set us down first in Kansas City. I had lunch there with the Grand Old Man of the Democratic Party—Harry Truman. He's lost none of the fire and steel of his soul that made him one of our most colorful—and decisive—Presidents.

Someone asked Mr. Truman what he thought of the Democratic ticket. "It's a winner for sure," he said. "What did you think of the Republican Convention, Mr. President?" another reporter asked.

"Worst in history," Mr. Truman replied.

The outreach of Hurricane Brenda delay our arrival in Hyannis, Massachusetts for my conference with Senator Kennedy. The pilots—Captain Ruzen, Capt. J. J. Dickson of El Paso—who became the father of a new baby girl during the trip—brought us in for a perfect instrument landing when the visibility was only 175 feet.

Senator Kennedy and I sat up until 1:00 a.m. We talked about the program for the people we believe Congress will enact during the remaining weeks of the session, the coming campaign (Senator Kennedy accepted my invitation to come to Texas), and we also compared gray hairs. After the young men had gone to bed, I stayed up and worked until 2:30 a.m.

Lady Bird "hook" to the Kennedy's home. It is a large, comfortable, pleasant house on Cape Cod. Jacqueline has furnished it with early American antiques and I almost didn't get Lady Bird away from her inspection tour in time for the press conference.

Before we left Saturday, Senator Kennedy and Jackie came aboard our press bus and told our folks how happy they were that Texas has sent such a fine group of men and women along on the trip.

Saturday afternoon we were in Nashville, Tennessee where we were guests of Governor and Mrs. Buford Ellington.

I spoke that night to a Democratic rally of ten thousand people and when Governor Ellington introduced me, he had to send his State Troopers out into the crowd to ask folks to stop applauding Governor Ellington told me that Tennessee hadn't seen a turnout like that "in a long, long time."

Every Southern state was represented and the Governors of Florida, North Carolina, Alabama, Virginia and Kentucky predicted a sweeping victory in November.

More than ten thousand people waited under the hot sun in Monticello, Iowa when we arrived there Sunday afternoon. Their enthusiasm got the best of me and I spoke for an hour—interrupted 61 times by applause. They listened attentively as I outlined the vigorous action I hope the Democratic Administration takes on the farm problem next January.

I like these folks. They're big-hearted, friendly, eager to erase barriers between people and willing to consider new ideas. I really felt at home there—especially when Lady Bird and I visited a 300-acre farm near Monticello. The big black Angus and the Guernseys would have made us proud in Texas—and the chocolate cake melted in my mouth.

It was a good—and productive—trip. Three very tangible results came out of it.

(1) Senator Kennedy scolded me once and for all his convictions that the next Vice President will play a decisive role in Government affairs.

This is what he said in his press conference.

"We are very fortunate to have Senator Johnson's assistance in carrying out the program. It we are successful in November, I think Senator Johnson can play a role as Vice President greater, more influential, and with greater benefit to the public than any Vice President in recent times."

(2) Southern leaders evidenced a quality of unity unlike any we have seen for a long time. I came away from Nashville convinced that the people of this country want to see free Americans together before they want to be anything else, and they wanted me to speak to them not as a Southerner to a Southerner or a Protestant to a Protestant, but as an American to Americans.

(3) Senator Kennedy and I examined our relationship as run-mates. There is no tension between us and we are not "poles apart" as our opponents insinuated in Chicago. Instead, we are united in a common purpose of opening the New Frontiers of America and bringing to all of our people a better life in the days ahead.



Dr. Ralph T. Green To Speak To 200 Convocation Degree Candidates

CANYON, Aug. 18. (Special)—Speaker for more than 200 West Texas State College summer convocation degree candidates will be Dr. Ralph T. Green, director of the Texas Commission on Higher Education. The convocation will be Aug. 19 at 8 p.m. in the new Buffalo Stadium.

Dr. Green, while visiting on the WT campus, will also evaluate the new West Texas Student Teacher Center Project, a two-year experimental program in student teaching practices established in the fall of 1959. The program is due to continue another year and is seen as a guide for other college student teaching practices throughout the state.

Dr. Green became director of the new Texas commission in 1956 after a one year stint as professor and chairman of the department of economics and finance at Baylor University. He has previously been financial economist for the Federal Reserve Bank of Dallas from 1949 until 1955. He was a professor at Duke University, where he earned his Ph.D., and at Texas A&M, where he earned his B.A. and M.A. degrees.

Dr. Green has written a number of articles for publication in the areas of finance, economics and public higher education. He is the Texas member of the Southern Regional Education Board and of the Research Advisory Committee of the board. He is currently a member of the advisory committee to the Virginia Council of Higher Education and is past chairman of the national Conference of Executive Officers of State-wide Boards of Higher Education.

THE Question Box

(Editor's Note: This is the second in a series of features on important political issues. The questions and answers are compiled by an independent source and are not necessarily the views of the Times.)

Question: Should I vote a Democratic Ticket just because I live in the South, or just because my father voted that ticket?

Answer: This question brings up some of the deepest resentments and real soul-searching feelings of any proposition confronting the young voter today.

No young person can or should be governed in his or her political thinking by the position assumed by their respective parents. It might be asked, "If the advice of my parents is to be followed in other mundane matters, than why not in political also. And it can be answered that politics, more than any other human activities, is based on prejudice and traditions.

From the closing of the Civil War until now, it has been the custom of the Southern Citizens to support the Democratic ideology, because of the abuse of power by Republican politicians who infested the South during the reconstruction days. Naturally the carpet-baggers and scallawags took every advantage of the disfranchisement of the South. The scars of sectionalism takes a long time to heal. When politics are the subject of any discussion, the fathers and grandfathers of the youngster of today think of the hardships and sufferings caused by these emissaries of a northern government that acted as a conqueror for three decades after the close of the Civil War. Each of these agents, who assumed political power in the South, traveled under the name "Repeaters". They were contemptuously referred to, by the Southerners, as fanatics. It has taken more than two world's wars and the intermarriage of Yankees and rebels to remove the content that the older southerner holds for anyone who comes from north of the Mason-Dixon line.

On the whole, I think you will find that today the Federal Government, whatever be its political complexion, thinks in terms of the entire nation rather than in terms of a rich northern manufacturing aristocracy dealing with a poor southern plantation gentry.

The discussion of the internal division in the political complexion of the two parties will be made under answer to some of the other questions you have proposed.
