Quarterbackers Sell Reserve Section Seats

If you plan to sit in the reserve section during your hometown football games, you had better act quickly.

After a meeting of the Wheeler Quarterback Club Friday night the group, under the direction of Harrison Hall, president, decided to sell seats for the entire season in the reserve section of Nicholson field.

Proceeds from the sale of the seats will be given to the school system to help pay for the underground wiring and additional lights which are being installed.

A total of 220 seats were available in the reserve section which is located on the 50 yard line in front of the press box. However, by Wednesday morning, only 18 of the reserve seats were still available.

Two purchase plans are being offered to football fans. Under the family plan, \$25.00 will reserve enough seats for the entire family. And under the individual plan \$5.00 will reserve one seat. Reserve seat cards will be issued designating the seat and row number. This card must be presented to the usher at each game in order to get proper seating.

Approximately \$1,000 has been raised by the Club since the project started Friday night.

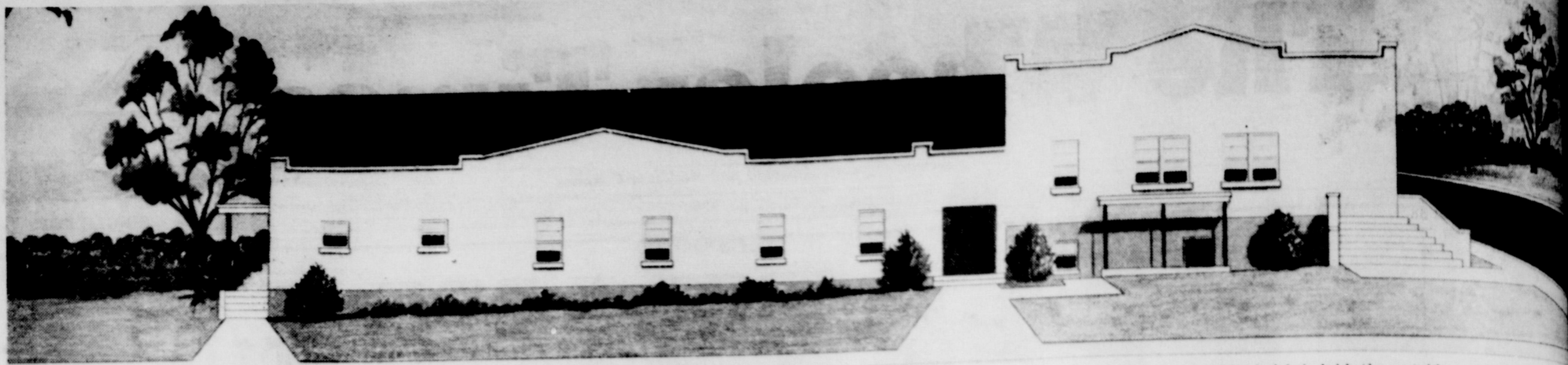

Editor's note: The Sweetwater Philosopher on his Shinnery grass farm on Sweetwater Creek probably is unnecessarily concerned about the current session of Congress, his letter this week indicates, but that's his worry. Dear Editor:

I don't now how it happened and I hope it never happens again, but this idea of a session of Congress before an election instead of afterwards, has me worried.

What I'm afraid of is it will destroy one of the most cherished things in American political life, from the precinct level to Washington, namely PROMISES.

Next to the handshake, I guess a promise has been the strongest weapon a man could have when he's running for office, although this doesn't mean a wife and kids

don't help too, and I'll never understand how both parties managed to get in a position like they are now, where they have a chance to deliver on their promises before the election. It seems to me it's undermining the entire system of politics.

In the first place, a promise should be dangled in front of a man longer than from July to August of the same year. How much fun would kids get out of Christmas if they didn't start wishing till Christmas eve?

A man lives on promises, at least us farmers do. Pick out any year you want to, and if the average farmer hadn't thought the next year wasn't gonna be better than that one, you wouldn't have much farm population left or any crops. The same is true of politics. The

very least a voter can do is enjoy a set of promises from convention time in the summer to legislating time along in early spring of the next year, but this idea of promising in July and dashing hopes in August, takes all the fun out of life. If a man can't dream of a better life of more aid and fewer taxes longer than two or three weeks, reality will get him down and politics will begin to lose its appeal.

It's the craziest thing I ever heard of, trying to deliver on a set of promises before the people have a chance to vote on you. Let's get back to the old system.

Sidelights and Comments on Happenings Our of the Ordinary
Howard Moore Enthused Over Real Western Rodeo

The kind of rodeos to be seen in New York, Pittsburg and other metropolitan centers might be exciting, but they can't hold a candle to a "real western rodeo."

That's the opinion of Howard Moore, retired underwriter of the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company, who has just returned home from Texas. He describes the event he saw there in glowing terms.

He went to Amarillo, Tex., in July, accompanied by Mrs. Moore; a sister, Mrs. Bryan Newmyer; Mrs. Vesta Holland and Miss Mary Rishel, both of Uniontown. The principal reason for the trip was to take Mrs. Newmyer to the home of a son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. Howard Baughman, where the stork was expected to arrive August 1.

"We got to Amarillo on the evening of July 12," said Moore. "They had taken Margaret Jean to the hospital at 5 o'clock. We arrived at 6 o'clock. The baby was born at 7:10, so we really had only an hour to spare although we thought we'd be about two weeks early."

A son, weighing six pounds, nine ounces was born to the Baughmans.

The rodeo was held at a place called Wheeler, Tex. "It is a town of about 800 people," said Moore, "but there were around 6 thousand people at the rodeo. It's a three day affair but we were there only on the first day. When some of the committee learned we were from Pennsylvania and were seeing our first real western rodeo they went all out to make certain we were entertained and understood what was going on. They announced our names over the loud speaker and had us stand. Then every once in a while, the announcer would ask: 'What do you think of this, Mr. and Mrs. Moore?' and we'd have to stand again and indicate that we were enjoying ourselves."

Moore said the admission was \$1 per person. "And do you know," he asserted enthusiastically, "they even fed us for that same dollar. Yes sir, they had a pit barbecue that first day and the food was included in the price of our tickets. You could have either ham or beef. Everyone formed in a line and they piled our plates high. I told them that never in my life had a single dollar bought me so much."

Moore said "they fed everyone who attended—and I know there were six thousand people present." He said he understood it took 1,800 pounds of meat.

"People came from as far as 150 miles away," he went on. "There were five hundred horses in the parade which preceded the events and there were one hundred seventy-six horses in the rodeo."

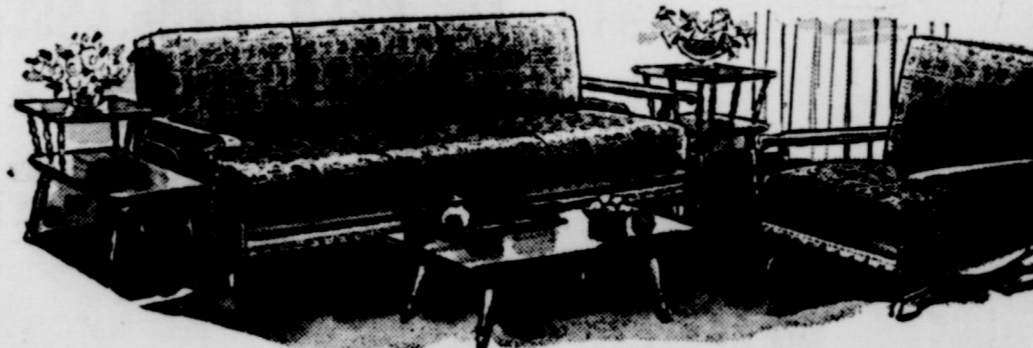

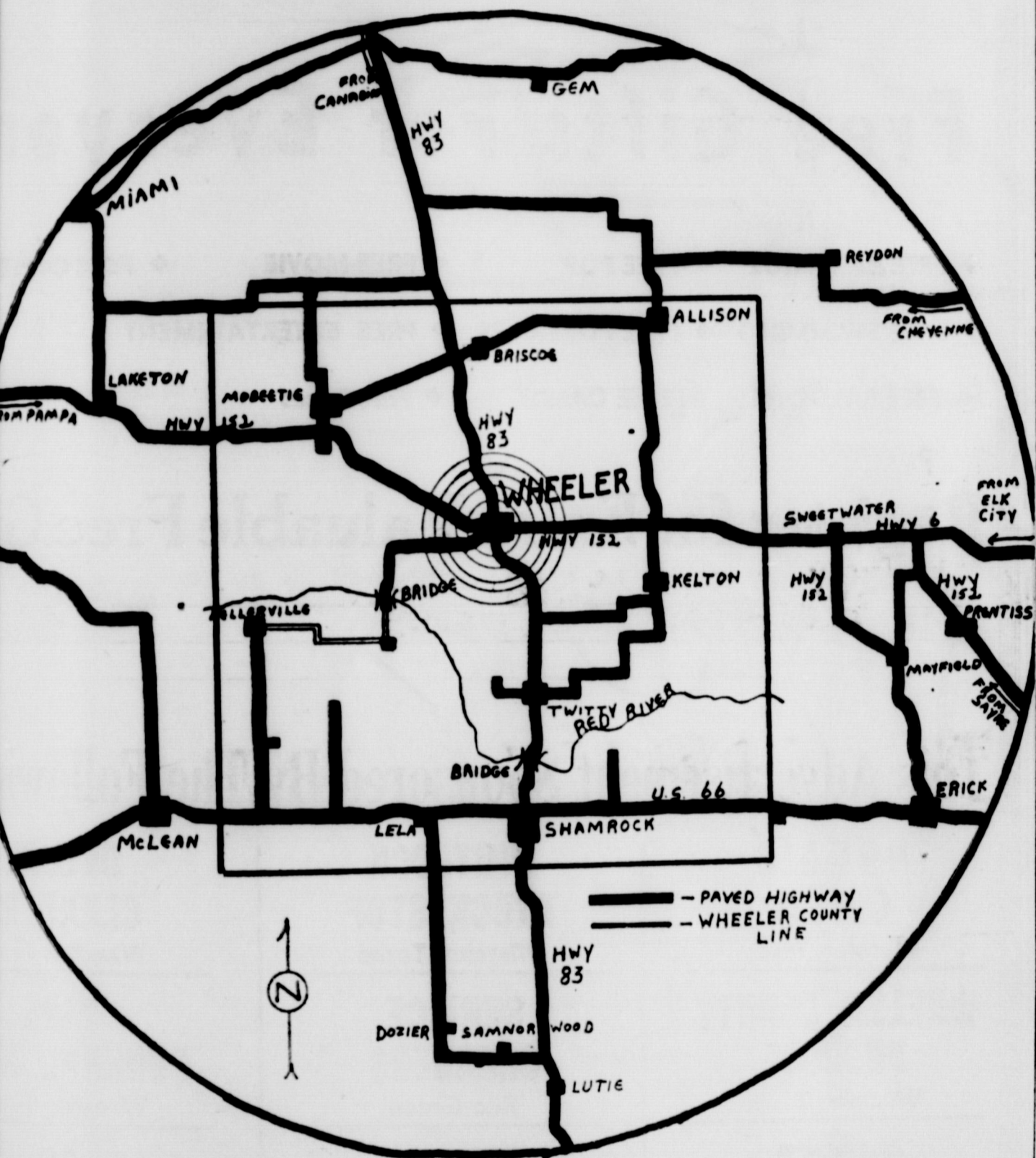

**HIGH LIGHTS AND SIDE LIGHTS
FROM YOUR STATE CAPITOL**

AUSTIN, Tex. — Election year
upheavals plus Texas' "kne duck"
law" are playing havoc with the
work of interim legislative com-
mittees.

Atty. Gen. Will Wilson ruled
that, except in special cases, in-
terim committee members not re-
elected to the Legislature may not
continue to serve on the commit-
tees. This brings a shake-up in the
membership of a number of study
groups now in the midst of their
work.

Biggest change will be in the
make-up of the House General in-
vestigating Committee which has
been asked to look into several
politically touchy questions. Going
off the five-member committee are
the chairman, Rep. H. J. Blanche-
ard of Lubbock, and Reps. Joe
Burkett of Kerrville and Carl Con-
ley of Raymondville.

Nine other legislative commit-
tees lost one or more members
who either did not run again or
were defeated.

Not affected were members of
the Commission on State and Lo-
cal Tax Policy. Attorney General
noted that this group was set up
under a law which specifically pro-
vided its members should serve a
two-year term.

Also continuing to serve, whether
re-elected or not, will be those
members of the Legislative Budget
Council and Legislative Budget
Board who—like the Speaker of
the house are members because of
the jobs they hold.

In the appointment of commit-
tees on which "lame duck" may not
continue to serve next year's spea-
ker and lieutenant governor face
a problem. Only way to prevent
vacancies would be to second-guess
the political future of each ap-
pointee.

YOUTH CRIME RISE SEEN—
Juvenile delinquency in Texas will
get worse before it gets better, the
Texas Youth Council director pre-
dicted.

Dr. James Turman presented to
the Legislature Budget Board the
Council's request for an appropria-
tion of \$4,255,470 for the coming
biennium. This is an increase over
the present two-year allocation of
\$3,487,442.

A part of this increase is to
build for future needs. Turman
noted that the Gatesville Training
School for Boys had 403 boys in
1950 compared to its present av-
erage of 1,300. He predicted an
average population of 1,790 during
the coming two years and 2,959 by
the end of the sixties.

Turman also urged the setting
up of a system of paid parole
supervisors "to keep some of these
kids from coming back." He said
that some of the boys had been to
Gatesville as many as five times
and that up to one-third were re-
peaters.

**ANTI-LOAN SHARK COM-
MITTEE**—A citizens committee is
being formed to work for approval
of a constitutional amendment to
give the legislature more regula-
tory power over the small loan in-
dustry.

Abner V. McCall, executive vice
president of Baylor University, is
chairman, and Tom Reavley, Aus-
tin attorney and former secretary
of state, is vice chairman.

Proposed amendment will be
Number Four on the general elec-
tion ballot in November. It
would give the Legislature power
to license and regulate lenders and
set maximum rates of interest. Un-
til and unless the Legislature set
a new rate, the present constitu-
tional maximum of 10 percent
would apply.

Adoption of Amendment Four
is an essential first step, said Mc-
Call, to wiping out Texas' reputa-
tion as "the lone shark state." He
said that Gov. Price Daniel, Lt.
Gov. Ben Ramsey and Atty. Gen.
Wilson favored the amendment and
were honorary members of the
committee.

TEC HITS CHEATERS—Texas
Employment Commission has filed
complaints against some 100 per-
sons accused of drawing unemploy-
ment compensation pay while actu-
ally working.

As a result of a widespread in-
vestigation, TEC has filed several
score suits against persons it de-
clared were receiving benefits and
salaries at the same time.

Some of the defendants have al-
ready been tried, fined and order-
ed to repay the money received
from TEC. Most of the cases in-
volve workers in Houston and
Brownsville.

Law provides that workers who
lose their jobs through no fault of
their own and cannot get other
jobs may receive \$28 a week for
up to 26 weeks, while unemployed.
Violators can receive up to a \$50
fine and 30-day jail sentence.

**LAWBREAKING ON INCREA-
SE**—Department of Public Safety
report shows that one of the fast-
est growing statistics in Texas is
the number of major crimes com-
mitted—up 10.3 per cent for the
first half of 1960.

For the first six months of this
year DPS estimates 96,681 major
crimes were committed in Texas,
compared to 86,679 for the same
period in 1959.

One of the brighter spots in the
report is that murders and homi-
cides decreased by 15.1 percent
Burglaries, however, rose 19.2
percent.

Biggest crime increase was in
urban areas—up 12.5 percent. In
rural sections the rate was down
a little—less than one per cent.

VACCINATIONS URGED—
Texas is one of the safer states as
far as paralytic polio is concerned,
but it's seventh in the nation
in number of whooping cough cas-
es, ninth in diphtheria and scarlet

fever.
All these rates could be cut,
said State Health Department
spokesman, if there were fewer
people who can't be bothered with
getting protective shots.

Late August and September are
the usual season for polio epe-
demics, the Department warned.

GOOD PASTURE—Texas range
conditions showed a bigger mid-
summer improvement this year
than in any summer for 37 years,
reports the U. S. Dept. of Agri-
culture.

Range conditions usually grow
less favorable from July to August
in Texas, but this year they got
substantially better.

Though some areas of the state
were reported very dry, 85 percent
was rated 12 points above the 10-
year average.

BIRTH CERTIFICATES—Those
children who will enter school for
the first time this fall are urged
to get the children's birth certifi-
cates immediately. State Health
Department noted that requests
pile up at school opening time and
can delay the child's entrance in-
to school. Texas' general reven-
ue fund went \$6,000,000 deeper in
the red last month. This brought
the fund's deficit up to \$59,061,860.

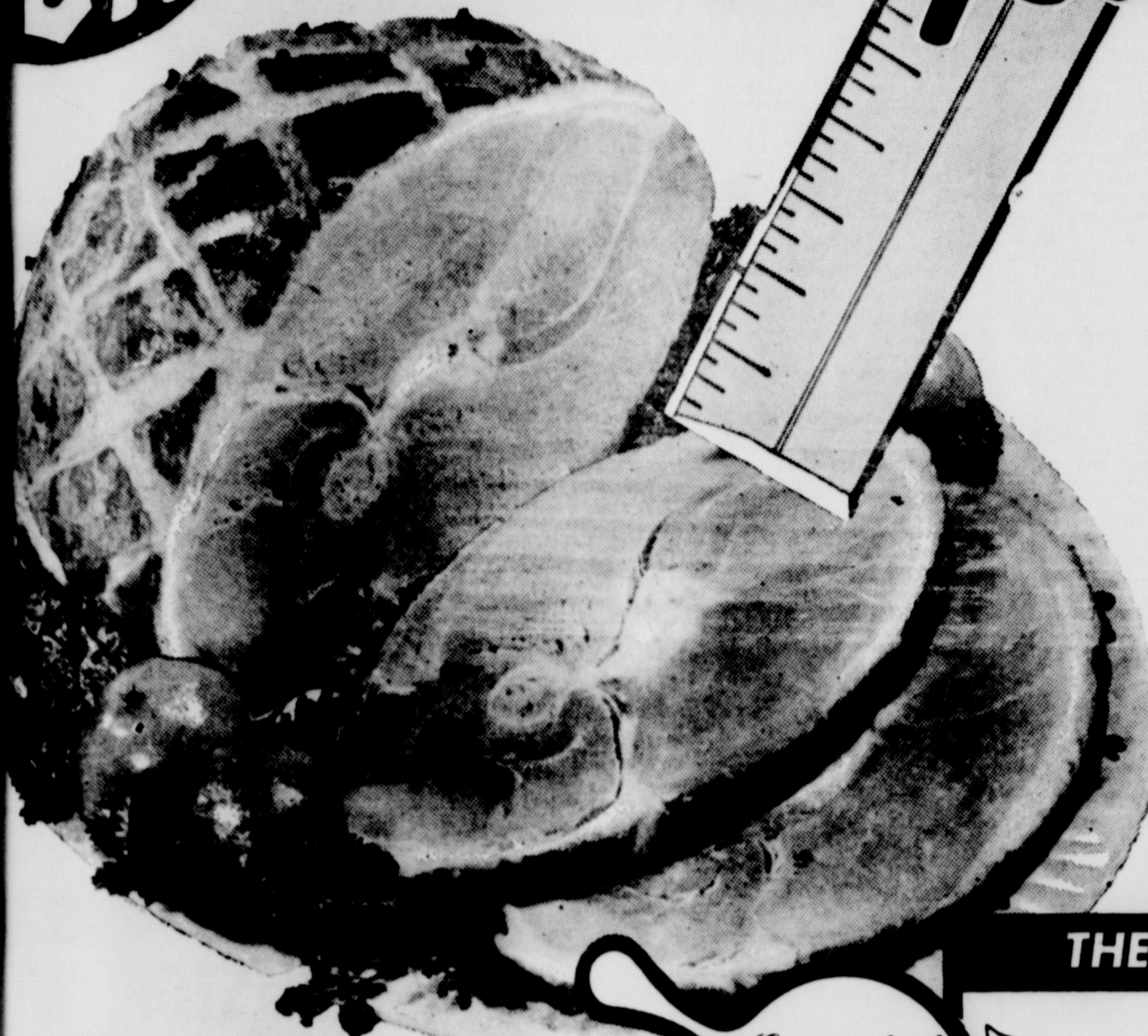

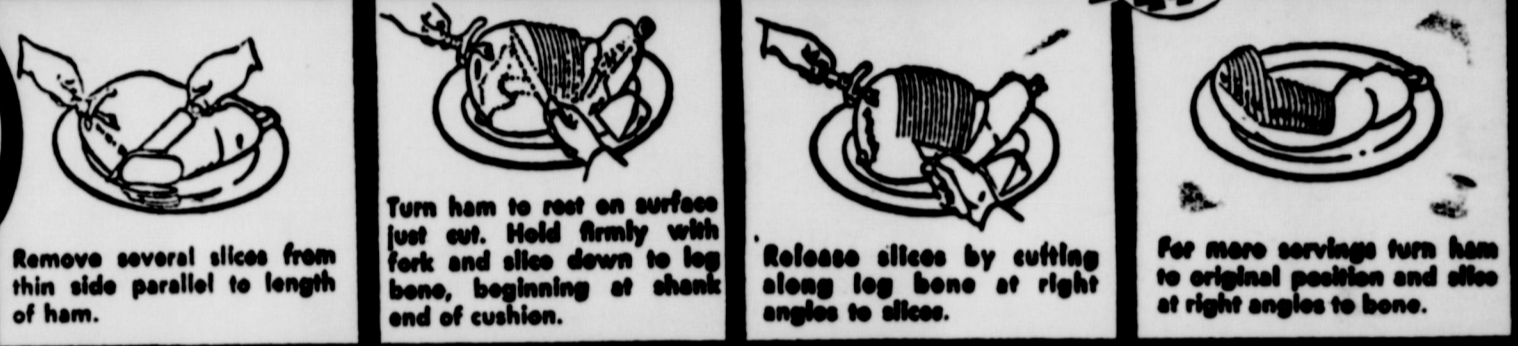

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1960.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 4 proposing an Amendment to Section 11, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, so as to give the Legislature authority to classify loans and lenders, license and regulate lenders, define interest, fix maximum rates of interest, and provide for a maximum rate of interest of ten per centum (10%) per annum in the absence of legislation setting maximum rates of interest; providing that the rate of interest shall not exceed six per cent (6%) per annum in contracts where no interest rate is agreed upon; providing for the right of appeal and trial de novo in the event any regulatory agency cancels or refuses to grant any permit; providing for the necessary election and the form of the ballots, and providing for the necessary proclamation and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 11, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 11. The Legislature shall have authority to classify loans and lenders, license and regulate lenders, define interest and fix maximum rates of interest; provided, however, in the absence of legislation fixing maximum rates of interest all contracts for a greater rate of interest than ten per centum (10%) per annum shall be deemed usurious; provided, further, that in contracts where no rate of interest is agreed upon, the maximum rate shall not exceed six per centum (6%) per annum. Should any contract be entered into under the provisions of this section, and the lender or holder shall have any claim against the borrower, then such claim shall be subject to the jurisdiction of the county court."

Section 2. The foregoing Amendment shall be submitted to the voters of the State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1960, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment giving the Legislature authority to classify loans and lenders, license and regulate lenders, define interest and fix maximum rates of interest, and providing for a maximum rate of ten per centum (10%) per annum in the absence of legislation fixing maximum rates of interest."

Section 3. The Governor shall issue his proclamation for the election and have the same printed on the ballots of this State.

How are you all this evening? Okay we hope and not worrying too much about us because we are fine and don't want you to worry.

Well, today is our first Sunday in England and it sure is pretty and warm. It rains a little every day but not enough to get muddy. We have just finished eating dinner. We have plenty to eat and it's pretty good, but there's no food to waste. We can't leave any food on our plates to throw away because there are men standing there watching you—and it's eat or be court-martialed. You soon learn not to take more than you can eat. People think rationing is bad in

the states, but they should hear what these poor people over here get. They get one egg per person per week, 1/4 lb. meat a day, 2 oz. butter and like that all the way down the food list, but you don't hear them gripe.

Well we are having church service at three o'clock, so guess I'll close and get ready to go as I can not think of much to write. I know you like to hear from us if it's only to say hello and good-by. Lots of love, Coy and Roy.
