TO BE LET ALONE

"A common fallacy about man's duty to man was repeated recently by a prominent layman at a religious conference," says The Saturday Evening Post editorial. "As an expression of our social responsibilities he suggested, 'We are our brothers' keepers'."

This point of view, the Post went on, is due to a serious misinterpretation of the Scriptural passage in question. It said: "If all the world's people were our brothers and we were our brothers' keepers they would also be our keepers. We would be among the kept. In the slave societies of totalitarianism, from the Baltic Sea to the sad coasts of Siberia and China, everybody is required to be his brother's keeper—to maintain a sharp watch on him and to blow the whistle the minute he deviates from total obedience.

"Well-meaning people who tell us that our duty is to be our brothers' keepers . . . have failed to draw clear distinctions between proper help and perpetual meddling. We have a duty to help the sick, the incapacitated, the very weak. But what our neighbors in general need is a large amount of being let alone.

The fact is that human history has largely consisted of the endless struggle of people's seeking "a large amount of being let alone." And that often-violent struggle has generally been directed at systems of government which treat the individual as a number whose duty is to do what he is told and not ask questions. The most basic of all freedoms is the privilege of being let alone.

RECORD NUMBER ATTENDS PTA WORKSHOP IN WHEELER TUESDAY

The Caravan for the Blind is the only means the blind workers in Texas have for marketing their products so the Kiwanis wants people to visit this traveling market and buy all that they possibly can.

Proceeds of the sale going to the Kiwanis Club and Key Club will go into their Health and Welfare fund. This money is used to purchase glasses, pay for dental work and other necessities for underprivileged children in this area.

Wiley McCray Voted World's Greatest Clown

Wiley McCray, born and reared and educated right here in Wheeler County has for the second time in his career been selected as the "World's Greatest Rodeo Clown". He first received

the honor in 1950 and it's probably safe to say that only a few of his close friends knew of the honor. However, when he was presented with the silver belt buckle, inscribed, "Wiley McCray, the

World's Greatest Rodeo Clown," several months ago in Omaha, Nebraska, the information finally made its way back to his home county.

Wiley is a very modest man, especially when you consider that he has made as much as \$400.00 for a few hours work; \$2375.00 in one big Chicago show; And as much as \$22,000.00 in one season.

Wiley started his career at the age of sixteen at the Anvil Park Rodeo in Canadian, Tex. It was during one of these performances that the well known clown, Charley Shultz, asked Wiley why he did not make rodeoing his profession. So Wiley went to the next rodeo with Charley at Waco, Tex., and secured a job fighting bulls in the barrel and trick-riding. While working this show, another producer saw Wiley in action, and liking his work, hired Wiley to Clown some rodeos for him, thus starting on his way as a clown, trick rider, bull fighter and bareback rider. Wiley was assisted in this business by his wife, Mardell until their son Fred was born. She also trick rode and worked a trained horse.

Wiley has had several narrow escapes while in his business, one of which was at the rodeo at Ogden, when a Brahma Bull got him down breaking some ribs and caved in some of his chest bones. He has broken his leg twice, but outside of this he has been very lucky.

Clowns almost universally are regarded as happy-go-lucky personalities with a few cares or responsibilities.

But the rodeo clowns are different. These "May Wests" of the dusty arena have a deadly serious side to their business.

They are the bravest men in the sport and their job easily is the most dangerous. You may watch them with amusement. But when the casual observers clear out of the arena for the bull riding event, you'll begin to appreciate the importance of the rodeo clown.

Bulls, unlike other animals in rodeo, hold a permanent grudge against humans. After they have thrown their rider, many will try to gore him. Pickup men used to help the rider down in bronc riding, are of little value in bull riding. The bulls won't let the horses get close enough.

It's up to the clowns to move in on foot and distract the bull to give the rider a chance to dismount and reach safety. If a contestant is thrown and injured, they must get the bull off of him and keep it busy until the cowboy is rescued.

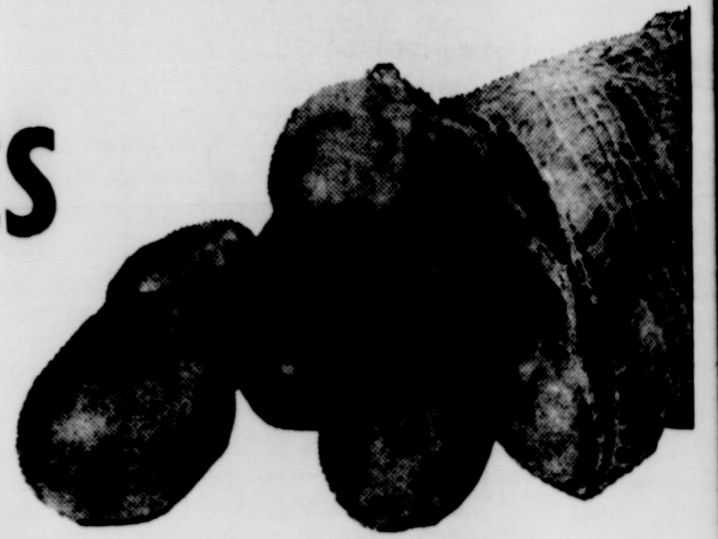

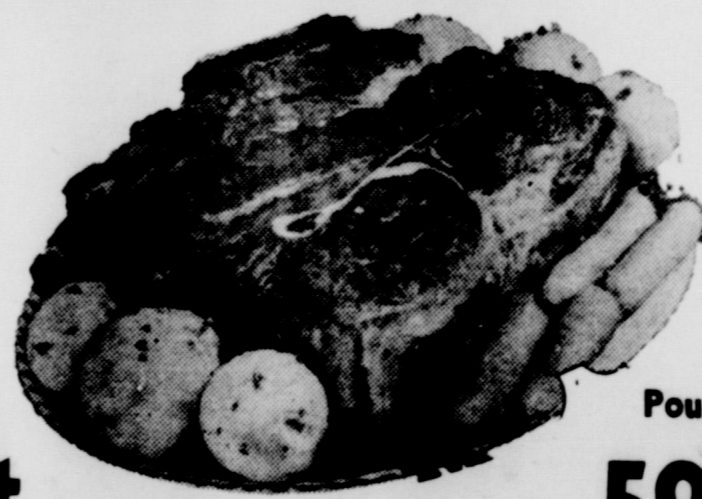

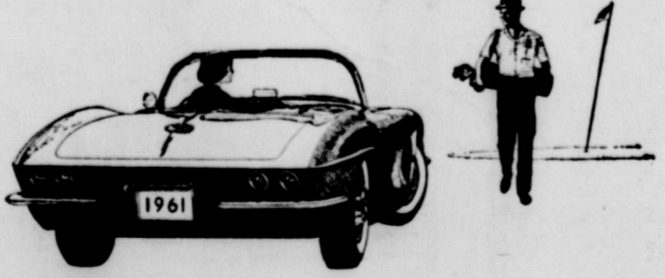
