LOCAL AGENCY BROADENS ITS LOAN PROGRAM

Farmers who have regular off-farm employment, if otherwise eligible, may obtain farm operating and development loans from the Farmers Home Administration, under the recently revised regulations of the agency.

John L. Manning, Farmers Home Administration County supervisor from Wheeler, Hemphill, and Roberts Counties, said the new regulation will go into effect October 1. Previously, except in rural development counties, a farmer had to spend most of his time farming in order to qualify for a loan.

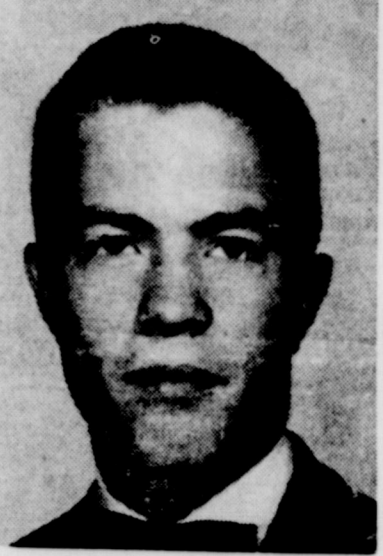
Experience gained in rural development counties has shown that many farmers who are regularly employed off the farm can profitably use the Farmers Home Administration's credit facilities to increase the farm portions of their total incomes. The regulation, which had limited credit assistance to farmers who spend most of their time farming, prevented some from obtaining the maximum income from their farms and from taking advantage of opportunities for industrial and other off-farm employment.

Other eligibility requirements remain unchanged. Applicants must have sufficient farm experience to carry on sound farm operations, must need credit, and be unable to obtain financial assistance from other sources. In the past, credit will be extended only to operators of farms that are family-type size or smaller. No loan will be made unless a plan for the coming year's farming operations shows that income from the farm and other sources will be large enough to enable the farm family to have a reasonable standard of living, pay debts, and have an adequate reserve for emergencies.

Loan funds may be used to pay farm operating costs, purchase equipment and livestock, pay farm development costs, and refund debts. The interest rate is five per cent. Repayment schedules depend upon the purposes for which funds are advanced and upon the estimated incomes from the farms. Usually, loans made for real estate purposes will be from funds advanced by private lenders and insured by the agency.

Technical farm and money management assistance is supplied to each borrower to the extent necessary.

The Farmers Home Administration office serving Wheeler, Hemphill and Roberts Counties is located at Wheeler, Texas. The agency also supplies credit for farm housing and soil and water conservation.

Dear Sir:

Just recently I received information that Dr. H. E. Nicholson, Jr. of Wheeler had expired from heart disease a few weeks previously.

During 1933 after a prolonged period in surgical training I located a few years in Amarillo, Texas. During this time, I became acquainted with Dr. H. E. Nicholson, Sr. and Mrs. Nicholson, and it was my good fortune to have known these good people throughout the years. I also knew Harold Jr. from the time that he was a young man up until and through his college and hospital training.

Frequently it is necessary to evaluate some of our fellow citizens' lives. During the period of

time from 1933 until the present I can frankly state that it was the desire of Dr. Nicholson, Sr. and Mrs. Nicholson to bring excellent medical care to the people of Wheeler County and the surrounding area. During 1934, Dr. Nicholson visited me in Amarillo, Texas and we had a long discussion about the feasibility of establishing a hospital at Wheeler. At that time he was offered a very comfortable place in Shamrock and Pampa, also in Amarillo, Pampa, Texas, also in Amarillo, and it would not have been necessary to expend his finances to establish a hospital. It did not take Dr. Nicholson very long to turn down each of these nice offers because it was his sole desire to establish a hospital for the adequate care of people that were in need of such services and the community

in which he stated was his home and he would bring good medicine to that area. During the next four or five years it was my privilege to operate on many occasions with Dr. Nicholson in the Wheeler Hospital where I found the service excellent and it was a privilege to work with such a fine gentleman and good and kind doctor.

Frequently Dr. Nicholson consulted me relative to various special-

STEVEN DOHANOS IS CHRISTMAS SEAL CHAIRMAN

Chairman Mr. DeYoung said: "The Board of the National Tuberculosis Association had ample reason for asking Steven Dohanos to spearhead this year's Christmas Seal Campaign. No one knows better than he what effect TB has on one's life. He has had it twice himself. He was stricken with it first in 1932, then suffered a relapse in 1941. A brother Bert, and a sister, Irene, died of it. His wife's brother, Valentine, also lost his life to it. Still another of Mrs. Dohanos' brothers, Andrew, was stricken but happily recovered.

"TB brought tragedy to his life. But it also brought inspiration to fight disease with the strongest weapon at his command, his art. For many years, he has given his time and talents to support the work of TB association and other voluntary health agencies and charities. He has done this without fanfare. As far as I know, this is the first time he has received any national recognition for his ef-

forts. We are proud to be the organization to give it to him."

As National Honorary Chairman, Mr. Dohanos will appear on TV and radio, relate his personal experience with TB through newspaper and magazine stories, and work closely with state and local chairmen.

Steven Dohanos was born at Lorain, Ohio, May 18th, 1907, the son of Hungarian immigrants. He attended art schools in Ohio before going to New York where he joined the Charles E. Cooper Art Studios as an artist-illustrator. In 1942, he entered the free lance 125 covers for Saturday Evening Post and his work has appeared in many other national publications as article and advertising illustrations.

He is a member of the Founding Faculty of Famous Artists Schols of Westport, Conn., and art director of Medical Times magazine.

PHILOSOPHER WANTS WORLD TO KEEP PRODUCTION COSTS UP ON BOMBS, SAME AS TRACTORS

Editor's Note. The Sweetwater Philosopher on his Shinnery grass farm on Sweetwater creek seems to be worried about deflation in the bomb market. His letter this week indicates.

Dear editor:

When I turn on a hydrant and see running water, I sometimes think science is man's greatest benefactor, but when I pick up a newspaper, I sometimes think it's his worst enemy.

For example, I read in a newspaper last night that science has now discovered a cheap way to produce a nuclear bomb.

Before I go further, I don't know whether you're in the habit of shifting gears in your mind when you get on the international level or not, but it's necessary to follow a discussion of this type, and I will appreciate it if you'll see and do it. That is, take the word "cheap."

If you're in low, or ordinary gear, cheap means cheap. Like low-priced automobiles. When they became high-priced, they were marked up to \$50 and then marked down to \$39.50 but in international, or high-gear thinking, cheap means something else.

The first atomic bomb cost \$2 billion better than a billion dollars, but this new method costs for around 50 million dollars. It's not trying to be funny, that is, comparatively cheap.

At any rate, if a nuclear bomb can be made for 50 million dollars, the experts figure at least 20 other nations besides the three or four that now have it can soon have the bomb too.

This is the reason I say scientists seem to have as their goal

working themselves out of a job, because I can name some of those 20 nations it's going to be highly unhealthy to let have the bomb.

You take Cuba. If all that's standing between Castro and a hydrogen bomb is 50 million dollars, he can make that much just by getting on television one afternoon and talking over a few more American businessmen, over there. In fact, I guess you'd say Castro is the highest paid television performer in the history of the industry. I understand some American television stars make a million dollars for 52 hours a year, but Castro can make 52 times that much the first 30 minutes he's on the air. Ask any American who's lost a refinery over there. And he sometimes makes for four or five hours.

Now I don't trust Castro with a hydrogen bomb and a bag of chicken feathers, not to mention Castro with three or four hydrogen bombs and three or four planes and enough gasoline to fly to you know where.

If scientists were smart, they'd make hydrogen bombs more and more expensive to make. Like tractors. What's got in to em, anyway?

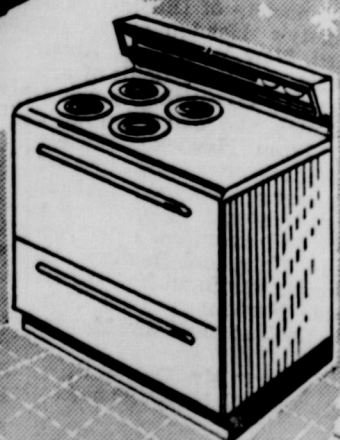

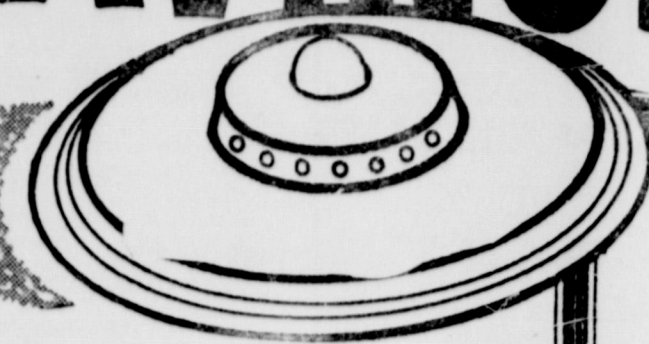

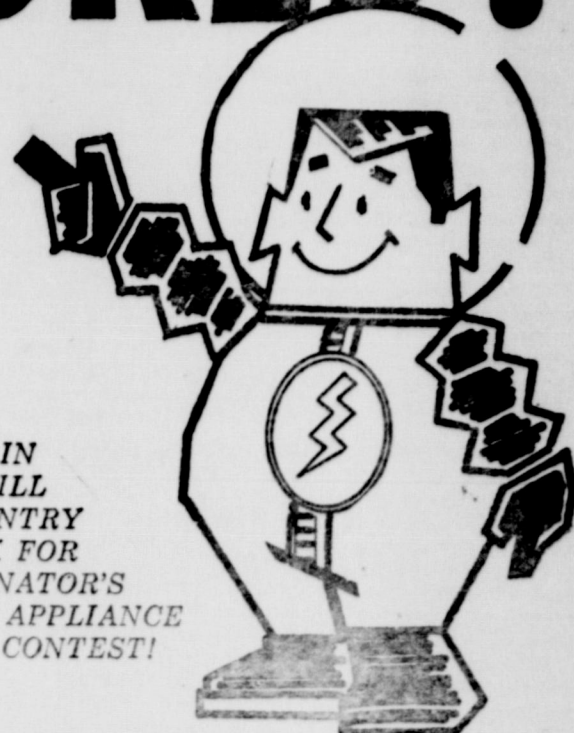

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WHEELER COUNTY SOIL CONSERVATION NEWS

Work on the Flood Prevention project on Gageby Creek is progressing about on schedule. Most of the construction has been completed on three of the dams and five others have been started. All eight of the dams in the Wheeler District should be operating by the time the next flood season arrives. Two tours were held recently to observe progress and study project. The Work Unit Conservationists from nine surrounding Districts looked over the project on Sept. 27 and the Vocational Agriculture boys from Mobeetie held a study session on the project on Sept. 23.

In addition to the Flood Prevention structures, the tours covered supporting practices on farms and ranches above the dams. These consist of good conservation measures that pay their own way with or without the dams.

Soil Conservation on the drainage above dams can prolong life of the structures almost indefinitely. Sediment storage is provided in the design for 50 years. This sediment storage area is to hold soil that belongs on the fields and pastures above the structures. Every pound that is stopped is a double benefit.

Hunting season is one of the best times of the year in the Wheeler District. This district is rapidly becoming a leading area in the production of dove, quail, turkey and deer. The amount of game produced is a good measuring stick of the amount of soil conservation that has been done.

Good management of pastures, fields and odd areas provides food and cover necessary for all game. Game birds and animals also need some area where they receive complete protection. Farms and Ranches that allow no hunting are adding to the over all hunting in the District. These areas become fully stocked and the surplus migrates to areas where hunting is allowed.

They provide the seed stock to replace or restock the remainder of the land after adverse conditions have depleted the hunting grounds.

In addition to safety rules with a gun, hunters should keep in mind other rules of courtesy to the land owner. No sportsman would ever cause an accidental fire, leave a gate open that he found closed, or hunt without permission.

The conservation of soil is the primary objective of the Soil Conservation Service, the District and other related agencies. This objective cannot be met without also conserving water, plant cover and wildlife.

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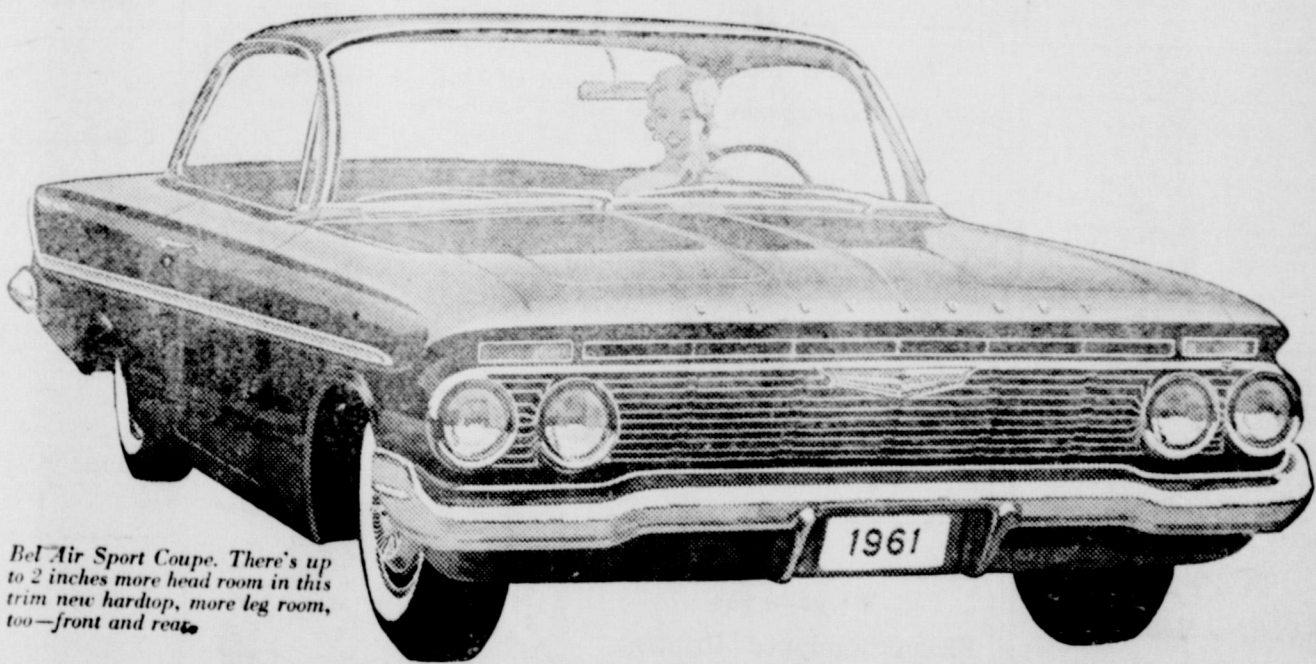
