Times Is Blasted For Printing Oath

And frankly I have very little defense for my action. To those that are interested I offer this explanation. The "oath" printed in the last issue of the Times was secured from our local librarian. Not being familiar with the Knights of Columbus, I called Jim Chandonnet, pastor of the Assembly of God Church in Wheeler, and a former Catholic Monk. Chandonnet studied for over 7 years in the Roman Catholic Benedictine Monastery just outside Boston, Mass.

Chandonnet read the oath and claimed that it was the same oath he was asked to take shortly after leaving the Monastery. With that information I printed the oath. Even though Chandonnet still maintains the authenticity of the "oath", we are inclined to disagree with him.

Since the publication of the article last week I have read numerous catholic magazines, I have talked with a priest, I have visited with dozens of catholics and I have questioned several members of the Knights of Columbus, and I have reached the decision that the oath is false, it's malicious, and it's untrue in every manner.

Voting Places Same As In The Primary

Wheeler County voters will go to the polls Tuesday, November 8 and select the men that will run our nation, state and county.

Nixon and Kennedy supporters are both predicting victory in Wheeler County.

Predictions are being made that Wheeler County voters may duplicate their feat of 1952 by casting a record-breaking number of ballots in the General Election.

Polls will open at 8 A.M. and close at 7 P.M. at 15 county voting places. Balloting will be the same as in the primary.

In Wheeler, voting in the Stanley box will be at the courthouse and in the Wheeler box at the school gymnasium. There will be a judge at each voting box to see that only qualified electors are permitted to vote. The judges will have complete instructions on procedure of voting and any elector who has doubt about how to cast a ballot is advised to ask the judge.

The general election ballot contains six columns. Democrats, Republicans, Constitution, Prohibition, Independent and Write-In. Only the Democratic party lists candidates for district, county and precinct offices.

So much attention has been focused on the presidential candidates that many voters have lost sight of the fact that there are four proposed State constitutional amendments to be voted on next Tuesday.

The Christian Century Explains It's View On K of C Oath

Editor's Note: The following article is reprinted from the Christian Century, an anti-Communist Weekly, published in Chicago.

The malicious falsehood which continues to haunt and harass Roman Catholics is the bogus oath supposedly signed by all members of the Knights of Columbus. According to this entirely spurious oath members of the Knights of Columbus are pledged to "wage relentless war, secretly and openly, against all heretics, Protestants and Masons and to extirpate them from the face of the earth."

This fictitious oath continues in words which are fetid to be repeated even in their denunciation. It is difficult to believe that Christian people will accept as true such false and scurrilous defamations of their neighbors and that they will do so without thinking, without investigating the truth or the error of such calumnious accusations. To suspect that an enemy could be so villainous is bad enough; to impute such an evil spirit to a fellow citizen is incredible.

The bogus oath which Knights of Columbus are alleged to have signed was first conjured up in 1912 when Eugene C. Bonniwell, a Roman Catholic, ran against Congressman Thomas S. Butler in the Seventh District of Pennsylvania. Congressman Butler repudiated the defamations of his opponent and the group which had distributed the bogus oath. This 1912 treatment of the religious issue went beyond good judgement, fairness and the facts and did harm not only to Bonniwell and to Butler but also to the country.

During the coming months a Roman Catholic will be campaigning for the presidency. As he himself well knows, the religious issue cannot be avoided. If that issue can be dealt with in good judgement, in fairness and with due regard for all the facts, the discussion need not do harm to him, to his church or to the country. But the danger is that the time will be ripe for malicious men to cater to the incite the suspicions and the superstitions of the people. Men of good will, firm in their own opinions and fair to their opponents, must seriously and diligently prevent the deterioration of the inevitable religious brawl.

Copies of the spurious oath which is inaccurately and unjustly attributed to the Knights of Columbus appeared in the West Virginia primary of last May. Senator Humphrey is far above that kind of bush-fighting and did not countenance such vilification of his opponent. The bogus oath appeared nevertheless. It is reported that the spurious oath is now being distributed in other parts of the country, in an apparent effort to discredit the presidential candidacy of Senator John F. Kennedy. Whatever may be the other considerations, including religious affiliations, a presidential election should not be decided on the basis of false witness. The bogus oath (Continued on Page 8, No. 1)

K OF C SUES FOR \$100,000

RALEIGH, N.C., Oct. 27 (AP) — The Knights of Columbus today filed a \$100,000 damage suit against two North Carolina residents, charging they circulated false and libelous material about the Knights.

The complaint cited a pamphlet entitled "Will America Vote Away Her Freedom?"

The suit filed in federal district court, said the pamphlet contained an oath that was falsely and slanderously attributed to the Knights a Roman Catholic fraternity society.

(A bogus oath attributed to the Knights has cropped up several times in the current presidential campaign, and in some cases the Knights have induced those circulating it to make formal retractions.)

The suit here names Mrs. Ruby J. Timby of Eureka, N.C., and Donald R. Bryan, of Farmville, N.C. It claims Mrs. Timby gave copies of the pamphlet containing the "oath" to Bryan for distribution.

The complaint also stated that the oath was included in a paid advertisement which it said Mrs. Timby placed in a newspaper. It said the editor of the newspaper later repudiated statements in the advertisement and condemned publication of the oath.

Judge Albert L. Reeves of Missouri, who is sitting here, signed a temporary order restraining the defendants from publishing any material or making any oral utterances which would hold out as being true the "false and bogus oath."

The Judge ordered a hearing for Nov. 7. The Knights ask for a permanent injunction as well as damages.

CATHOLIC ORGANIZATION EXPLAINS SO-CALLED BOGUS K OF C OATH

Many leading publications have branded the bogus "oath" as a completely false document, including Times magazine, the Baptist Standard, etc.

According to Cloninger, those circulating the "oath" have tried to lend authenticity to the material by pointing out the "oath is recorded in the Congressional Record."

"What has not been explained is that the "oath" was read into the Congressional Record for the express purpose of branding it as the bogus document," said Cloninger. Following an investigation of the false "oath", the Congressional Committee on Elections reported:

"The committee can not condemn too strongly the publication of the false and libelous article (the bogus oath)."

In the past, according to Cloninger, a complete set of the works,

The trude pledge made by the Knights of Columbus reads:

"I swear to support the constitution of the United States. I pledge myself, as a Catholic citizen and a knight of Columbus, fully to enlighten myself upon my duties as a citizen and conscientiously perform them entirely in the interest of my country, regardless of all personal consequences. I pledge myself to do all in my power to preserve the integrity and purity of the ballot and to promote respect for law and order. I promise to practice my religion consistently and faithfully, and to conduct myself in public affairs and in the exercise of public virtue as to reflect nothing but credit upon our Holy Church, to the end that she may flourish and our country prosper to the greater honor and glory of God."

"Heretofore a husband or wife has been permitted to make application for a ballot for each of them. This is not acceptable under the present law. Each voter must make application for his own ballot, which application must be notarized.

"Absentee balloting begins October 19 and closes November 4. Please make your plans accordingly.

AMENDMENT No. 4
The State's three top elective officials, Governor Price Daniel, Lieutenant Governor Ben Ramsey and Attorney General Will Wilson, this week urged a vote for Constitutional Amendment No. 4 on the November 8th ballot.

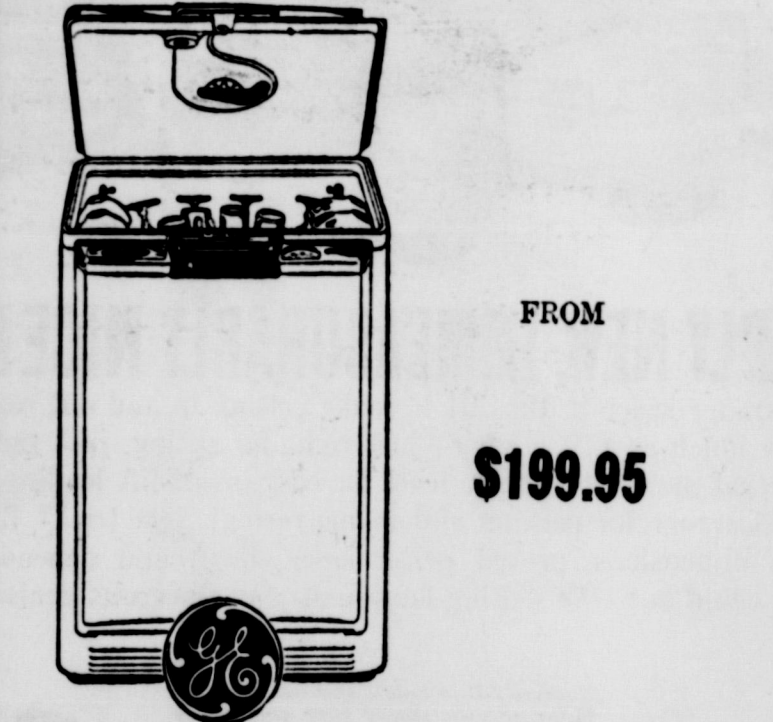

Second Bowers Well Is Down To 13,153 ft.

W. D. Lang, foreman of the drilling crew on the Bowers F. I. well located on the Bowers ranch in the edge of Hemphill County, told the Times Wednesday morning that his crew had reached 13,153 ft. They expect to reach pay at about 13,600. It will take them another 10 to 12 days to reach that depth. The contract calls for a 16,000 ft. well.

In questioning Lang about the first well at Bowers he said, "We have Killed It". Drill pipe has been cemented in the hole and because of the tremendous pressure we have decided to wait before tying it in." Lang estimated that the well will produce something like one hundred and fifty million cubic feet of gas per day when it is put into production. This according to Lang is very good, he says that a well producing only thirty million cubic feet per day is considered a good well.

In the event the second well on Bowers, which is located one mile south and one mile east of the first well, is as good as the first, Wheeler County may be in for a lot of oil and gas activity. In fact, it is very likely that several more drilling rigs will be moved into this area.

Lang, along with 18 members of his crew, make their home here in Wheeler.

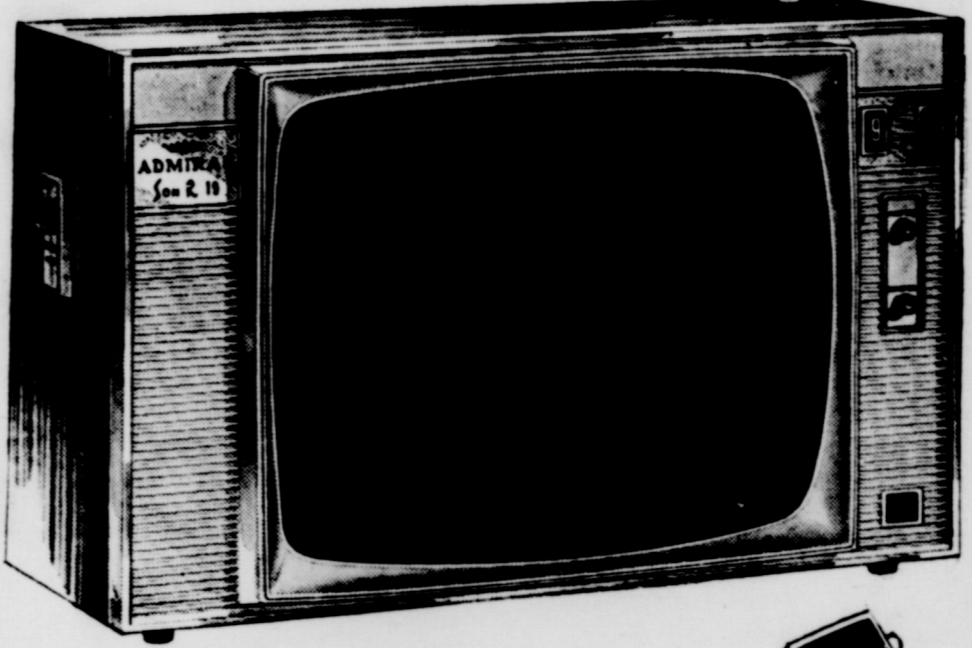

deserves nationally the treatment the West Virginians gave it.

Senator Ralph Yarborough (D., Texas) a Baptist, distributed by his circulation of the false oath in his state, has placed in the Congressional Record a denunciatory explanation of the bogus oath. "Such nation of the bogus oath," he says, "has no place in the honest elections." For the record, the actual oath taken by fourth degree Knights of Columbus, is as follows: "I swear to support the Constitution of the United States. I pledge myself, as a Catholic citizen and a Knight of Columbus, fully to enlighten myself upon my duties as a citizen and conscientiously perform them entirely in the interests of my country, regardless of all personal consequences. I pledge myself to do all in my power to preserve the integrity and purity of the ballot and to promote respect for law and order. I promise to practice my religion consistently and faithfully and to so conduct myself in public affairs and in the exercise of public virtue as to reflect nothing but credit upon our Holy Church, to the end that she may flourish and our country prosper to the greater honor and glory of God." Such an oath should not frighten Protestants but should challenge them and call them to renewed and redoubled devotion to their churches.

Jews, Protestants and Roman Catholics have many areas of disagreement. Those differences should not be minimized or brushed over. But they also have many areas of mutuality, one of which is their common vulnerability to that maliciousness which plays upon the suspicions and superstitions of the people. Against that evil they should, in this day particularly make common cause.

In outlining background of the important amendment, Governor Daniel said, "The Legislative Council, after numerous public hearings and exhaustive study recommended to the 56th Legislature a resolution submitting to the vote of the people Constitutional Amendment No. 4 vesting in the Legislature the right to regulate small loans in Texas. It was adopted by an overwhelming vote."

Lieutenant Governor Ramsey urged passage of Amendment No. 4 "because loan sharks are a blot on the fair name of Texas." He pointed out, "We are called the Loan Shark State because of the lack of adequate small loan laws which allows loan sharks to roam free."

Lieutenant Governor Ramsey said that adoption of Constitutional Amendment No. 4 will make it possible for the Legislature to pass laws to "oust loan sharks from Texas."

Attorney General Wilson noted that "loan sharks are exploiting our working people and hurting the entire state." He warned that effective law enforcement against shady operations of loan sharks will only be possible if Amendment No. 4 is adopted by the people on the November 8th ballot.

"I hope every Texan will vote for No. 4," Wilson said.

informed as to his legal voting rights.

As you know, the Texas Election Code has been amended to require the stamping of the word "Democrat" or "Republican" on poll tax receipts or exemption certificates when one votes in a primary. This has nothing whatever to do with General Election voting, but some confusion has resulted.

Governor Daniel stated the facts succinctly when in a newspaper interview appearing October 21, 1960, he said that there is no "legal or moral" bar to an individual's voting according to his own conscience in the General Election, no matter how or whether he voted in the primaries.

The governor further stated correctly that the "pledge" on the Democratic ballot, expressing the voter's intention to support the nominees of the primary, has no application or bearing upon the General Election.

Many Texas newspapers have already taken steps to advise their readers that (1) they can vote as they choose in the General Election, regardless of what they have done in the past, and (2) it is illegal to split the ballot in Texas. These are fundamental rights of which voters should be informed.

County Dams Are In Various Stages Of Completion

Bids will be opened on November 28 for the contract to construct the Food Prevention structure at Site 20. This is the dam on P. A. Martin and Doyle Standlee. It is the last of the eight structures in Wheeler County. The other seven are in various stages of construction.

Three of the dams are ready for fencing. Fencing should begin this week if weather permits. As soon as fencing is complete, the dams will be turned over to the Soil Conservation for grassing.

The first step in grassing will begin as soon as possible after fencing is completed. Hay has been purchased to mulch the dam and spillways. The hay mulch will protect the new earthwork until grass can be established. Grass seeding will be turned over to the soil structures should be completed by next July 1.

Announcement was made this week by Dennis Wilks, agriculture instructor in Wheeler High School that the local FFA boys will be taking listings this week from individual cattlemen for the January 1st publication of "The Golden Spread Cattleman."

The taking of listings is part of a region-wide contest that will not only award the local chapters, but will furnish one show calf to the boy taking the most listings.

The "Cattleman" publication will be the first directory ever circulated as a buyers guide for this area. It will carry the 1961 available cattle of the ranchers, and will be circulated to buyers, feeders and other cattlemen throughout the southwest and midwest. The volume is designed to expedite the cattle market through offering the first means by which cattle may be found and located in a single medium.

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HOW THE DEMOCRATIC PARTY DIED

"It began one evening in Detroit, early in 1947, when the President of the State CIO Council met secretly with some discontented Democrats. According to the Calkins study, the decision was made there, at that meeting, to seize control of the Democratic party of Michigan.

"In 1948, the CIO-PAC moved in on the grassroots level of the Democratic party. According to the PAC expert, the move was made with the personal approval of Walter Reuther.

"The year 1948 was enormously successful for the CIO politicians in Michigan. They elected a Governor. But, they did not let him get the foolish idea that he might be in control of the party.

"In the spring convention of the Democrats in 1949, the New York Times reporter says it was Gus Scholle, director of the state CIO, rather than the Governor, who was the real head of the State Democratic Convention.

Goon Squads Take Over

"In 1950, I understand the traditional Democrats made a last vain attempt to take back their party from the CIO politicians of Michigan. The Calkins investigation shows how this last attempt was smashed by equipping each of the Wayne County District conventions with small squads of men ready to use force to prevent the regular Democrats from regaining power. The leader of the armed squad which took over the Democratic Convention in the 15th district told Calkins he was equipped with 6 men, 25 clubs and 2 pistols.

"As the terrorists completed their final outrages on the dying remnants of the old party, Gerald Fitzgerald, Democrat National committeeman said, and I quote his comment to the newspapers: 'I have just watched Socialism take over the Democratic party by Communist processes.'

"Mrs. Nellie Reilly, former Democrat National Convention delegate warned, and I again quote: 'Socialists are in complete charge of the Democratic party machinery.'

"The Democratic National committeeman subsequently refused to attend the State Convention of his own party, saying he refused to attend a convention, the delegates of which had been picked, and I quote his statement to the newspapers: 'With storm troopers guarding the doors and the Chairman presiding with a baseball bat.'

"There is a final item needed to complete the full picture of the extent of control of the Michigan Democratic Party by the CIO politicians.

"Who finances the party?

"By 1950, the treasuries of the CIO unions were supplying about two-thirds of all the campaign costs of the statewide Democrat politicians, including Governor Williams, according to the Calkins-University of Chicago investigation.

"By 1950, the CIO politicians had completed their conquest of the Democratic party of Michigan.

"The goon squads took over, and the gavel, that traditional symbol of orderly parliamentary procedure, was discarded for the sawed-off baseball bat.

"In all but one district — the 16th — there was mass rioting as the strong arm squads took over.

"Delegates representing the old line Democratic elements were beaten and thrown bodily out of the halls by the shock-troop goon squads!"

To this, Gerald Fitzgerald, Democratic national committeeman, adds this solemn epilogue:

"After this, the theme song of the Nation, instead of GOD BLESS AMERICA should be GOD SAVE AMERICA."

Where is the Democratic party of old? It is gone. Infiltrated by left-wingers of every shade and color except for the southern wing it has been made over with startling speed into nothing but a Socialist-Labor party.
