9 AMENDMENTS TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 4

Nine proposed amendments to the state constitution will confront Texas voters when they go to the polls to cast their ballots in the general election on Tuesday, November 4.

The amendments in their entirety, have appeared in the two Wheeler County newspapers, and persons who failed to acquaint themselves with the proposals are invited to check the files of The Wheeler Times and The Shamrock Texan before they go to the polls.

A summary of the nine amendments, in the order they will appear on the ballot follows:

1. Provides for annual Sessions of the Legislature, changing the compensation, per diem and travel expense of the Members of the Legislature authorizing temporary residence of the Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House in the Capitol (H.J.R. No. 1).

2. Authorizes each county to establish, after approval by its voters, a retirement, disability and death compensation fund covering the elective officers of the county or precinct, as well as the appointive officers and employees of the county or precinct. (S.J.R. No. 6).

3. Provides that vacancies in the office of County Judge and Justices of the Peace shall be filled by the Commissioners Court only until the next General Election. (H.J.R. No. 30).

4. Provides that any District, County, or Precinct official serving a four-year term must resign before announcing for a different office if there remains unexpired more than one (1) year of the term for which he was elected. (H.J.R. No. 31).

5. Provides that a Home Rule City may provide by Charter Provision and a City operating under the general laws may provide by majority vote, for a longer term of office than two (2) years for its officers, either elective or appointive, or both not to exceed four years. (H.J.R. No. 48).

6. Provides for pension to retired Texas Rangers who are ineligible to participate in the Employees Retirement System of Texas, and their widows. (H.J.R. No. 17).

7. Authorizes the Legislature to make appropriations and establish procedure for advertising the historical, natural, agricultural, industrial, educational, recreational and other resources of Texas. (S.J.R. No. 4).

8. Gives the Legislature the power to authorize vendor payments for medical care in addition to the amount paid in the form of direct public assistance to and on behalf of needy recipients of Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Blind, Aid to Dependent Children or Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled; providing for the acceptance of funds from the Federal Government for the purpose of paying such assistance. (H.J.R. No. 36).

9. Authorizes the Legislature to create a Hospital District coextensive with the incorporated limits to the City of Amarillo, Texas and a county wide Hospital District in Wichita County, Texas and Hospital Districts in Jefferson County, Texas. (S.J.R. No. 3).

903 Bales Of Cotton Handed By Paymaster Gin Of Wheeler

The Paymaster Gin of Wheeler had handled 903 bales of this season's cotton up to noon Wednesday, according to Fat Jones, Manager of the Gin.

Jones said the season was just getting underway and with favorable weather conditions it should hit a fast pace by this week end.

The grade and staple are good, very few light spots have been reported and most of them are strict middling light spot. Jones said the staple was very good running from middling 1-inch to middling 1 1/16-inch. Most of the cotton is going into the loan at 33c to 35c per pound.

Many more pullers are needed in the area. Persons seeking jobs in the cotton fields are asked to report to Fat Jones at the Paymaster Gin.

The Texas Employment Commission estimates that Wheeler County needs 300 workers immediately. The TEV estimates the Wheeler - Gray Counties production at 10,000 bales with 45 per cent of it open now. They estimate that only seven per cent has been ginned.

The P. S. Department of Commerce last week end issued a release showing the number of bales of cotton ginned in each county up to October 1, this year, compared to the same time in 1957:

Doug Rives Is County Veterans Service Officer

Doug Rives of Shamrock has been appointed by the Commissioners Court to serve as Wheeler County Veterans Service Officer.

Replacing George S. Gandy of Wheeler, who resigned, Rives will assume his new duties Saturday, November 1.

Rives will maintain his office in Shamrock at the National Guard Armory. Each Saturday from 8:30 a.m. until 2 p.m., he will be in the commissioners court room at the court house in Wheeler for the convenience of veterans in that area. Each Saturday afternoon from 2:30 until 5 o'clock, he will be in Mobeetie.

A veteran of World War II, in which he saw service for three years, Rives is now a Warrant Officer and unit administrator of Battery "C" of the National Guard in Shamrock, a position he has held since March 1951.

Rives served overseas with the 95th Infantry Division during World War II. Among his decorations are: Combat Infantry Badge, Bronze Star, European Theatre of Operation Badge with three battle stars; Commendation Ribbon and World War II Victory Ribbon.

The new Veterans Service Officer is one of Shamrock's most enthusiastic civic workers and has headed several community campaigns during the past few years.

CITY WELL IS BAILING 120 GALLONS

The water well being drilled by Isaac Carter on the city owned property west of town is bailing 120 gallons per minute, according to a report by Mayor Thomas Daughtry.

A pump is now being installed in the well and if it holds its 120 gallon average it will be made into a permanent well.

The well is being constructed in connection with the water and sewer project for Wheeler. And if the well is a success it will save Wheeler some \$25,000 dollars on construction of the water-sewer project, Daughtry said.

In the original estimate of cost engineers figured on running several miles of pipe, buying additional water rights and constructing a settling tank. If the well on the city owned property is a success none of this will be necessary.

TYPING CLASS WILL BEGIN NOVEMBER 4TH

Twenty-one Wheeler businessmen and housewives expressed their desire to enroll in a typing class this past week.

Mrs. Alta Davis, high school typing instructor, has agreed to hold an adult typing class one night each week.

The first session will be held Tuesday, November 4 from 7 until 9 p.m. in the typing room at Wheeler high school.

One dollar a night will be charged for the lesson Mrs. Davis said.

SHAMROCK MAN IN HOSPITAL AFTER ACCIDENT

Percy Hendrick, 24, of Shamrock was seriously injured Saturday night when he was struck by an automobile south of Shamrock on highway 83.

Investigating patrolmen said Hendrick had allegedly stolen a 1958 Chevrolet in Shamrock and drove the car into a pasture 3 miles south of town. Officers said he was about half-mile off the highway when he lost control of the car and it ran into a 200 ft. canyon and burned.

Hendrick escaped from the burning car and made his way back to the highway where he stepped in front of a 1958 Plymouth driven by Selba Rainey of Wellington.

Hendrick was taken to the Shamrock hospital with severe burns and injuries.

No charges were filed against Rainey.

Absentee Voting Is Underway; 37 Cast Ballots

Absentee voting in the November 4 general election began Wednesday October 15 and will continue through Friday, October 31, at the office of County Clerk Harry Wofford at the court house in Wheeler.

Forty-nine absentee ballots have been issued and 37 have been returned according to Wofford.

Voters who plan to be absent from the county on election day are urged to cast absentee ballots. A person wishing to vote absentee must apply for a ballot. If application is made by mail, the ballot will be mailed to the voter, and he in turn, will mark and return it to the county clerk.

Application for a ballot may be made in person, and in that event, the voter may make application and vote at the same time.

The general election ballots contain five columns - one each for the Democratic, Republican, Constitution and Independent parties and a fifth column for write-in votes.

Three candidates are seeking the office of Commissioner of Precinct 4 through the write-in method. Asking voters to write in their names for the office are: Dean McMurtry, E. E. Henderson and L. L. See.

Nine proposed amendments to the state constitution also appear on the ballots. (A brief summary of the proposed amendments appears in another story in this issue of The Times.)

Polls will open at 8:00 a.m. and close at 7 p.m. at the 15 county voting places. Balloting boxes will (Continued on Page 8 No. 2)

THE TWO COMMISSIONS

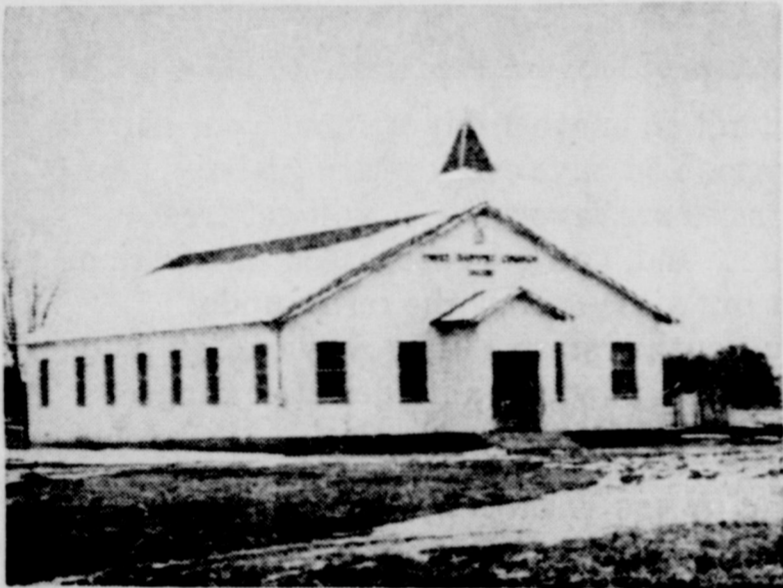
One of the most important lessons in order to the proper understanding of the New Testament is to explain the two commissions which Christ gave to his twelve apostles, one before his death and the other after, and give in contrast the differences in point of doctrine, of territory and design. Dropping the cross between the giving of these commissions, we can plainly see that the reasons that they differ is they were given for two very different dispensations, the first under the Jewish law, and the second for the law of the Christian dispensation. Under the first Jesus says to them: "Go not into the way of the Gentiles, and into the city of the Samaritans enter ye not, but go ye rather to the lost sheep of the house of Israel, and as ye go preach, saying the kingdom of heaven is at hand." (Matt. 10:5) At the time Jesus had not shed his blood for the remission of the sins of the world, he had not opened the grave, but during this state which was preparatory to the establishing of his kingdom, he had as helpers in this work, John the Baptist, the twelve and the seventy, whom he sent two and two into the cities whither he himself would follow. (Luke 10:1) At the time the Jewish law enjoining the Sabbath day, the killing of the lamb, and all the carnal ordinances, was in force.

Now please step over on this side of the cross and hear him to the same twelve, after he had died for the sins of the whole world, after he had given assurance of the resurrection of all by his own resurrection. After he had said all power is given unto me both in heaven and upon earth, He told them to go into all the earth, but hear it from God's word, "Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost." (Matt. 28:19).

They were to tarry in Jerusalem until they received power from on high before this commission would be in force. "But ye shall receive power after that the Holy Ghost is come upon you: and ye shall be witnesses unto me both in Jerusalem, and in all Judaea, and in Samaria, and unto the uttermost part of the earth." (Acts 1:7). This power came upon them a few days later in Jerusalem on the first Pentecost after the death, burial and resurrection of Christ. See Acts 2:1-4.



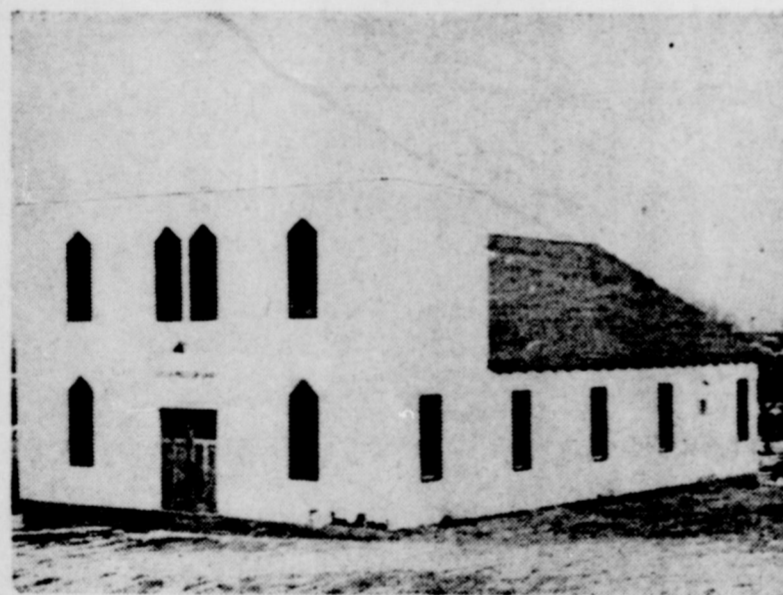
