THE BIBLE

The Bible is God's inspired word. When compared with the Book of books, the best of this world's literature pales into insignificance. The world's history is very dependent on the Bible. Little or nothing would be known of the period before four hundred B. C. Nothing would be known of a Savior without the Bible. It is actually a book about a 'man'. The man who was also devine, the Son of the true and living God. The Old Testament gives many prophecies of this one and the things he was to do. The New Testament gives us the fullfillment of these things. He is the WAY, the TRUTH and the LIFE. (Jno. 14:6). Without the Bible man would not know how to come to God, or how to be acceptable in His sight. Even the essential ingredient of faith comes from God's word. (Rom. 10:17). Without the Bible, mankind would be in ignorance of what is to be in the future.

The Bible, and not creeds, interpretations of commentors, should be our sole standard of appeal in matters religious. Error, comes from man, but never from God. His word is absolutely infallible. It is our guide which is given for the purpose of guiding man from this earth to heaven. If one refuses to follow the guide, he and not God is responsible for the outcome of his journey. (Rom. 1:16). True, new versions are being brought out from time to time, but the original meaning is not to be altered. These versions are merely to compensate for the changes man has made in his languages

The foundation of communism is the Darwin theory of evolution, which supposes to show the origin of all things without the help of a supreme being or God. Note, we call it a theory for that is exactly what it is. Man has tried and tried to demonstrate this theory and bring it into the realm of science. They have not made a single man out of monkey. They can dress him up and teach him to smoke and many other things that man does, but he is still a monkey. All that they have succeeded in doing is make monkeys of themselves, but that is in the wrong direction to prove their theory.
