

Locating at Mobeetie until Wheeler townsite was surveyed when he bought a lot and built and operated Wheelers first hotel. In the Chamber of Commerce spring of 1906, the hotel was located a sort distance north of Uncle Tona Mortons old home 1913 when he dtcided to farm out Wheeler, presented the program east of town. He didn't like farm ing and moved to Rogers, Arkansas in 1918 where he operated a grist mill for 8 years. Then tried farming again for a year and moved to Amarillo in 1928 and then on to Fresno in a few months where he remained until death. He had been in ill health for several months preceeding his death.
