In the first bout of the evening Donnie Miller outpointed Bill Green. In the second bout Gilbert Shaffer downed Bobby Meadows.

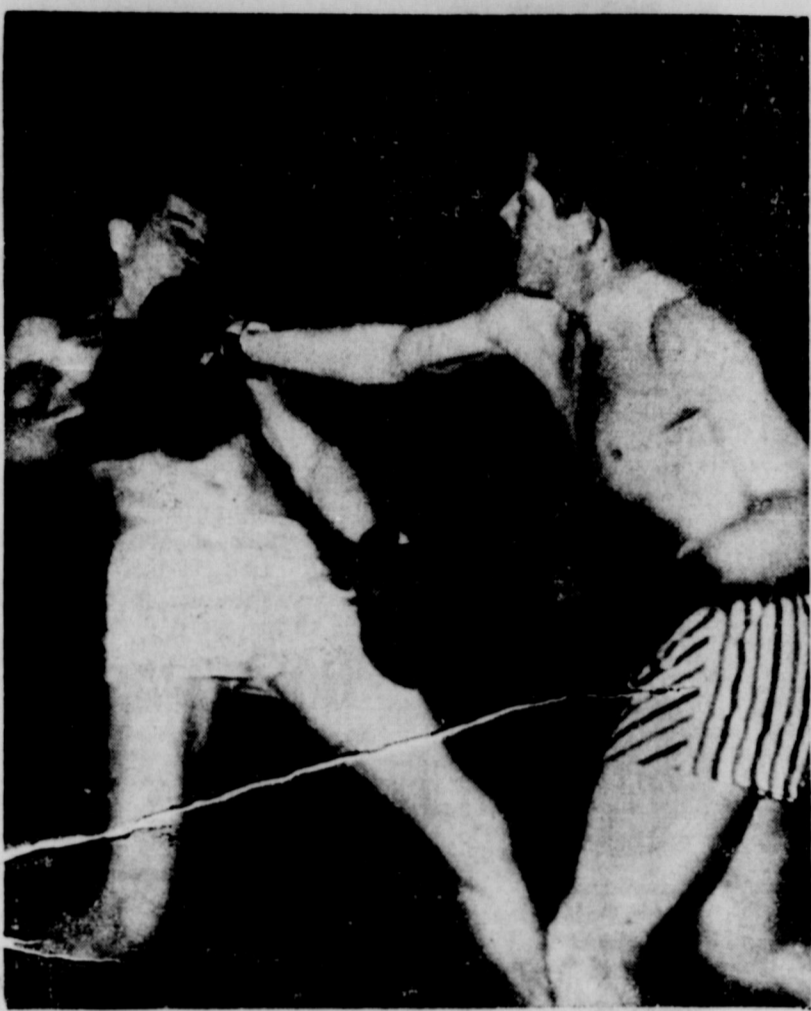
The third fight was another thriller, Joe Miller and Larry Henderson showed the crowd some real uptown slugging. Larry won that one.

Contract Let For Surfacing Of Farm To Market Roads

A contract for the construction of grading, structures, base and surfacing on Farm - to - Market Roads 2473, 1547 and 2474 in Wheeler County was awarded in Austin this week. Marshall Formby, Chairman of the State Highway Commission, has announced. The firm of N. F. Bradley, Memphis submitted the low bid of \$154,990.25 on the project which runs from Gray County line east 4.0 miles; from US 66 at Lela north 3.0 miles and from US 66 1.7 miles west of Shamrock, north 1.0 mile, a distance of 7.9 miles.

Formby stated that Resident Engineer L. Clyde Drake of Wellinton will be in charge of the project for the Highway Department, and it is estimated that the work will take 150 days to complete.

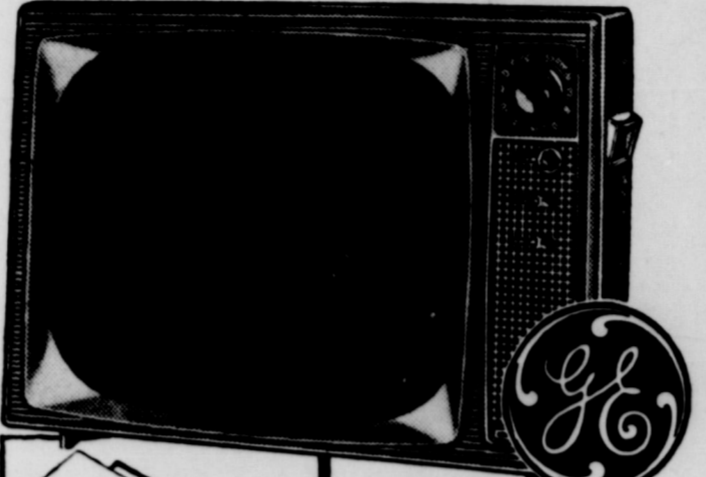

PEOPLE ARE CONDEMNED FOR THREE THINGS
