McKay, the Agency's State Director, advised that this change was made to encourage more lenders to advance funds for insured loans in order to meet the needs of qualified applicants through the Nation.

The insured farm loan program encourages the use of private capital in place of direct Government loans. Through this program private lenders can advance funds to eligible farmers for the purchase of land, for building and land improvement, and for domestic and irrigation water systems. In addition to the 4 per cent paid the lender, the borrower pays the Government 1 percent for insur-

### 1,452 Poll Tax Receipts Issued

Thurman Rives, tax assessor collector, announced Tuesday that 1,452 poll tax receipts were issued in Wheeler County before the passing of the January 31 deadline.

This means that the county's potential balloting strength will be weaker by 373 votes than last year when 1,825 persons paid their poll tax. The current figure is 68 greater than it was in the last off-election year when 1,364 poll tax receipts were issued.

Two hundred and twenty-seven of the poll tax receipts were issued at the office of W. A. Sims rock.
